HENRY FILLMORE
Head Judge—
Florida State Band Contest

It has been said that wherever men march to the music of bands in street parades, in the armed forces, or on the gridirons of America—the martial music of Henry Fillmore, with its compelling rhythm and melodic flair, sets the standard for all to follow.

One of the most prolific contemporary composers of American band music, Henry Fillmore is recognized today throughout the nation as the contemporary "March King". And his fame does not rest solely upon the march form of composition; for Fillmore is also the father of the Trombone smear. His "Shoutin' Liza Trombone", "Lassus Trombone", and the other fourteen members of the trombone family have many imitators but few equals.

The whole range of band literature is Mr. Fillmore's forte. His catalogue of more than three hundred numbers in active use today includes overtures, operatic selections, solos, novelty pieces, songs, and student training material.

One of the most phenomenal phases of Fillmore's composing activities is that of the vast amount of easy material he has written for young bands. Under the nom-de-plume of Harold Bennett, he has written a series of four "Bennett Band Books", copies of which may be found wherever there is a school band anywhere in the world. Actually more than a million Bennett Band Books have been purchased by aspiring band students.

Henry Fillmore is much in demand as a guest conductor for band concerts and for clinical work with all-state bands and similar groups. Recently he was a featured guest conductor with Paul Lavalle's "Band of America" over NBC. His recent guest appearances include the University of Michigan Band, the Texas All-State High School Clinic Band, the University of Miami Band, the University of Pittsburgh Band, the Goldman Band, the University of Miami Band (Fla.), and the Chattanooga All-City Band. His appearances as guest conductor of the massed bands at the annual Orange Bowl Game in Miami are a highlight of the New Year's festivities.

Henry Fillmore's activities as a band and solo contest adjudicator are nationally recognized. He has served as a contest judge in many states including Utah, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Mississippi, Georgia and for many years has acted in the capacity of head judge for the Florida State Band and Orchestra Contest. His comments on the judging sheets are to the point, kind, and hopeful and tend to spur the competitor on to greater achievement rather than create a feeling of failure.

Henry Fillmore's professional experience includes both playing (trombone) and conducting in circus, road shows, vaudeville, stage shows, musical comedy, park bands, and radio bands. As conductor of the "Fillmore Band", he reached the height of his career as a professional musician. With this group he toured North America for a number of years and played to audiences numbering thousands. Fillmore was a pioneer in radio. He served as a band conductor for over fifteen years on radio station WLW (Cincinnati) starting when radio was in its infancy in 1922.

Many will be surprised to know that Henry Fillmore is also Harold Bennett, Will Huff, Al Hayes, and Harry Hartley, these being the several pen names under which he writes.

P. J. GUSTAT

P. J. Gustat was born in Alsace-Lorraine, and came to the United States with his parents at the age of six. He studied solfeggio and clarinet with Giuseppe DePetro, a professor from Italy, who spent several years in this country. He finished courses in harmony and orchestration with Adolf Rosenbecker and Daniel Prothro, and public school music with Frances E. Clark. Former conductor of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra, Municipal Band and Boy Scout Band of El Paso, Texas. He was director of Music Education in the Sebring, Florida, schools for twenty-four years. Now retired.



MARK H. HINDSLEY

Mark H. Hindsley received his training at Indiana University: A.B. (chemistry) "with high distinction," 1925; A.M. (music), 1927. Elected to Phi Beta Kappa on junior record. One of five to represent Indiana University in Rhodes Scholarship competition, 1925, 1926.

Additional study at Metropolitan School of Music, Indianapolis; Sherwood School of Music, Chicago; National Music Camp; University of Illinois.

He was Director of Bands, Instructor of Music, Indiana University, 1925-29. Director of Instrumental Music, Cleveland Heights, Ohio, 1929-34. Increased band enrollment in high school from twenty to one hundred and forty. High School band championship of Greater Cleve-

land in third year. National first division ratings in concert playing, sight reading, and marching in fourth year.

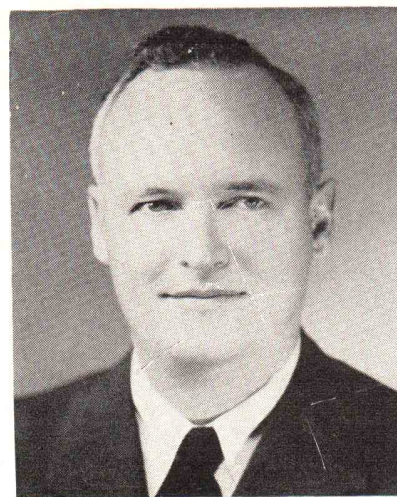
He was Assistant Director of Bands, Associate to Associate Professor of Music, University of Illinois, 1934-1948. Acting Director of Bands, 1948-50. Director of Bands, Professor of Music, 1950.

Military Service: Captain to Lieutenant Colonel, Air Corps, 1942-46; Chief of Music Unit, Personnel Services Division, Army Air Forces. Training Command, 1942-45, supervision over almost one hundred and fifty AAF Bands. Music Faculty, Biarritz American University, France, two terms, late 1945. Received Army Commendation Ribbon.

Mr. Hindsley has wide experience in district, state, regional and national contests, festivals and clinics in more than twenty-five states.

Among Mr. Hindsley's writing are: Band—Attention! (Marching band), 1932; twenty-four Formations, Designs and Entrances for the Marching Band, 1935; Music Educators Basic Methods for Cornet, Baritone, Tubas, Eb Alto, 1938; School Band and Orchestra Administration, 1940; Mark Hindsley Band Method (14 instruments and score), 1940; Fundamentals of Band Performance (thirteen instruments and score), 1950; Twenty or more articles in Music Educators Journal, The Etude, Educational Music Magazine, School Musicians, and other magazines. Published compositions include Indiana Loyalty March, Music In the Air. Numerous manuscript arrangements for concert band.

He is a member of Music Educators National Conference; Past Chairman, College Bands Committee; Editorial Board, Music Educators Journal; Contemporary Music Committee. College Band Directors National Association; Chairman of committee formulating "Declaration of Principles"; Past President. American Bandmasters Association (member of Board of Directors); Rotary Club of Champaign; Indiana Society of Chicago; Phi Beta Kappa; Sigma Phi Epsilon (social); Alpha Chi Sigma (chemistry); Phi Mu Alpha-Sinfonia (music), past faculty advisor; Pi Kappa Lambda (music); Kappa Kappa Psi (National college band) (honorary member); National Association of American Composers and Conductors.



L. BRUCE JONES

L. Bruce Jones was Director of Bands and Orchestras for seventeen years at the Little Rock Senior High School, Little Rock, Arkansas. He was also Supervisor of Instrumental Music of the Little Rock Public Schools.

Mr. Jones earned a B.S. in Education at the Northeast

Missouri State Teachers College, where he directed the Training School Band and was Concertmaster and Assistant Conductor of the College Symphony. He received the degree B. Mus. cum laude from the University of Illinois where he was Cocertmaster of the University Symphony, played principal BB-flat bass in the Concert Band, and directed the Second Regimental Band. He was awarded the gold medal for outstanding service in the Concert Band.

Mr. Jones has served widely as adjudicator of state and national contests, and as guest conductor of state and national clinics and of University summer school music groups. He has been a member of the faculty at George Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tennessee, for four summers, and holds a Master's Degree fro that institution.

In 1940 Mr. Jones achieved one of the highest honors that can come to a Band Director when he was elected to membership in the American Bandmasters Association. This organization is made up largely of professional and university bandmasters, and membership is in recognition of outstanding work.

In 1945 Mr. Jones joined the faculty of Louisiana State University as Director of Bands, and Chairman of the Department of Music Education.



DR. FRANK SIMON

Frank Simon, internationally famous bandmaster and cornet virtuoso, was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, November 28, 1889, and received most of his musical education in that city of traditional musical culture. When only eleven he showed exceptional talent for the cornet and soon attracted the attention of the eminent cornet master and military band expert, Herman Bellstedt. Under Bellstedt's guiding genius he developed with amazing rapidity, and while still in his teens was featured as soloist during the tours of well known professional bands.

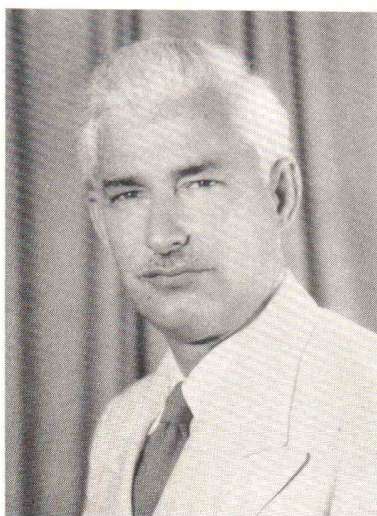
Acclaimed as a front rank virtuoso, he was offered a position with the Sousa Band, and it was not long before he became the premier soloist and assistant conductor of the Sousa organization. His phenomenal performances and superb artistry made him a great favorite with Sousa audiences everywhere.

Steeped in the inspiration gained during seven seasons under the inimitable "March King," Frank Simon responded to the urge of creating a great band of his own. In 1920 he accepted an offer from The American Rolling Mill Company of Middletown, Ohio, to organize and conduct its band. With this band, Simon appeared with remarkable success at The Canadian National Exhibition and many other engagements of significance.

In 1930, when radio came into its own, Dr. Simon reorganized his band as a purely professional organization. From the ranks of Cincinnati's talented musicians he engaged a group of fifty splendid artists that during the past ten years of broadcasting over N.B.C. networks has become recognized as one of the world's front rank symphonic bands.

