About the Judges . . .

MILBURN E. CAREY

Milburn E. Carey is Director of bands, Acting Director, School of Fine Arts, professor of music at Phillips University, Enid, Oklahoma. Manager annual Tri-State Festival, 1935.

Master of Music, Bachelor of Science in Public School Music, Bachelor of Music. All were received from the University of Illinois, additional graduate work at Northwestern University, Evanston. Student of A. A. Harding, Raymond F. Dvorak, Mark Hindsley, Glen Bainum, Leo Ruckel, and A. A. Andraud.

Director and guest conductor in states of Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Tennessee, Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Texas, and Florida.

Is author of Methods and Arrangements for Band and Orchestra.

Bandmaster at National Music Camp, Interlochen, Michigan, 1947. Conducted special work at Texas Tech, University of Kansas, Sul Ross College, and Hardin-Simmons University.

Holds membership in American Bandmasters Association, Pi Kappa Lambda, Phi Beta Mu, Phi Mu Alpha-Sinfonia, all are honorary organizations.

CARL CHRISTENSEN

In his forty-three years at South Dakota State College, "Christy" has become the symbol of the State College band.

The beloved band director with his Danish accent and jovial personality is as well known off and on the campus as he is to the band. Since 1911, when Professor Carl Christensen was appointed director, the State College band has grown from twenty-six to its present 130 pieces. Last month, band clinic authorities judged the band as the best in the history of the college.

In 1939, the SDSC band received an invitation to play for the King and Queen of England, who were then visiting in Canada. In Winnipeg, State College won first place for the best marching band. Following the performance in Canada, Christy and his wife sailed to Copenhagen, Denmark, to visit the city of his birth and where, when he was six years old, he started violin lessons and attended Melchior's school for boys. The headmaster was the father of the famous tenor, Lauritz Melchior. In his early teens, Christy and his parents came to America. He went to school in Minnesota, took up the study of band instruments and studied with several teachers on the cornet and violin.

He was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, came to State College in 1906—as teacher of violin and director of the orchestra—appointed director of State College Band in 1911; appointed Head of the Music Dept. in 1918; Membership in American Bandmasters Association in 1933. Christy is the composer of "Nordic Fantasy", "Danish Rhapsody" and numerous marches for band.

HENRY FILLMORE

Henry Fillmore is a band name that is internationally known. He is probably the most prolific writer of band marches since John Philip Sousa. He has been director of the official band of Station WLW and has toured the whole North American continent with the Fillmore Band. He is a past president of the American Bandmaster's Association. He is a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. Henry Fillmore is also President of the Fillmore Music House, Publishers, Cincinnati, Ohio, and has judged many school band festivals.

L. BRUCE JONES

L. Bruce Jones was Director of Bands and Orchestras for seventeen years at the Little Rock Senior High School, Little Rock, Arkansas. He was also Supervisor of Instrumental Music of the Little Rock Public Schools.

Mr. Jones earned a B. S. in Education at the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College, where he directed the Training School Band and was Concertmaster and Assistant Conductor of the College Symphony. He received the degree B. Mus. cum laude from the University of Illinois where he was Concertmaster of the University Symphony, played principal BB-flat bass in the Concert Band, and directed the Second Regimental Band. He was awarded the gold medal for outstanding service in the Concert Band.

Mr. Jones has served widely as adjudicator of state and national contests; and as guest conductor of state and national clinics and of University summer school music groups. He has been a member of the faculty at George Peabody College

for Teachers, Nashville, Tennessee, for four summers, and holds a Master's Degree from that institution.

In 1940 Mr. Jones achieved one of the highest honors that can come to a Band Director when he was elected to membership in the American Bandmasters Association. This organization is made up largely of professional and university bandmasters, and membership is in recognition of outstanding work.

In 1945 Mr. Jones joined the faculty of Louisiana State University as Director of Bands, and Chairman of the Department of Music Education.

DR. WILLIAM D. REVELLI

For more than twenty years, Dr. William D. Revelli, has been one of the guiding forces behind the band movement in America. His vision and ideals are largely responsible for the degree of perfection which the University of Michigan Symphonic Band has attained.

Dr. Revelli's musical training began in 1915 when he entered the Beethoven Music School in St. Louis, Missouri. During the following ten years he studied with such outstanding men as D. Sarli, Leon Samatini, Louis Victor Saar, Felix Borowski, and H. A. VanderCook.