Frank Simon is past-president of The American Bandmasters' Association, and was one of the organizers of this Association. Many honors and distinctions have been accorded him, among them being a Doctor of Music degree conferred upon him at Columbus, Ohio, in 1930 in recognition of his untiring efforts for the advancement of bands throughout the country. In 1932, he was appointed Director of the Band Department of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

He has been in popular demand as guest-conductor, judge and lecturer at band festivals, contests and clinics in all parts of the country. He loves young people; knows how to inspire them, and his devotion to young musicians of the nation is widely recognized.



FRED McCALL

Fred McCall is Director of Bands at the University of Miami. His work also includes the planning, coordinating and directing the Orange Bowl Pageants for the New Year's Day Football Classics. He founded and directs the University of Miami Summer Band Camp for High School Students.

McCall has been president of the Florida Bandmasters Association, the Florida Music Educators Association and vice-chairman of Region Eight of the National School Music Association. He was bandmaster at Miami Edison High School for seventeen years and directed the orchestra there from 1946-48. He also served as Dean of Boys for three years at Miami Edison. He is a member of the American Bandmasters Association.

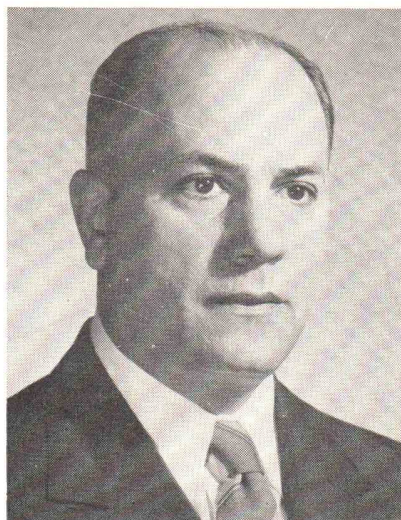
H. MERLE SMITH

Mr. Smith teaches baton twirling under name of Smith School of Baton Twirling; also co-owner and co-director of Smith-Walbridge Camps, Inc., Syracuse, Ind.

Organizer of Baton Club of Michiana, South Bend, Ind. On teaching faculty of Jordan College of Music, Indianapolis, Ind.

Besides own private teaching, has taught at several twirling clinics throughout the U.S.A. He is a member of V.F.W. Post No. 1167, South Bend, Indiana, and American Legion Post No. 223, Syracuse, Ind. Twirled and drum majored Mishawaka High School Band, V.F.W. No. 1167 Drum and Bugle Corps.

Drill Instructor, Junior Drum and Bugle Corps, American Legion Post No. 357, South Bend, Ind. Corps won state championship under his instructions. Drum Major, U. S. Naval Seabee Band and 141st Battalion during World War II.



DR. WILLIAM D. REVELLI

For more than twenty years, Dr. William D. Revelli, has been one of the gigantic forces behind the band movement in America. His vision and ideals are largely responsible for the degree of perfection which the University of Michigan Symphonic Band has attained.

Dr. Revelli's musical training began in 1915 when he

entered the Beethoven Music School in St. Louis, Missouri. During the following ten years he studied with such outstanding men as D. Sarli, Leon Samatini, Louis Victor Saar, Felix Borowski, and H. A. VanderCook.

In 1925, Dr. Revelli was appointed music supervisor in the public schools of Hobart, Indiana, where he organized the school's music department while continuing his studies at the VanderCook School of Music in Chicago. In the five years preceding his coming to Michigan, Dr. Revelli conducted the Hobart High School Band to five consecutive national championships, a record generally considered phenomenal in this field.

In the Fall of 1935, Dr. Revelli was appointed to his present position as conductor of the University of Michigan Bands and head of the Department of Wind Instruments. Today, he is recognized as one of the truly outstanding figures in the concert band world and makes many appearances each year in all parts of the country in the capacity of guest conductor and adjudicator of band festivals.

In addition to his duties at Michigan, Dr. Revelli is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Bandmasters' Association; Honorary National Grand President of Kappa Kappa Psi, honorary college band fraternity; member of Alpha K. Lambda, Phi Mu Alpha, and a host of other musical societies. He is editor of the "World of Music," a band and orchestra method, and serves as an editor of the "Etude Music Magazine" and the "University of Michigan Band Series." He is also a founder and past president of the National University and College Band Conductors' Association.



PAUL YODER

Paul Yoder returns for the fifth year as one of the judges in the Florida State Band and Orchestra Contest. Mr. Yoder is an arranger and composer of band music with more than five hundred published numbers to his credit. The required number in the Class CC competition, "Mountain Majesty," is one of his more recent compositions designed especially for school bands.

Mr. Yoder graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1930. After teaching in the public schools of Illinois and Indiana for several years he established himself as a writer of school band music and, since that time, has devoted all his efforts along this line. Nearly every school and college band has used some of his football band shows, arrangements of current popular songs or original works for band. He has acted as judge and guest conductor throughout the country. He served in an Army Band in World War II and is at present the music editor for the Neil A. Kjos Music Co.

About the Bands...

APOPKA HIGH SCHOOL BAND

JOE VANCE, Director

The Apopka High School Band was organized in 1944 under Miss Gail A. Kinney. Entering Class D in 1945, the Band received a Second Division.

Miss Opal Beville served as director during the 1946-47 term. From Greenville, North Carolina, in 1947-48 came Mr. Harold A. McDougle to serve two terms.

The present director is Mr. Joe Vance.

BARTOW HIGH SCHOOL BAND

HOWARD E. STIVERS, Director



The Bartow High School Band was first organized in January, 1938, with Theodore Ehrlich the bandmaster. It developed rapidly and entered the State Band Contest in the spring of 1939. In its first band contest the band won a first in marching and a high second in playing.

The band continued as an active organization until the war and several other complications reduced it

to an inactive status.

In 1944 the band was revived under Miss Margaret Clark, who doubled as band and glee club instructor. The band regained some of its old form when, in 1946, 60 new white and orange-trimmed uniforms were purchased.

For the next three years a debt of several thousand dollars was paid for the uniforms. This was a step on the road to regaining old prestige.

This year, under Howard E. Stivers, the band performed in six out-of-town parades and more than ten home town parades and football games.

New ideas were used by the band this year. They include: Using the charting system for half-time football shows, making use of the merit point system and awarding band letters to those earning the required number of points under the merit point system.

For the first time in many years the Bartow H. S. Band, under its new director, Mr. Stivers, received a superior rating in marching and precision drill at the District Contest in Lake Wales. This year also saw Bartow place two ensembles in Superior out of four entered in the competition. Of the five soloists entered in the District competition three received Superior ratings and advanced to the State Contest.

Howard E. Stivers, the director, graduated from Butler University and Arthur Jordan Conservatory of Music, Indianapolis, Ind., in 1944, Bachelor of Music in Education. He attended Indiana University, studying for Master's Degree in Music, Education. Served in Army Air Forces Band, playing cornet, baritone and flute for a period of four years. Toured various points in France and Germany, playing trombone with Air Forces Dance Band in an entertainment unit. Taught bands at DeMotte, Ind., North Judson, Ind., and in Sterling, Ill., before coming to Bartow. Attending Northwestern University at present, working toward Master of Music Degree in Education.

BUNNELL HIGH SCHOOL BAND

WALTER S. MORRIS, Director



The present Bunnell High School Band, Flagler County, Bunnell, Florida was organized in 1946.

The Band adopted as its "trade" name, *The Biggest Little Band in Dixie*, on the merits of its big doings coming from one of the smallest schools in the State.

Much of the success of this organization has come about due to the wonderful work of the Band Parents Association, the Flagler County School Board, the Board of County Commissioners, the Board of City Commissioners of Bunnell and a cooperative group of administrators and faculty of the school.

Within the Concert Band are two separate organizations: the Schnicklefritz Band, a booster band for everything that is good and worthwhile, and the Dance Band which provides experience for its future musicians and recreational dancing for all the school personnel.

The director of this group of fine musicians is Walter S. Morris.

Mr. Morris has served as Band Director at Bunnell High School for two years prior to World War II, a short period with the same school as acting principal, and five years, following his Army service, as director of music with the same school system.

He has served as secretary of the Fifth District, Florida Bandmasters Association, for three years.

Mr. Morris holds degrees from Western Kentucky State and Peabody College.

CHATTAHOOCHEE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

MRS. B. LAMAR WATSON, Director



The Chattahoochee Band was organized in 1943 by the County Supervisor of Bands, Mr. H. Carlton Mason, and assisted by Miss Margaret Stevens. The following year Miss Lejune Hughes directed and the Band entered the Festival for the first time and has entered every year thereafter. Mr. M. C. Thompson followed as the director for three years; during this time the Band added new uniforms, entered the District Contests and became well established in the school and community. Mrs. B. Lamar Watson came in the Fall of 1948. The Band has continued to grow under her direction and has qualified and entered the State Festival each year. Last year the Band made a "First Division" rating on all entries in the State Contest.

Mrs. B. Lamar Watson is a graduate of F.S.U., with an A.B. in Education. She has thirteen years of teaching experience, three of which were in the Demonstration School of A.P.I., Auburn, Alabama, six years of instrumental music teaching Gadsden County.

This band is very active in community affairs.

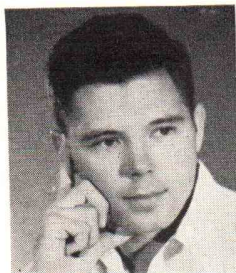

ROBERT ROTH, Director

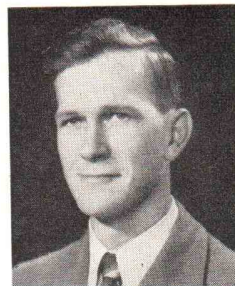

They have an additional problem this year in scheduling and do not have the band together at any period during the day. Full band practices are held after school. Despite these handicaps, they were able to qualify for State once more. The band is appreciative of the financial backing given by the Cities of Rockledge and Cocoa, and the civic clubs, because they have enabled the band to develop—instrumentally as well as uniformly, and without them the group wouldn't be equipped.

Since its inception, the band has been under the leadership of Bob Roth, a graduate of Lake Forest College. Mr. Roth spent four years in the Air Force as a pilot and flight instructor. He managed the Airport in Cocoa for one year and was one of the chief pilots for the county when Brevard County initiated the mosquito control program. He did additional music study at the Vandercook School of Music, and at the present time, will receive his M. A. this summer from Peabody Teachers' College in Nashville.

CORAL GABLES SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL

LOGAN O. TURRENTINE, Director



For five years previous to moving into their new school with its \$100,000 band building, this band, then the Ponce de Leon High School Band, was directed by Paul Cremaschi, who is now Director of Music. New equipment and new cadet style uniforms, purchased from funds raised largely by a very active Band Patrons Association, along with trips to St. Petersburg's Festival of States Parade and Havana, Club's Festival, have raised spirits of students and instructors alike to a new high.

Logan Turrentine joined the faculty of the Department of Music at Coral Gables Senior High School at the beginning of this school year. A graduate of Miami Senior High School, he was in the Band for four years and Drum Major for three years. He served 18 months in the Navy during the war. He received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Miami where he was in the Band for four years and Drum Major for three years. He is a member of Phi Mu Alpha and Iron Arrow, highest honorary fraternity on the University of Miami Campus.

MAINLAND HIGH SCHOOL BAND (Daytona Beach)

WILLIAM J. BENTON, Director

The Mainland High School Band was organized by Mr. William P. Heney in 1937 and performed usually as a part of the combined bands of Mainland and Seabreeze High Schools under Mr. Heney's direction. The band of approximately 35 members was taken over by its present director in 1941, and by 1942 began to perform as an independent unit at football games and parades.

Each year since the war the band has increased in size and is now making great strides forward in appearance and instrumentation, much of which is due to the hard-working Mainland Band and Orchestra Parents Association, which raised funds for the purchase of 65 new uniforms, and a co-operative Administration and School Board, who this year appropriated \$2,700 to complete the band instrumentation and provide 12 additional uniforms.

Each year the band makes one or two out-of-town football trips. With the support of the Daytona Beach Lions Club it went to Miami Beach last year and to Tallahassee this year to back their team. For three years it has been invited and has taken part in the Gator Bowl festivities in Jacksonville.

William J. Benton, director of the Mainland High School Band and Orchestra, received his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Mercer University, majoring in Education. He served as director of the Mercer Band and Glee Club Orchestra for four years as an undergraduate and one year as a graduate student. After graduation he taught in Wrightsville, Ga., two years and directed the Albany, Ga., High School Band four years; helped organize the Georgia Music Educators Association and served as treasurer of that organization for two years before coming to Florida. He has directed the Mainland Band and Orchestra since 1941 and recently was elected Chairman of District Four, F.B.A., for the next school year, and vice president of the Florida Orchestra Association for the coming year.

MAINLAND HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA (Daytona Beach)

WILLIAM J. BENTON, Director

The Mainland High School Orchestra has been an important organization at Mainland High School for several years, taking its place with the Band and Glee Clubs to provide a well-balanced Music Department in the school.

Besides furnishing music for graduation programs each year, the orchestra has appeared many times in student assembly programs and local events. Last year, two of the outstanding accomplishments of the group were the special concert given for a visiting delegation from the Havana, Cuba schools and the combined Glee Club-Orchestra concert in the Peabody Auditorium.

The Mainland Orchestra has always been a strong supporter of the string movement in Florida and has contributed many students to clinic orchestras in the past. This year, eleven M.H.S. Orchestra members represented our school in the All-State Orchestra which performed at the Tampa Music Clinic.

The orchestra under the direction of William Benton entered the Florida Contests in 1947, playing in Class "D" with a membership of 20, making a First Division in District and State.

Entering Class "B" in 1948, the orchestra won a First in District and Second in the State Contest in Jacksonville. Last year the orchestra won First Division ratings in Concert and sight-reading both at the District level and at the State Contest in Miami. Orchestra uniforms were furnished in time for the State Contest by the Mainland Band and Orchestra Association.

For the past two years the Mainland Orchestra has been the only Class "B" orchestra in Florida to enter District or State Contests.

WALTON SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL BAND (DeFuniak Springs)

JOSEF OSZUSCIK, Director



The Walton Band was organized in 1935 under the direction of Capt. Sherouse. In Sept. 1940, Mr. Joe Barry Mullins followed Capt. Sherouse who in turn was succeeded by W. S. Haynie for one year and after which Mr. Mullins returned for one more year leaving again in 1943. During the World War II, the band was disbanded but was reorganized in 1945 by Paul Creech who left in 1947 leaving the band

without a leader once more.

In February 1948, Josef Oszusik took over the task of re-organizing the band department. The new band at present has very few former members and actually is only three years old now. This year is its second contest year since 1941.

Mr. Oszusik has a varied background of musical education and experience. Before entering the public school teaching, he was clarinetist with the Indianapolis Symphony and the Chicago Civic Orchestra and travelled with musical organizations until 1937. His educational

work was accomplished at DePauw University, Indiana University, VanderCook School of Music (Chicago), Mississippi Southern College, and Northwestern University (Evanston, Ill.), from which he has his Master of Music degree.

He taught at Emerson High School, Gary, Indiana; Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas; West Texas State Teachers College, Canyon, Texas; Director of Instrumental Music in the Hattiesburg, Miss. Public Schools from 1939 until 1948 when he came to Walton High School in February of that year. While in Hattiesburg, Miss. he taught instrumental (applied) music at Mississippi Southern College.

DELAND HIGH SCHOOL BAND

JOHN J. HENEY, Director



Since its organization in August of 1936, the DeLand High School Band has attended every contest sponsored by the Florida Bandmasters Association.

The Band is a well equipped organization, having a completely balanced set of instruments. In addition to scientific tuning devices such as the stroboscope, record-making equipment and its own building, the Band travels in its specially equipped buses. These buses have every modern convenience for the comfort of its travelers, including a small hospital. Built-in bunks have inner spring mattresses to make the sick comfortable when the Band is enroute.

DeLand High's Band building is a model for the South and cost approximately \$35,000 during the depression to build. A large assembly hall, sound treated practice rooms, air-conditioned director's office, storage rooms, rest rooms, intercom system, telephone and drinking fountains are some of the conveniences available for students during the time the players are at work.

The Band participates in all football games, home and away; assemblies, local parades, Stetson Homecoming parade, radio programs, concerts and provides specialty members for assemblies.

The Blue Ribbon Band is a well balanced group of twenty-three players which play for different civic clubs.

John J. Heney is a Bachelor of Music, Master of Arts, and director of the DeLand High School Band. Member of the American Bandmasters Association, and president for three years of the Florida Bandmasters Association. Honorary life president of the Florida Bandmasters Association. Composer of twenty-three published compositions. Soloist with the later John Philip Sousa and his famous band. Contributor, by request, to leading music trade magazines and papers. Percussion reviewer of the Music Educators Journal. Member of the National School Band Association, and a former member of the executive committee of the group. Conductor of the Stetson University Band at DeLand, Florida, for six years. Honorary guest conductor of some of the country's leading professional bands. Member of the adjudicatory staff of the American Bandmasters Association and the National School Band Association. Former member of the executive committee of the National College and University Bandmasters Association. Former chairman of the 8th Region (1939-1940).

He is former vice-chairman Drum and Xylophone Solo Committee of National National School Band Association (1937-1942). Director of massed Bands (1,200 players),

and group singing (37,000 people) at Atlanta Constitution Music Festival, Grant Field, Atlanta, Georgia, 1940. Guest director United States Navy Band, United States Marine Band, University of North Carolina Band.

FORT LAUDERDALE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

HARRY F. McCOMB, Director



The Fort Lauderdale High School Band, consistent winner of superior (first division) ratings under its director, Harry F. McComb, is an integral part of the school and community which it represents.

During the football season the "Flying L" Band presents nine tuneful colorfully-costumed half-time shows, each planned around a different theme. There has been

"Three-Ring Circus Time," featuring lions and tigers, acrobats, clowns and lady bareback riders; a Turkish Harem number, complete with Sultan Ah Ben Aroun's dancing girls; a "Calendar Girl" show, a United Nations Tribute, and many other interesting themes.

The band is in a great demand as a school assembly attraction and plays six high school concerts a year as well as appearing at other schools throughout the city.

Civic parades and city-wide celebrations are enlivened by the musical presentation of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band. As a special attraction for winter visitors the band combines with the high school chorus to present a series of concerts in the new 2,500-seat War Memorial Auditorium.

Dance band is extra-curricular activity for many members of the regular band. The Flying Swing Band plays many assembly programs, dances, civic engagements, Youth Center programs and had a regular weekly radio program over Station WBRD.

Solists and ensemble groups are in constant demand as guest performers for such civic clubs as Kiwanis, Optimist, Rotary, Shrine, Tourist Club, and many others.

Graduates of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band are playing in college and service bands all over the United States, many of these graduates on lucrative scholarships.

Band director, Harry F. McComb, born in Detroit, Michigan, was graduated from Cass Technical High School with highest honors in music. He received his A. B. degree in music education from the University of Miami where he played solo cornet in the University Symphony, and Concert Band. Upon graduation he became director of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band, which has, since that time been given highest possible ratings by nationally-known band judges.