In 1925, Dr. Revelli was appointed music supervisor in the public schools of Hobart, Indiana, where he organized the school's music department while continuing his studies at the VanderCook School of Music in Chicago. In the five years preceding his coming to Michigan, Dr. Revelli conducted the Hobart High School Band to five consecutive national championships, a record generally considered phenomenal in this field.

In the fall of 1935, Dr. Revelli was appointed to his present position as Conductor of the University of Michigan Bands and Head of the Department of Wind Instruments. Today, he is recognized as one of the truly outstanding figures in the concert band world and makes many appearances each year in all parts of the country in the capacity of guest conductor and adjudicator of band festivals.

In addition to his duties at Michigan, Dr. Revelli is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Bandmasters' Association; Honorary National Grand President of Kappa Kappa Psi, honorary college band fraternity; member of Alpha K. Lambda, Phi Mu Alpha, and a host of other musical societies. He is editor of the "World of Music", a band and orchestra method, and serves as an editor of the "Etude Music Magazine" and the "University of Michigan Band Series". He is also a founder and past president of the National University and College Band Conductors' Association.

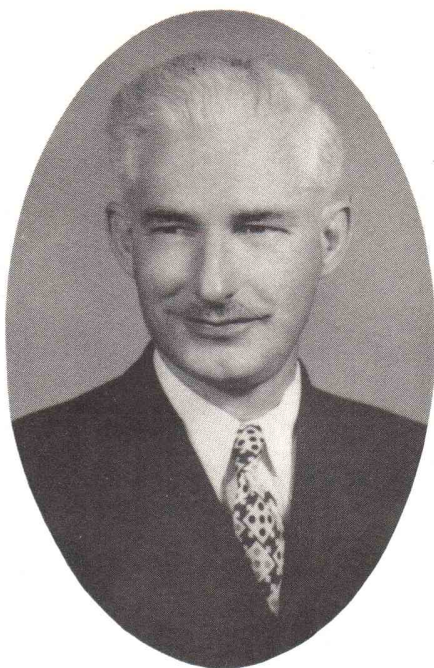
John J. Richards is the present director of the Long Beach Municipal Band and President of the American Bandmasters Association. He has been active in Illinois Musical Circles for many years and has been president of the Illinois Municipal Band Association. He has composed upwards of 300 band compositions which have been widely played. Mr. Richards' career includes ten seasons as conductor of the famed Ringling Brothers Circus Band. He served as supervisor of instrumental music in the public schools and leader of the Municipal Band in Pittsburg, Kansas and held a similar position in Sterling, Illinois for nine years prior to going to Long Beach. Attended the Kansas State Teachers College at Pittsburg and the American Conservatory of Music, Chicago.

PAUL YODER

Paul Yoder returns for the fourth year as one of the judges in the Florida State Band and Orchestra Contest. Mr. Yoder is an arranger and composer of band music with more than 500 published numbers to his credit. The required number in the Class CC competition, "Mountain Majesty", is one of his more recent compositions designed especially for school bands.

Mr. Yoder graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1930. After teaching in the public schools of Illinois and Indiana for several years he established himself as a writer of school band music and, since that time, has devoted all his efforts along this line. Nearly every school and college band has used some of his football band shows, arrangements of current popular songs or original works for band. He has acted as judge and guest conductor throughout the country. He served in an Army Band in World War II and is at present the music editor for the Neil A. Kjos Music Co.

FRED McCALL

University of Miami bandmaster Fred McCall has the outlook of an artist in applying color to a canvas. As coordinator of the Orange Bowl Pageant, he takes a thought for shading into consideration as the uniforms of the participating band units are listed. The size of the group is also an influencing factor in the assignment of a position.

A flare for color has become an integral part of McCall's career as a bandmaster. His professional status has increased with the years since entering public school music. He served as bandmaster and dean of boys for Miami Edison Senior High School; director of Barry College Women's Symphony Orchestra; vice chairman of region eight, National School Music Association; former president, Florida Bandmasters Association; past president of Florida Music Educators Association and member of American Bandmasters Association. Always looking for new and progressive ideas, McCall organized, for the first time last summer, the University of Miami Band Camp. At this camp students from 26 different high schools from all sections of Florida attended. As a member of the American Bandmasters Association, McCall never for a second lets up in his endeavors to keep all interest centered upon progressive measures that will further the development of band music in Florida.