In 1949 Mr. McComb received his M. A. in high school administration, guidance and supervision from the University of Michigan. He has served as a judge in nearly all of the Florida band districts. He is a member of Phi

Mu Alpha, a faculty member at the University of Miami Summer Band Camp, and a member of M. E. N. C.'s national committee on music rooms and buildings. Mr. McComb is a Kiwanian, a past-president and a member of the board of directors of the Florida Bandmaster Association.

FORT PIERCE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

MAJOR J. B. O'NEAL, Director



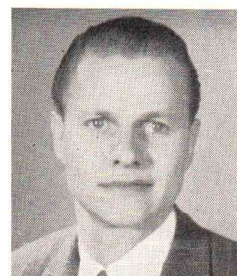
The Fort Pierce High School Band, which has consistently rated First Division in State and National Festivals, is a very prominent part of the school and community life in Fort Pierce. BARDWELL M. DONALDSON, Director



The Gainesville High School Band was organized in 1946 under the very capable leadership of Bardwell M. Donaldson. During the first year the Band attended the District Five Band Contest and received two first division ratings in Class D.

Since that time the Band has consistently won first division ratings in District Contests and is now this year entering its fifth State Contest under its present con-

ductor, Mr. Donaldson, since the Band was organized five years ago.

The Band earned ten first division ratings and one second division ratings in this year's District Contest.

Bardwell M. Donaldson, the director, received his Bachelor of Music degree from Stetson University in 1941; received Master of Arts degree from University of Florida in 1950. He spent three years in U. S. Navy with U. S. S. Essex Band. Played bassoon twelve seasons with Daytona Beach Municipal Band. Played bassoon two seasons with Central Florida Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Donaldson was director, Titusville High School Band for two years; director, Chipley High School Band for one year. Chairman of F. B. A., District number Four for two years.

The Haines City Band was re-organized in the Fall of 1946 with a membership of fifteen and has grown until it includes sixty-six playing members and ten majorettes. The Band performs at each football game during the football season, gives indoor and outdoor concerts during the winter season, appears at assemblies, and takes part in many parades in the neighboring towns. In the Fall, the Band entered their new band building which consists of an auditorium, a library, an office, an instrument room, practice rooms, a storage room, and a rest room. New stands and some new chairs came with this new building. Due to the fine cooperation of the people of Haines City, the Band also has uniforms and the instruments necessary for a balanced band.

ROBERT E. LEE (Jax) HIGH SCHOOL BAND

CLAUDE O. HULICK, Director



Claude O. "Doc" Hulick, Director of Music at Robert E. Lee Senior High School, Jacksonville, is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Champaign, with a B.S. in Education, a B.S. in Public School Music, and is a member of the Phi Mu Alpha-Sinfonia. His Master in Music was received at Illinois Wesleyan University.

While attending the University of Illinois he played solo cornet and first trumpet in the concert band, being admitted in his freshman year to this famous University Band, under the direction of the equally famous Dr. A. A. Harding. When he graduated from the University he was awarded a gold medal for having played with the Concert Band four years. He also played first trumpet in the University Symphony Orchestra, and was a member of the University Men's Glee Club.

His college and pre-med education was interrupted while he played professionally in St. Louis for ten years. When he returned to the University he transferred to the School of Music from which he graduated. The following summers were spent working on his Masters at Illinois Wesleyan.

This is Mr. Hulick's second year of directing the Lee High Band. Before coming here, Mr. Hulick was a Music Supervisor and Band Director in Illinois schools for thirteen years, coming to Florida in 1947 as Area Music Supervisor in the school of the Mulberry, Florida area.

The Lee Band has made many public appearances, both civic and within the school. As part of the Half Century of Progress celebration in Jacksonville, the Band performed at the Gator Bowl for the opening of the pageant. This was Governor's Night which followed a huge parade through the streets of the city. Fifteen members of the Junior Symphony Orchestra are members of this Band, one being the concert master. Also, two members are in the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra as is the Lee Band Director.

ANDREW JACKSON (Jax) SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL

M. B. WEARY, Director



The Band was organized in September, 1945 under its present director, and since that time has performed for all home football games as well as several out of town games. It has also appeared in numerous parades and at civic affairs and each year participates in the annual Kiwanis Charity game and the New Year's Day Gator Bowl game.

The Band was first associated with the state program by appearing at the District contest in St. Augustine March, 1947 and at the State festival in Miami that year, and has entered contest each year since that time.

Milton B. Weary, the director, was born in Chicago, Illinois June 22, 1902 and commenced the study of violin at the age of six, under his father, an accomplished musician and singer. At the age of eight he began the study of piano at the Chicago Musical College and at the age of ten progressed to the study of pipe organ. While attending Oak Park, Illinois High School, he took up the study of French horn and 'cello. While attending the University of Illinois he played 'cello in the University orchestra and took up the study of bassoon and was admitted, during his freshman year, to the famous University of Illinois Band under the direction of Dr. A. A. Harding.

Upon leaving the University he played bassoon in the Chicago Civic Orchestra under Dr. Frederick Stock, and the Chicago Band under William Weil, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra under Rudolph Zanz, and enlisted in the U. S. Marine Band, Washington, D. C. in June, 1925, where he served as bassoonist in the Band and White House Orchestra until November, 1932.

While in the Marine Band, Mr. Weary took up the study of clarinet and saxophone, and upon his discharge migrated to the West Coast where he played in the San Diego and San Francisco Symphony Orchestras, as well as numerous dance bands and orchestra and radio studio orchestras. During the war he served as instructor in the Fleet School of Music in San Diego and at the Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Florida. Following his discharge from the Navy in 1945 he was appointed to his present position at Andrew Jackson High School. He is principal bassoonist in the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, and is Chairman, Fifth District, Florida Bandmasters Association.

COLUMBIA HIGH SCHOOL BAND (Lake City)

ALBERT I. CINA, Director



The Columbia High School Band was organized in 1936 under the direction of Carl Roberts.

In 1945, '46 and '47 the band was under leadership of Bernard Black. In 1947-48 and '49, Mr. Hubert assumed leadership of the band and on July 1st, 1949, the present director, Albert I. Cina, began his duties. Mr. Cina organized a junior band of 42 pieces from fourth up to eighth grade

pupils and they already have given their first concert.

The Columbia High School Band, under the direction of Albert I. Cina, has been a worthwhile addition

to the Lake City school and community life, playing at all school and civic functions.

Albert I. Cina is a native-born Italian, descendant of a musical family. At the age of 16 he was solo trombonist of La Banda di Sicilia, under the direction of his cousin, Antonino Cina, famous maestro and composer.

Cina came to this country in 1914, appearing on the concert stage with Seven Castelluccis. He was cornetist and assistant director with Grella and his Scarlet Guards band. Also cornetist with famous Creatore's Band and James Victor Concert Band. He has attended the bandmaster's summer school of music at Florida State University, Tallahassee, for four summers. Albert I. Cina is the composer and publisher of Gator Bowl March.

He came to Florida in 1939 as director of the Malone High School Band. With Jasper High School Band. Director of Valdosta (Ga.) High School Band 1947-49, and on July 1st, 1949 began his present tenure in Lake City.

LAKE WALES HIGH SCHOOL BAND

O. J. KRAUSHAAR, Director



The Lake Wales High School Band was organized in 1938 with Harry Grant, Jr., director. Mr. Kraushaar came to Lake Wales in 1941. The band plays for school activities — assembly programs, athletic events, various school pageants, for community affairs, and for various out-of-town activities. The band also plays a series of Sunday vesper concerts and an annual Fillmore concert

each spring. The band moved into its own new building three years ago.

Mr. Kraushaar, supervisor of music in Lake Wales, is a graduate of Sherwood Music School in Chicago and has had additional college training at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Iowa. He is a graduate of Howe Military School, Howe, Indiana, where he was on full scholarship and was a fellowship student at the University of Iowa. During World War I he was in the Band of the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, Flagship of the Atlantic Fleet. He has played concert seasons with the Kalamazoo, Michigan Symphony Orchestra; the Ft. Wayne, Indiana Symphony Orchestra; the Canadian Kilties Band; the Chicago Band; and four concert tours with the Sousa Band. He was supervisor of instrumental music in the LaGrange County, Indiana, Schools for seven years —supervisor of music in the Waupun, Wisconsin Schools for seven years—and has been supervisor of music in the Lake Wales Schools for ten years. He has been director of the Band Division for the Summer Music Camp at Florida State University for nine years.

When in Indiana Mr. Kraushaar's groups entered the various contests. During the seven years that he was in Wisconsin the Waupun Band and Orchestra played in thirty-one district, state, and National Contests. The Lake Wales Band has entered all the various State Contests since it was organized and in all the State Inspections during the war.

Mr. Kraushaar is a member of the American Bandmasters Association and is Vice-President of the Southern

Division of the Music Educators National Conference. He is a member of the Sousa Band Fraternal Society. He was Secretary-Treasurer of the National School Orchestra Association for four years; Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Bandmasters Association one year; and President of the Florida Music Educators Association for four years.

LAKE WORTH HIGH SCHOOL BAND

JOSEPH LUSK, Director

The Lake Worth High School Band makes its first appearance at the State Band Contest this year. It is under the directorship of Mr. Joseph Lusk, who assumed the position in 1948. During the last three years the band has increased from twenty-nine members to sixty-one members.

The Trojan Band, in addition to playing and maneuvering at all home and out of town football games, is invited to march in the various parades of south Florida, including the Orange Bowl parade in Miami. In order to further enhance the effectiveness of the Band in these events, a twirling team of sixteen girls has been added. The Band also staged or participated in several variety nights and minstrels. The "Trojan Band" also plays numerous concerts throughout the winter season for the entertainment of northern visitors.

Through the untiring efforts of the school administration and the Band Parents Association the band has achieved their mark of making the school and community increasingly band conscious throughout the year.