Harold Bachman served in World War I as Bandleader of 116th Engineer Band. This regiment was a part of the 41st (Sunset) Division.

After World War I, he organized and conducted a professional concert band which became widely known as Bachman's Million Dollar Band. This organization traveled throughout the country for about ten years, playing at Florida winter resorts, New Jersey summer resorts, on Chautauqua circuits and at numerous State Fairs and Expositions. He has been a frequent conductor at the famous Grant Park summer concerts in Chicago.

From 1935 until entering the Army in World War II, Bachman was director of the band at the University of Chicago. He also became widely known as advisor on School Music materials for the Educational Music Bureau of Chicago and as Associate Editor and contributor to the Educational Music Magazine.

Bachman was director of the band of Musicians Post 662, Chicago, which won first place in the American Legion Band Contest held during the national convention in Milwaukee in 1941.

At the beginning of World War II he again volunteered for active duty, was commissioned a Captain and assigned as Supervisor of Music in the 6th Service Command. In October, 1943, he was ordered overseas to become supervisor of music with the Special Services Section at Headquarter South Pacific area. He was subsequently given additional duties and was Special Services Officer, in charge of all recreational activities at Bougainville, New Caledonia and Okinawa, successively. His promotion to Lieutenant Colonel was made during the Okinawa campaign. He wears the Asiatic Pacific Theater ribbon with bronze battle stars for the Bougainville and Okinawa campaigns and was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy at Okinawa.

Bachman retired from active duty in 1948 to accept his present position as Director of Bands at the University of Florida.

He is president of the American Bandmasters Association.

The Basis of School Band Competition

"The primary purpose of the school music competition is to serve as a factor in the educational program through the direct values, the inspiration, examples and incentives afforded the young people and their teachers and directors. Therefore, adjudication of participants should be regarded as a means for evaluating the progress and musical status of the group or the individual, rather than a mere comparison with other participants to secure an expert opinion of which is best, which is second best, and so on.

"This has been made possible by abandoning the 'ranking' or 'place' method of adjudication in favor of the now widely used rating plan, adopted by the National School Band Association some years ago."

Band participating in the Florida State Contest are classified according to the total enrollment of the school represented and the age of the band. Adjudication against a standard, as determined by competent judges, in each class, determines the accomplishment of the organization or the individual.

Depending upon the rating received in each division of competition, bands are placed in one of three divisions, 1st, 2nd or 3rd. In addition, the judges, on each of their adjudication sheets for each band or individual competing, will make constructive criticism and helpful suggestions for improvement.

Bands placing in first division, in each class, in the State Contest, are eligible for competition in the regional contests of the National School Band Association.