LARGO HIGH SCHOOL BAND

EDDIE EDWARDS, Director



The Largo High School Band was reorganized by Eddie Edwards in 1940. During the war Mr. Edwards was in the U. S. Navy. In the fall of 1946 the band was again reorganized with an enrollment of 20 students. The present size of the band is 80 pieces and is classified as a CC Band with a school enrollment of 170 students.

The Largo Band is very active and has progressed very rapidly in the past few years. Besides the many school activities the band gives a series of concerts at the Largo Town Band stand each season.

At the Cigar Bowl Game held in Tampa on January 1, 1951, the Largo Band was chosen to represent Valparaiso College.

For the past two years the Largo High School Band has won a final 1st division rating in concert, sight reading and marching at the state contest.

Mr. Edwards, the director, was born in New Haven, Conn. He began study of trumpet at the age of eight in New York City. He entered the professional field in 1918. Has a very wide experience in theatre and dance work. He played with Felix Ferdinand, B. A. Ross, E. A. Moses and others. While in the Navy he played solo cornet with Charleston Navy Yard Band and Fleet Orchestra.

Eddie has been a student of Rollins College and is continuing his education at the University of Miami.

MALONE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

GAY A. RIMERT, Director



Gay A. Rimert is a Veteran of World War I; was Supervisor of the Conn Conservatory of Music in Baltimore for 9 years; was director of the Rimert School of Music in Altoona, Pa., for 12 years; has composed 18 Overtures and Marches; has been Secretary and Treasurer of the 6th District F.B.A. since 1949. He has compiled the Official F.B.A. Music List of Band Music, Solos and Ensembles.

MIAMI EDISON SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND

J. HOWARD REYNOLDS, Director



This, the year 1951, is the 20th anniversary of the founding of the Miami Edison Band. In 1931 it consisted of eight members, today it boasts 130 strong. And "boasts" is the word to use because this band ranks with the best in the state and is excelled by none. Its founder and director for seventeen years was Mr. Fred McCall, present director of the University of Miami Band. There had been an

orchestra at the school since 1921, but the band did not come into existence until ten years later. For the first three years of the band's existence no school time was allotted to band work and director and students rehearsed long hours after school.

The band entered its first competition in 1934 at the Annual Sun Dance Festival held in West Palm Beach, but did not win anything. The band accompanied the football team to Jacksonville that season. They traveled by bus and played concerts all along the way. They were very well received. At that time there were few bands in the state and the concerts were a treat to the populace.

In 1935, one hour each day was given over to band work and the director taught five history classes besides. In 1936 the director taught music and acted as Junior High school Supervisor, scheduling all work in the Junior High School. The following year the band entered the state contest for the first time, at West Palm Beach.

The Athletic Department at Edison purchased sixty uniforms for the band in 1938. Red West Point coats, white trousers with red stripes down the sides, black "Sam Brown" belts, and black hats with red pompoms completed the outfits. In the late thirties and early forties the Athletic Department helped defray expenses and the band made some money by playing at the Air Races. It also received several donations. The chief money making project each year, was the Minstrel, presented by the band. Up to \$4,000.00 a year was cleared in this manner.

In 1940 Miami Edison Band was host band for the

state contest. The next year the band went to Richmond, Va. to compete in the National Contest, taking 110 people on the trip. Superior Rating was awarded the Marching Band and an Excellent Rating was received by the Concert Band. Through the Band Patrons Association and donations \$5000.00 was raised in about two weeks.

In 1941 a Superior Rating was awarded both Concert and Marching Bands at the State Contest.

For three years the Miami Edison Band was the Coronation Band at the Festival at St. Petersburg. It also took part in the Gasparilla Parade at Tampa. The band was honored at the Edison Pageant of Lights held at Ft. Myers. During World War II, Miami Edison Band was the only band in the State of Florida cited by the War Music Council for meritorious group morale contribution. It received excellent ratings at three national contests, two of which were held in West Palm Beach and one at Richmond, Virginia.

In 1949, Mr. J. Howard Reynolds became the director of the Miami Edison Band. His fine knowledge of music combined with youth, enthusiasm and much hard work, have developed a band to be proud of. On Feb. 10, 1950, the new Band Building was completed, replacing the two old portables which had formed the Band Room. The new building provides cabinets for hanging uniforms, shelves for instruments, a music library, spare for filing music, three practice rooms, the Band Director's office, and the Rehearsal Room.

The Athletic Department gave the band the opportunity to raise funds through the publishing and sale of the football programs for 1948, 1949, and 1950 football seasons. The Band Patrons Association assumed the responsibility for this project and in this manner paid much of the expense incurred when new uniforms were purchased for the band in the spring of 1949. At this time the black leather belts were replaced by white West Point type belts complete with brass breastplates and buckles. Late in 1950 the Band Patrons Association purchased a Magnecord Tape Recorder for use by the entire Instrumental Music Department. Funds for this recorder were raised by a special project, exceeding \$500.00.

During 1949 and 1950 the Concert Band presented four concerts in Bayfront Park for the enjoyment of the public. It also played the accompaniment for the "Theme Girl's" song, "Indian Love Call," at the New Year's Day Orange Bowl Half-Time Extravanza, in 1950. Miss Ginger Leclercq was the soloist.

The Miami Edison Band went to Havana, Cuba as guests of the Cuban Government to participate in the Cuban Mardi Gras Celebration on Feb. 17th, 1950, and in the fall of that year accompanied the football team to Jacksonville, traveling by train.

During the State Contest, which was held in Miami in the spring of 1950, Miami Edison Band received First Division Ratings in both Concert and Marching Bands.

The Orchestra was also awarded a First Division Rating. At the state Music Clinic, which was held in Tampa during the second week in January of 1951, the Clinic Organization consisted of both band and orchestra students from all over the state. In that Clinic Organization many "First Chairs" were held by Miami Edison students. This speaks exceedingly well for the musicianship of these bandmen.

About the Bands . . .

MIAMI EDISON SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

J. HOWARD REYNOLDS, Director

This, the year 1951, is the 30th Anniversary of the founding of the Miami Edison Orchestra. In 1921, when it was established, this group would meet two mornings a week before school, when the music director from Miami High School came over to supervise.

In 1931 one hour each day was given to orchestra work under the direction of Mrs. Frances Deen who also directed the vocal work in school. This was the year when the Edison Band became established under Mr. Fred McCall.

Mrs. Deen developed the orchestra with the aid of a string teacher who came in from time to time to assist.

During the years between 1944 and 1949 Mr. McCall took over the direction of the orchestra and in 1950 it was under the direction of Mr. J. Howard Reynolds who became director of Instrumental Music that year.

This year Mr. Robert A. Lawrence became the Associate Director of Instrumental Music as Director of Strings. He immediately launched a program for the establishing of string classes in the lower grades of the schools which feed into Edison Senior High. An orchestra has been established there to further train these string players in group participation in preparation for the Senior High School Orchestra.

It is the intention of Mr. Lawrence to begin new string students every year and to follow each group in training until they reach Senior High School.

Mr. Lawrence has studied the Violin and Viola at the American Conservatory in Chicago and at the Royal Academy of Music in Rome, Italy. He received his B. S. degree from Northern Illinois State Teachers College and his Master of Music Education degree from Louisiana State University.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND

AL G. WRIGHT, Director



The Miami Senior High School Band directed by Al G. Wright has achieved an impressive record of activities and accomplishments during the past decade.

With its auxiliary organizations, the Stingaree Band numbers around two hundred and ten students. Of the total, one hundred and fifty are bandmen, the remaining students being members of marching units—Majorettes, Twirlers, Swiss Flag Swingers, and United Nations Color Guard.

The hundred and fifty musicians called the "Marching Band" are divided into two smaller groups, a Concert Band" and a "Stingaree Band" for the purpose of facilitating rehearsal and administrative problems.

The Miami High Band has been and is a regular participant in District, State and Regional (National) Band Contests and in them has accumulated a impressive total of first division (superior) ratings in Concert, Marching, and Sight reading events. Playing for nationally recognized band judges including Henry Fillmore (President

American Bandmasters Association); Clenn Cliff Bainum (Northwestern University); William Revelli (University of Michigan); A. A. Harding (Illinois) and the composer Paul Yoder; the Miami High Concert Band has received noteworthy comments and enthusiastic acclaim.

The Miami High Band regularly participates in community and educational activities in cities throughout the State of Florida and is in constant demand for appearances in home-town Miami.

These one hundred and fifty student musicians together with the dancing majorettes, twirlers, flag spinners, and other colorful units have made an outstanding impression on Miami Football Fans.

The Miami Senior High School and has pioneered many firsts in half-time shows for Miami football fans. In 1939 they introduced the art of Swiss Flag Swinging. In 1940 their Black Light Show received nation-wide attention. 1941 brought on Miami's first Majorette Corps when the Miami High Majorettes took the field. 1943 introduced Miami's first between-halves musical pageant which Miami High called "Salute to the United Nations."

These half-time pageants have grown into musical extravaganzas that have attracted nation-wide attraction. Using members of the Miami High Orchestra, the large Chorus, and sometimes the Cheerleaders, these extravaganzas employ between four and six hundred students—all in colorful costumes. Each game sees a different show. Each show is built around a central theme. "Salute to Mexico," "Football Fantasy," "Yuletide Bells," "Western Rhapsody," and "Cuban Carnival" are some of the titles used which will indicate the scope of these extravaganzas. Folk dancing and singing are introduced along with fireworks and electrical effects.

Hailed as one of the snappiest bands in the south for its marching maneuvers and throughout the country as a superb concert group it is dear to the hearts of Miamians as Miami's "Million Dollar" High School Band.

The Miami High Band is well represented in University and College Bands. In 1948 alone more than ten thousand dollars worth of University scholarships were awarded to its graduates.

Under the banner "Leadership-Character," which is also a philosophy, graduates of the Miami High Band are daily taking their places as leaders in their communities.

Al Wright is Director of Music at Miami Senior High School (Florida), a position he has held since 1938. He serves as bandmaster for the school's three bands and conductor for the Concert Orchestra as well as sponsor of the school dance band and the Etude Club, the instrumental music honor society.

He received his undergraduate (BA) degree from the University of Miami (Fla.) in 1937 with a major in Public School Music and received his Masters Degree in Education in 1947 with a major in School Supervision and Administration. Mr. Wright has served as guest conductor with a number of musical organizations including the University of Michigan Band, the University of Miami Band, University of Kansas Band, University of Florida Band, the East Tennessee High School Clinic Band, the Stetson University Chorus, and the Florida All-State High School Orchestra.

Mr. Wright has served as visiting lecturer at Stetson University and at the University of Miami, and has served on the Music Camp faculty at the University of Miami and the Florida State University. He has appeared as Band Clinician at the Mid-West Band Clinic in Chicago, the East-Tennessee Band and Orchestra Clinic, and the Florida State Music Clinic.

Mr. Wright is actively engaged in the promotion of music education as a profession as well as in the de-

velopment of fine musical organizations at Miami Senior High School. Following terms of office as President of the Florida Bandmasters Association and as President of the Florida Orchestra Association, Wright is now President-elect of the Florida Music Educators Association. His other activities include; member of the Florida Teacher Education Advisory Council; member of the NSBOVA Board of Control, SMEC Division; SMEC Chairman of the School Music Rooms and Equipment Committee; Florida State Chairman MENC String Committee; State Chairman MENC School-Community Relations Committee; member board of advisors for the "Instrumentalist" Magazine .

He has served as an adjudicator in nearly all of Florida's six district Band, Orchestra, and solo contests.

In 1949 Al Wright was elected to membership in the American Bandmasters Association. He is also a charter member of the Beta Tau chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. His professional experience includes a number of years on french horn in the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra and with the Miami Opera Guild.

He is pageant director for the annual Kiwanis charity football game and Christmas pageant, and designed and directed the original pageants for the Mahi Shrine football game.

As an educator, Wright is a firm believer in the social importance of music training. He states his philosophy in the following words; "I believe that school band and orchestra participation is one of our finest means for character education. High School bands and orchestras build leadership and character in our youth of today."

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL (Stingaree) ORCHESTRA

GLADYS DITSLER, Director



Miami Senior High School Stingaree Orchestra was organized in Sept. 1949 under the direction of Gladys Edwards Ditsler. Now in its second year the orchestra has reached a membership of forty players, twenty of whom are string players. This second orchestra at Miami High School has a three-fold purpose. It provides orchestral experiences to Junior High School musicians, particularly wind and

percussion players who are not eligible for Concert Orchestra because of instrument limitations in that organization—advanced players who are not able to fulfill required turnouts—and to beginning string players. After completing one semester in Beginning String Class a student is placed in Stingaree Orchestra and from there advances to the larger organization. The entire string section sometimes the concert group in many public performances. This of course is voluntary. The full orchestras has also played for a number of school assemblies.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

AL G. WRIGHT, Director

The Miami Senior High School Orchestra, under the direction of Al G. Wright and Gladys Ditsler, has consistently made highest ratings in district and state contest

participation during its many years of existence. Last year this group received a first division in the concert and sight-reading events for Class A at the State Orchestra contest.

The Orchestra is often a colorful feature at school assemblies. In addition to this, it often presents concerts and participates in numerous civic and state events.

Made up of eighty members, this the Miami High Orchestra has its own officers who work with members of the Band Council and the Director. These officers form an active and successful student governing group within the orchestra. The council plans the orchestra's many activities, sets up standards of dress and behavior and in many ways has helped build the Orchestra into a fine playing and well behaved group of young men and women.

Graduates from this orchestra readily find places in university symphonies over the country. Recently three were awarded scholarships in the symphony at the Eastman School of Music. The University of Miami Symphony roster reveals a large number of Miami High School Orchestra graduates and players on its list. One-fourth of the players in the Miami Opera Guild Orchestra are former members of the Miami High Orchestra.

The string section meets daily during school time with Associate Director Gladys Ditsler in intermediate and advanced string classes. These string classes have contributed immensely to the improvement of the orchestra.

This Orchestra has a full symphonic instrumentation including a large string section and Harps.

Although a surprisingly large number of graduates from this group are now playing in professional and University Symphonies in many parts of the country, its educational goal is the development of leadership and character. That this goal is being reached is amply shown by the increasing number of Miami High Orchestra graduates who are taking their places as leaders in their communities.

Mrs. Gladys Edwards Ditsler was appointed to the position of String Specialist and Associate Director of the Miami High School Orchestra in February, 1947. Since that time a very active growth and interest has become evident in string music at the school. She has organized courses in Music Theory and Music Appreciation, both of which quickly became popular with the students.

Before coming to Miami High, Mrs. Ditsler taught privately for over ten years—organized own trio and played professionally as violin soloist and also as a member of a number of music organizations. Concertmaster of Miami Concert Orchestra—Firestone Broadcasts under Howard Barlow—Miami Opera Orchestra, and University of Miami Symphony Orchestra, of which she is a charter member, playing with the symphony until 1947.

Mrs. Ditsler received B.M. Degree in Public School Music—magna cum laude—from University of Miami. She studied violin with Dr. Arnold Volpe and Dr. Joel Belov—the former an artist pupil of Leopold Auer, the latter a pupil of Carl Flesch—Theory and Harmony with Dr. W. S. Sterling, formerly of Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

She is also a member of Sigma Alpha Lota, national honorary music organization.

As director of the "Stingares" Orchestra, Miami High's second orchestra, Mrs. Ditsler has developed a fine junior organization where students are trained and polished for eventual participation in Miami High's Concert Orchestra.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND (Stingaree)

AL G. WRIGHT, Director

Miami High School's second band, the "Stingaree Band" is composed of some one hundred high school musicians most of whom are in their first year at Miami High. They are moved into Senior band as vacancies occur.

The "Stingaree Band," operating as a separate unit, plays for assemblies and participates in concerts as a separate unit. Combined with the Senior band at football games and parades, it makes a large marching band of some 160 to 180 pieces.

Members of the "Stingaree Band" are issued both a marching band uniform which is the same as the senior band's and also their own Stingaree uniforms.

The Miami High Stingaree band is entering District Band Contest for the second time this year. The band will enter in a special class designated as A-2. In this class the "Stingaree" band must play class B music, must participate in sight reading events, and must participate in the marching event. Second band may not participate in the State Contest under present regulations.

ORLANDO SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND

C. W. RUMPF, Director



The Orlando High School Band was organized in July, 1939, by Edward J. Heney. In August, 1940, Mr. Heney was succeeded by Harry L. Parker under whose capable leadership the department grew and continued to maintain the fine record started by Mr. Heney. In the fall of 1944, Mr. Parker became engaged in war work and was succeeded by Ernest F. Pechin. Many students learned much band music under the capable baton of this much-loved musician, who passed away in the fall of 1946.

Successors to the foregoing gentlemen followed in rapid order. Robert McEmber very successfully directed the band during the 1946-47 season. J. R. Marcellus succeeded Mr. McEmber and was in turn succeeded by G. Gordon Ritter. C. W. Rumpf, formerly director of the Cherokee and Memorial Junior High School Bands, became the director of the Orlando Senior High School Band in 1949.

The organization besides presenting half-time shows at all home football games and at some of the out-of-town ones, is a featured band at the annual Tangerine Bowl game on New Year's Day. A long list of annual parades such as the Christmas Parade, the Central Florida Exposition Parade and many others keep the band literally on its toes.

Participation in school concerts, the annual Orlando School Band Association Concert and a series of park concerts all rank high among the many activities of the band.

With the help of an active band association (headed

by J. J. Loveless) it has been possible to bring the organization in the last two years to Coca, Daytona Beach, Winter Haven, Sanford, Jacksonville, Miami, Lakeland, three times to St. Petersburg, twice to Eustis, and twice to Tampa.

C. W. Rumpf, director of the Orlando Senior High School Band, was born in Langhorne, Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of Temple University, where he received both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

Mr. Rumpf has had the pleasure and privilege of studying with such well known teachers as George F. Boyle, pianist and composer and member of the Julliard School of Music faculty, Henry Albert Lang, composer; and Ferdinand Paul of the famous Sousa Band.

Prior to coming to Florida, Mr. Rumpf, taught in Pennsylvania, where he was a member of the Pennsylvania Bandmasters Association, and Delaware. This is his second year as director of the Senior High School Band in Orlando. Four years were spent by him in the two Junior High Schools of that city: Cherokee and Memorial.

PAHOKEE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

ROBERT O. LAMPI, Director



The Pahokee High School Band was re-organized May 10, 1940 and placed under the direction of R. O. Lampi. Rehearsals were continued through the summer and the Band was ready to perform for the football season of 1940. Since then the Band has performed, playing and marching, during every football season at home games and away from home.

The Band also performs for various civic functions, rallies, parades, and gives a series of winter concerts locally. The Band participates in the annual Halloween Carnival. Occasionally individual members are called upon to perform solos at the local civic clubs.

In the Contest Festival in St. Petersburg in the Spring of 1941, Pahokee entered as a Class D Band. It won first division in marching, third in concert and sight-reading. Since then the Pahokee High School Band has participated in all the FEA sponsored war-time inspections, district and state contests.

Considering the enrollment of the school, averaging slightly over 100 in the Senior High School, the Pahokee Band feels they have made a enviable record in the state.