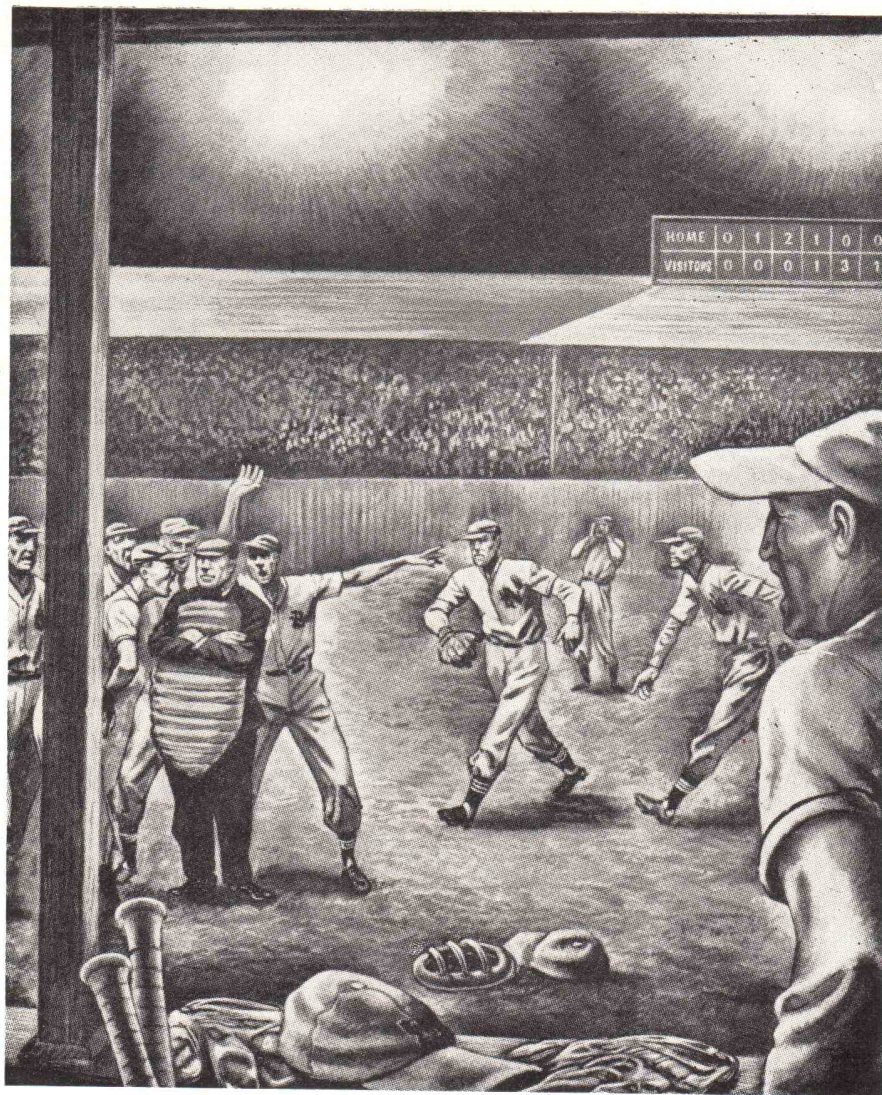

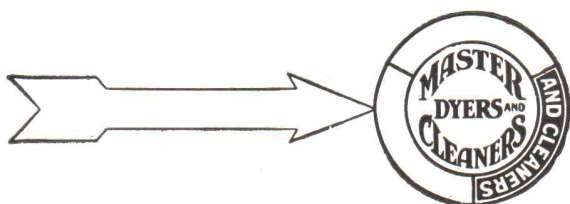

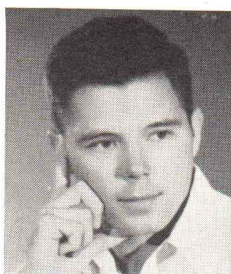
In sixteen months the Chipley

and Peabody Auditorium. Christmas holiday activities include the Shrine Beach Bowl football game, and the Gator Bowl game in Jacksonville. A number of the band members have been awarded scholarships by outstanding universities and several have become professional musicians. Much of the success of the band may be traced to the very active Seabreeze Band Association.

Carl M. Hulbert, Director, a native New Yorker, came to Florida at an early age. Upon completion of high school he entered the professional music field playing his principal instrument, the cornet. Later, he

In addition to scientific tuning devices such as the stroboscope, record-making equipment, and its own building, the band travels in its specially equipped buses. These buses have every modern convenience for the comfort of the travelers including a small hospital. Built-in bunks have inner-spring mattresses to make the sick comfortable when the band is enroute.

This year, the DeLand High School Band made its sixth annual tour, playing in Lake City, December 5; Statesboro, Georgia, December 6; Douglas, Georgia, December 7; Cairo, Georgia, December 8; Pensacola, December 9; and returning to DeLand on December 10.

Traveling some eleven hundred miles the group gave twelve regular performances and about four special performances during the week it was away from school.

John J. Heney, director of the DeLand High School Band, has Bachelor of Music, Master of Arts degrees. Is a member of the American Bandmasters Association; organizer and President for three years of the Florida Bandmasters Association; Honorary Life President of the Florida Bandmasters Association; composer of 23

published compositions; author of a widely used treatise on the art of drumming; soloist with the late John Philip Sousa and his famous band; contributor, by request, to leading music trade magazines and papers; percussion reviewer of the Music Educators Journal; member of the National School Band Association, and a former member of the executive committee of that group; conductor of the Stetson University Band at DeLand, Florida, for six years; member of the instructional staff of that school in the capacity of classroom lecturer on music subjects; honorary guest conductor of some of the country's leading professional bands; member of the adjudicatory staff of the American Bandmasters Association and the National School Band Association.

Heney is recognized as an authority on rhythm and percussion instruments. He is a former member of the executive committee of the National College and University Bandmasters Association; former chairman of the 8th Region (1939-1940); former vice-chairman of the National School Band Association (1937-1942); Director of Massed Bands (1,200 players) and group singing (37,000 people) at Atlanta Constitution Music Festival, Grant Field, Atlanta, Georgia, 1940.