Robert O. Lampi was born in Mohawk, Michigan. He started the study of piano at the age of twelve. He attended Northern Michigan College of Education at Marquette, Michigan, where he majored in music, graduating with a B.S. degree. Upon first coming to Florida, he was instrumental director at Gulf High School, New Port Richey, for three years. In 1940, he became director of music at Pahokee High School, where he has been ever since. He served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Bandmasters Association from 1945 through 1947, was reappointed Secretary in 1949, and still holds that position at the present time.

BAY COUNTY (PANAMA CITY) HIGH SCHOOL BAND

ORIN WHITLEY, Director



The Bay County High School Band was organized in 1937 by its present director, Orin Whitley.

The band is very active in civic and school functions and has attended three gubernatorial inaugurations.

It regularly participates in football road trips in addition to trips to Alabama's Peanut Festival and Armistice Day programs in West Florida.

Equal stress is laid on producing a playing as well as a marching band and parade routines are enhanced by a twirling corps which is featured with the organization.

In September of 1947 the band moved into its new band building and this summer two new junior high band buildings will be completed to take care of the rapidly expanding music program.

The director is a charter member of the Florida Bandmasters Association, helped organize the Sixth District and served as its first chairman. He has also served as treasurer and vice-president of the state organization and is its present president.

PIERSON HIGH SCHOOL BAND

JAMES T. WEBER, Director



The Pierson School Band was organized by James T. Weber, its present director, in September, 1949, the first to represent the community since the start of World War II.

In less than two years this group has expanded from a few scattered instruments into an organization of approximately thirty pieces, capable of playing both in concert and on the march.

A few weeks ago the Band was chosen to represent North Volusia County at the DeLand "Pioneers of Progress" Exposition. It also participated recently in the annual Field Day Celebration and Parade at nearby Crescent City.

The players are all looking forward to next year, when the Band anticipates entering the District Contest for the first time.

James T. Weber (M.A., Ohio State University; B.A., Ohio Wesleyan) received much of his specialized musical training at the Eastman School of Music, University of Wisconsin, University of Akron, Carnegie Tech., Wittenberg, and Kent State University.

Removed his family to DeLand, Florida from Akron, Ohio in August, 1949, to accept his present position as Music Supervisor of the North Volusia County schools.

Besides directing the Pierson School Band he trains the High School Glee Clubs at Pierson and Seville, and supervises the music at four grade schools.

Mr. Weber's musical teaching experience aggregates sixteen years, including service as music director, vocal or instrumental, at the following city high schools: Akron North, Lakewood, and Mansfield Madison in Ohio, and McKeesport, Pennsylvania.

PONCE DE LEON HIGH SCHOOL BAND

JOHN H. CHALKER, Director



The Ponce de Leon High School band is made up of thirty-two members who have had approximately one and one-half years playing in the band. These students have had very limited experience in playing for large groups of people and participated for the first time in the sixth district festival this year.

As director of bands this is Mr. Chalker's first year. He graduated in May of 1950 from Troy State Teachers College, Troy, Ala. Mr. Chalker played in an army band for four and a half years, and in college band for four years. His major instrument is the clarinet. Present status in the high school is teaching public school music and band director.

QUINCY HIGH SCHOOL BAND

H. CARLTON MASON, Director



The Quincy High School Band was organized October 1, 1940 by its present director, Mr. H. Carlton Mason. It is composed of seventy members and competes in Class "CC."

The Band has placed in first division in its class since its organization, in both playing and drilling.

Mr. Jonathan Hill is assistant director of the Band.

KETTERLINUS HIGH SCHOOL BAND (St. Augustine)

HERBERT M. KING, Director



Since its first rehearsal in January of 1946, the Ketterlinus High School Band has made rapid strides toward its goal of becoming a straight first division band in the state band contest. Three months after its organization the band received a first division rating on concert at the 1946 contest held in St. Petersburg. Since that time the Band has won first division ratings at three consecutive Fifth District Band Festivals, the most recent of these accomplishments being made in March, 1950 at the University of Florida.

The Ketterlinus High School Band has been very generous about making public appearances for all local parades, holiday activities, and sports events. The band is justly proud of its unique record of three international radio broadcasts. These broadcasts were beamed to Latin America over "The Voice of America" and originated at the Inter-American Center of Florida in St. Augustine.

ST. CLOUD HIGH SCHOOL BAND

HAROLD A. McDOUGLE, Director

The St. Cloud Band was organized in 1942 by Miss Opal Beville. Miss Charlotte Cooper became its director in the fall of 1946. In the spring of 1949 they received first division in the District and State contests.

Harold A. McDougale became the director in the fall

of 1949. In the District contest of that year the band received all first divisions and placed second in the State. Mr. McDougle taught instrumental music in North Carolina twenty years before coming to Florida in 1947. He is past president of the North Carolina Bandmasters Association and was first trumpeter with the N. C. Symphony Orchestra for two seasons. Mr. McDougle holds an A. B. degree in Music Education from East Carolina Teachers' College.

ST. PETERSBURG SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND

EVERETT L. ROBERTS, Director



In 1948 Mr. Everett L. Roberts became Director of the St. Petersburg High School Band, which numbered fifty-five students at the beginning of the school year. This year, 1951, they have 101 piece uniformed band and a second band of 45.

There have been more than seventy appearances made by members of the St. Petersburg High School Band for each of the past three years. The band is in constant demand by local civic clubs and societies. They participate in numerous local and state functions, such as governor's Inaugural Parade, Orange Bowl Parade, Festival of States Parade, Sarasota Pageant, and all school football games, as well as other athletic events. It is an integral part of the school, community, and state functions.

The St. Petersburg High School Band has participated in all District and State Band Contest-Festivals since 1948.

Mr. Roberts holds the Bachelor of Music and Master of Arts in Education degrees in Administration and Supervision. He is a charter member of the Florida Bandmasters' Association, and is entering his third year as Chairman of District III F. B. A. He is a member of Kiwanis Club and Vice President of St. Petersburg Symphony Society, also member of Pi Kappa Lambda, national honorary music fraternity. He has acted as adjudicator in several of the Districts of F. B. A.

Prior to coming to St. Petersburg, Mr. Roberts was Bandmaster of the Winter Park High School Band, and Instructor of Woodwind and Brass at Rollins College Conservatory. Prior to this time, he was Director of Music in the Avon Park Schools. He spent forty-two months in military service, two years of which was in the Pacific Theatre. Mr. Roberts is Local Contest Chairman for the 1951 Contest-Festival.

SARASOTA HIGH SCHOOL BAND

V. D. STURGIS, Director



The Sarasota High School Band was organized in 1929 by V. D. Sturgis, its present director. Starting with a membership of 28 it grew rapidly and for the past ten years has had a roster of from 65 to 80 members. This year it has its full Class B quota of 80 players. It has its own building on the school campus, containing the large rehearsal room with elevated seating, Director's office, practice and storage rooms, all acoustically treated. Through its di-

rector it was a charter member band of F.B.A. and has never missed a Contest or Inspection. It plays at all football games, both at home and away, school functions, and local events when needed and called upon. It has made two trips to the Orange Bowl and plays for all major Civic Festivals on Florida's West Coast. Its longest trip was to the 1941 Regional in Richmond, Virginia.

V. D. Sturgis was born in Sharpville, Pennsylvania, and educated in schools of Sharon, Pennsylvania. Began study of violin at eight years of age. Among others, studied with T. A. Bellamy, Charles Leibman and Luigi Van Kunitz, also at Freeport Conservatory. Entered the professional field in 1912. Wide experience in theatre and Lyceum work around Chicago and throughout the South and Middle West. First directing in theatres and with road units of D. W. Griffith's "Birth of a Nation" and "Hearts of the World" pictures.

Organized the Sarasota High School Band in 1929 which makes him one of the pioneers in the Florida school band program. Still directs this organization which indicates the longest term of continuous service with one band of any Director now actively engaged in Florida. Charter member and Past President of Florida Bandmasters Association and at present entering his second term as Secretary-Treasurer of Florida Music Educators Association.

SEBRING HIGH SCHOOL BAND

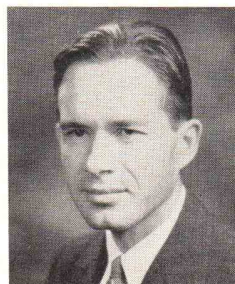
PAUL J. GUSTAT, Director

The Martin County High School Band, Stuart, was organized in 1938 by citizens of the town, and was first directed by James Crowley. Other directors who followed were Bernard Coker, Frances Alderman, Harold Casterton, Rosario Cataldo, and Otto Matousek, who kept the band from becoming disorganized during troublesome times after the war.

The present director, Wendell D. Waters, took over in February, 1946, and under his direction the band has taken all straight first divisions in district contests and has produced a number of outstanding soloists.

The band takes an active part in football shows, basketball games, civic functions in and out of Stuart, and concerts after football season.

Wendell D. Waters is from Worcester, Massachusetts and comes from a family of musicians. He studied cello and trombone at the age of ten, and later received his B. S. from the University of Tampa where he was a member of the band, orchestra, chorus and string trio. He was in the Pacific area as a Naval communications officer during World War II, having been interrupted in his duties as band director at Jasper High School for

that reason. At present he is studying for a Master's degree in Music Education at F. S. U. during the summer sessions.

His main interests include such diverse items as chemistry, composition, arts, acting, and amateur radio. In addition to teaching band, he organized this year, the school's first Music Appreciation class.

The Sulphur Springs School Band was organized during the 1948-49 school year under the direction of its present leader, Mr. Robert Price.

By the end of its first year this band was a solidly established part of school life and of the community which proudly came to its support. Sulphur Springs is one of the outlying communities of Tampa, Fla. and this band feeds in to Hillsborough High School.