He was awarded "First Citizen" Cup for meritorious service by the City of DeLand, Florida, 1939. Former Director Daytona Beach, Florida, Municipal Band; Former Secretary of Florida Bandmasters Association; Member of Board of Directors, American Bandmasters Association, and Musician 1/C United States Navy, 3 years, World War II.

Fort Lauderdale High School Band

The Fort Lauderdale High School Band, reorganized twelve years ago under its present director, Harry McComb, has consistently received superior ratings in concert, marching and sightreading from the nation's outstanding band judges.

Mr. McComb, a native of Detroit, was graduated with honors in music from Cass Technical High School in that city and attended the University of Miami on a four-year music scholarship award. 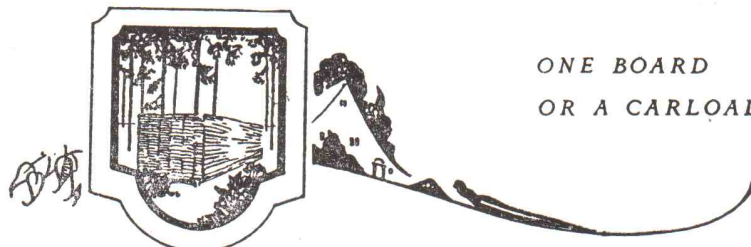

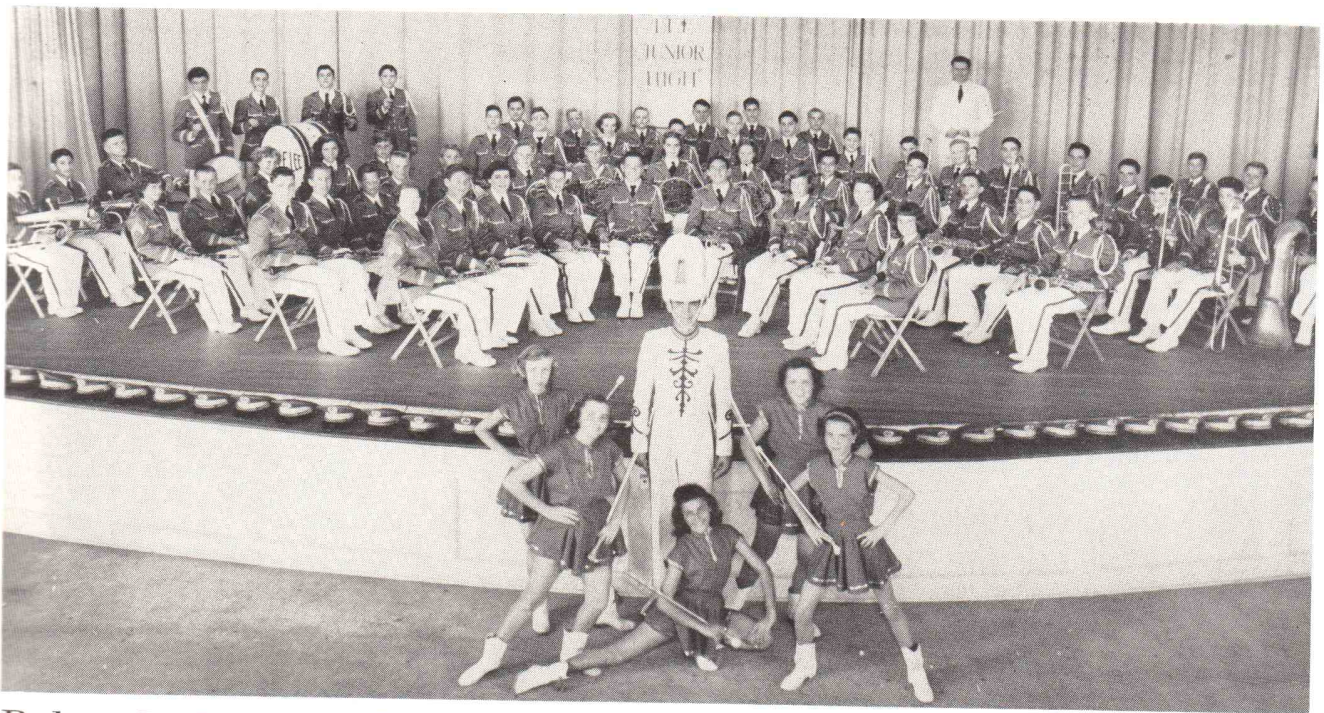
this year.