Since its birth this Band has been a very popular one in this part of the state, participating in all kinds of school and community activities.

At full strength the Sulphur Springs Band boasts eighty players.

Mr. Price originally is from Kentucky but came to Florida at an early age.

He first became a bandsman in 1936, as solo cornetist in the Tarpon Springs High School Band, which was directed by Paul Cremaschi at that time.

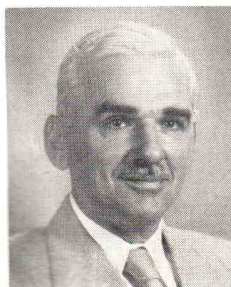
In 1941 he entered the University of Tampa as solo cornetist in the University Band, his education being interrupted there by his call to service in 1943.

Under Mr. Lee's skillful direction, the band has steadily improved. In the five years that Mr. Lee has been here, the band has made four second divisions and one first division in district contests.

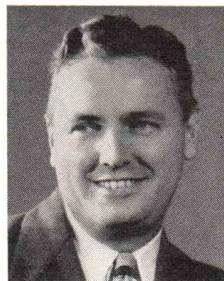
At present the Vero Beach High School Band consists of a 55-piece concert band and a 52-piece drilling band. The band uniforms are red and white.

Robert E. Lee, the director, was born in Atlanta,

Ga., receiving elementary and high school education in the Fulton County school system. Received A.B. degree from Oglethorpe University in 1926. Studied music at the Atlanta Conservatory of Music. PALM BEACH HIGH SCHOOL BAND (West Palm Beach)

HOWARD B. SWYERS, Director



The Palm Beach High School "Wildcat" Band, only seven years old since it was organized in September of 1944 under the direction of Howard B. Swyers, has an interesting record of activities and achievements.

Beginning with some 35 odd students and an array of instruments that would dismay the stoutest hearted — and no uniforms, the Band and its director ploughed through a difficult year of foundation work — bravely making appearances on the football field in white trousers and shirts — and so began the band which now numbers 85 in personnel with 7 majorettes and 12 in the twirling corps, or Twirling Notes as they are called. At present the band owns about \$25,000.00 worth of instruments, uniforms and equipment.

This Band has become an integral part of the football program and made such an impressin on one newspaper columnist that he was moved to write an article on the band that brought him national fame when reprinted in a prominent sports magazine — He was commenting on the fact that some fan had stretched, yawned and said he would go home now the show was over — and the reporter was moved to frustration at the thought of the bands taking over the football spectacle.

Apart from the high stepping majorettes and the smartly drilled group is their symphonic band, which really puts in long hours of hard work. Being a big part of civic life they participate in all community affairs, making some eighty appearances each year.

Mr. Swyers is a graduate of Murray State Teachers College, Murray, Ky., with graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh and Carnegie Tech and also of Murray, where he later became an instructor on the music faculty there. He has been Chairman of District One of the Bandmasters Association for the past three years and is president of the Florida Orchestra Association.

CONNISTON JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND (West Palm Beach)

ROBERT C. SLIKER, Director

After three years of intensive work, the Conniston Band is now playing an important part in the civic life in and around West Palm Beach. The West Palm Beach Sun Dance, the Fiesta Del Sol in Lake Worth, and the Gladiola Festival in Delray are among the annual functions on the agenda for the group.

About the Bands . . .

Conniston entered the District contest for the first time last year and gained a second division rating. Then with full steam ahead they went to work to make State this year. The result was a superior rating in the District Contest and participation in the activities at St. Petersburg. Five soloists from the Band also gained superior ratings in he district this year.

The one big problem of full instrumentation remains and it is hoped that this coming year it will be possible to take care of that situation .

The band is under the direction of Mr. Robert C. Sliker.

NORTHBORO JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND (West Palm Beach)

The Northboro Junior High Band of West Palm Beach was organized two years ago and is well on its way to success. Having entered district contest for the first time this year, they have gained an excellent rating. With the chief criticism being the immaturity of the young players and the lack of instrumentation, the band members are full of expectations as to the future.

The band takes an active part in all school functions and performs at many of the local civic programs. The clever half-time shows at the Junior High School football games have drawn many favorable comments about the band.

The band is surprisingly young, with only one ninth-grader, five eighth-graders, ten seventh-graders and thirteen sixth-graders. Next year it is expected that the band will have grown to at least forty-five members.

Robert C. Sliker, the director of both the Northboro and the Conniston Junior High School Bands of West Palm Beach, is a native of Pennsylvania. After graduating from Greensburg High School in that state, he attended the State Teachers College at Indiana, Pennsylvania, where he was enrolled in Music Education. In 1940 his induction into the armed forces interrupted his schooling for a period of five years. While in the service, Mr. Sliker was a member of the 121st Army Ground Forces Band stationed in Hawaii. While in that organization he played clarinet with the concert band, trombone in the dance band and was Drum Major of the marching band.

Upon his discharge from the service he enrolled at the University of California at Berkeley, where two years later he received his degree.

Mr. Sliker has been with the West Palm Beach Junior High Schools for three years, likes his position very much and is intent upon producing two first rate expectations for these two rapidly developing organizations. The Winter Park High School Band was organized in 1935 by Mr. Gene Sturchio, who, seven years later, was succeeded by Mr. Everett Lee Roberts.

In 1948 Mr. Edgar W. Williams, a former pilot in Naval Aviation, took over the band, and under his direction it participated in the District Festival in 1949 placing first in all three divisions, hence earning the opportunity to participate in the State Festival.

Last year the band was graduated from class "C" and is now officially classified as class "B".

The band, realizing its responsibility as a community organization, is ever ready to provide for the citizens of Winter Park music of high calibre.

Edgar W. Williams, bandmaster of the Winter Park High School Band, received his B. M. at the University of Tampa and his M. M. at the University of Maine. Before becoming a naval pilot in World War II, Mr. Williams served as assistant director at the University of Tampa. Then after the war, he spent several years as Supervisor of Music in the schools of Brewer Township, Maine, and also two years as Director of Music at the Chicago Latin School, after which he came to Winter Park. Mr. Williams is now serving his third year at Winter Park as director of bands in the Junior and Senior High Schools.

WINTER HAVEN HIGH SCHOOL BAND

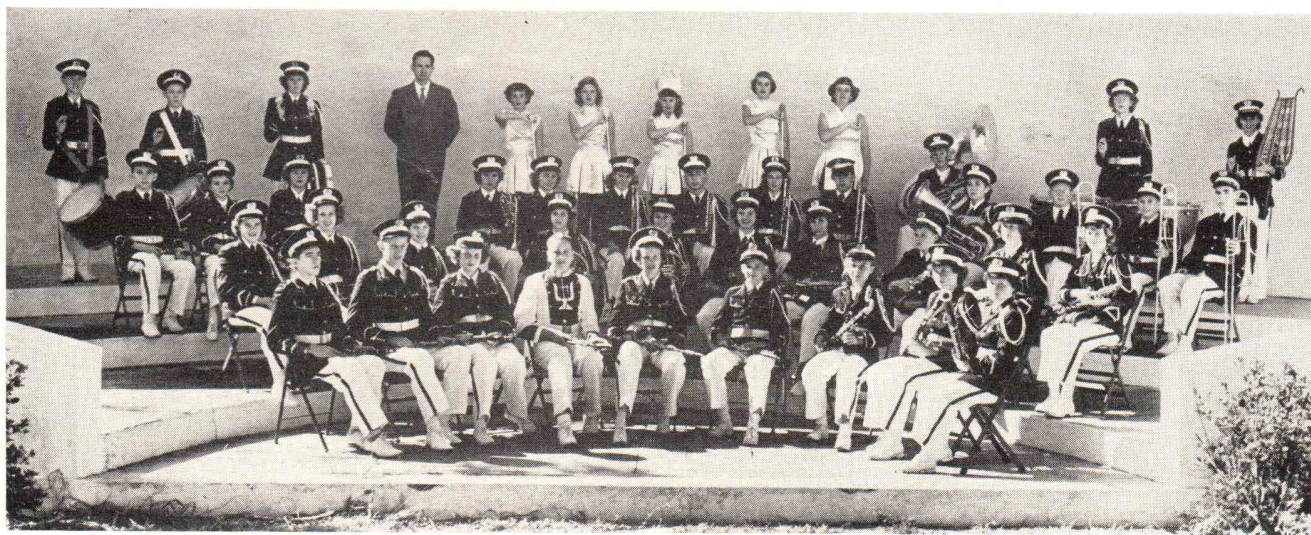
ROY V. WOOD, Director



The Winter Haven High School Band has been organized for about twelve years. The past nine years have been under the direction of Roy V. Wood. During this time they have established themselves as a real part of the community life in Winter Haven. They also make many appearances in all parts of the State. They have been twice to the Orange Bowl as guests of that organization and twice to the Cigar Bowl in Tampa and once to the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando. They regularly appear in Gasparilla, Festival of States, Citrus Exposition, Pageant of Light and Sara DeSota Parades.

They also participate in all District and State festivals sponsored by the F. B. A. and have established a concert series in Winter Haven's New Municipal Auditorium and also a series in High School and Junior High School in outlying Schools of Winter Haven Area.

In addition to the High School Concert Band there is also a second band of seventy-two members and a junior high band of fifty-six and two beginner classes. A total of two hundred and fifty-three students are enrolled in the instrumental music program in Winter Haven Junior Senior High School. This is somewhat of a record in a class "B" high school. It has the unique distinction of probably being the only high school ever to have two bands in different bowl games on New Year's Day when in 1950 the concert band went to the Orange Bowl and the Second Band went to the Cigar Bowl game the same day.