Andrew Jackson Senior High School Orchestra (Jax)

MRS. JESSIE J. deVORE, Director

The Andrew Jackson High School Orchestra, under the direction of Mrs. Jessie J. deVore, has been organized and has performed for school and civic affairs for a number of years. It is being associated for the first time with the state program this year, having entered the fifth district contest in Class D. At the present time, the Jackson Orchestra is the only high school orchestra in the fifth district.

Mrs. deVore has been connected with the public schools of Jacksonville for some years, devoting her time mostly to developing strings in the grades and Junior and Senior High School. She had the distinction of having had the first grade school orchestra in the state of Florida.

Claude O. "Doc" Hulick, Director of Music at Robert E. Lee High School, Jacksonville, is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Champaign, with a B. S. in Education, a B. S. in Public School Music, and is a member of Phi Mu Alpha-Sinfonia.

While attending the University he played Solo Cornet and First Trumpet in the Concert Band, being admitted in his Freshman year to this famous University of Illinois Band, under the direction of the equally famous Dr. A. A. Harding, and when he graduated was awarded a Gold Medal for having played with the Concert Band four years. He also played First Trumpet in the University Symphony Orchestra and was a member of the University Men's Glee Club.

His College and Pre-Med education was interrupted, ten years, to play professionally in St. Louis. Returning to the University he transferred to the Music School, from which he graduated, then on to Illinois Wesleyan University to receive his Master of Music.

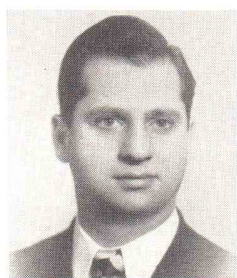

is a graduate of Sherwood Music School in Chicago and has had additional college training at the University of Wisconsin and the University of Iowa. During World War 1 he played in the band on the U.S.S. Flagship Pennsylvania. He has played concert seasons with the Canadian Kilties Band, the Chicago Band, and four concert tours with the Sousa Band. He was supervisor of instrumental music in the LaGrange County, Indiana, Schools for seven years—supervisor of music in the Waupun, Wisconsin Schools for seven years—and has been supervisor of music in the Lake Wales Schools for nine years. He has been director of the Band Division of the Summer Music Camp at Florida State University for eight years.

When in Indiana Mr. Kraushaar's groups entered the various contests. During the seven years that he was in Wisconsin, the Waupun Band and Orchestra played in thirty-one district, state, and national contests. The Lake Wales Band has entered all the various State Contests since it was organized and in all the State Inspections during the war.

Little River Jr. (Miami) High School Band

Little River Junior High School Band, Miami, Florida, directed by Herbert Blinn, is only three years old this year. In this short period the band has appeared for many civic organizations in Miami and the surrounding communities. DOROTHY L. PARKER, Director

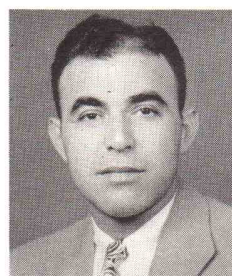
The Melbourne Band participated in National and State Contests 1938-41, and was consistently awarded a First Division rating. From 1941-45 the band was at a standstill, and dropped in enrollment from 90 pieces to 7 pieces. The band is now in its fifth year of reorgan-

ization, with a concert band of 65 and a marching band of 60. The band is rehearsed and drilled by Dorothy L. Parker, who reorganized the band in 1945-46. The Melbourne Band had the privilege of representing the Florida State Lions in New York the summer of 1945 as the only official Florida Band, and this year took part in the Annual Orange Bowl Parade. The band has consistently won 1st Division in Concert and Drill at District contests since 1947, and 1st division in drill at State contests and Two plus average in concert.

The Director, Dorothy L. Parker, is a graduate of the University of Illinois. She taught in Missouri; was a member of the Missouri State Board of Music; Director of instrumental music in Shelby, N. C., supervising bands in seven grade schools, Junior and Senior High; Secretary of the North Carolina Bandmasters Association; Dean of Girls and Instructor of Music at Transylvania Camp, Brevard, N. C. This past summer she was Instructor and Dean of Girls at Miami University Band Camp, and this summer will serve in the same capacity at the University, including serving as Assistant Camp Director.

Ada Merritt Jr. (Miami) High School Band

JESSE BLUM, Director



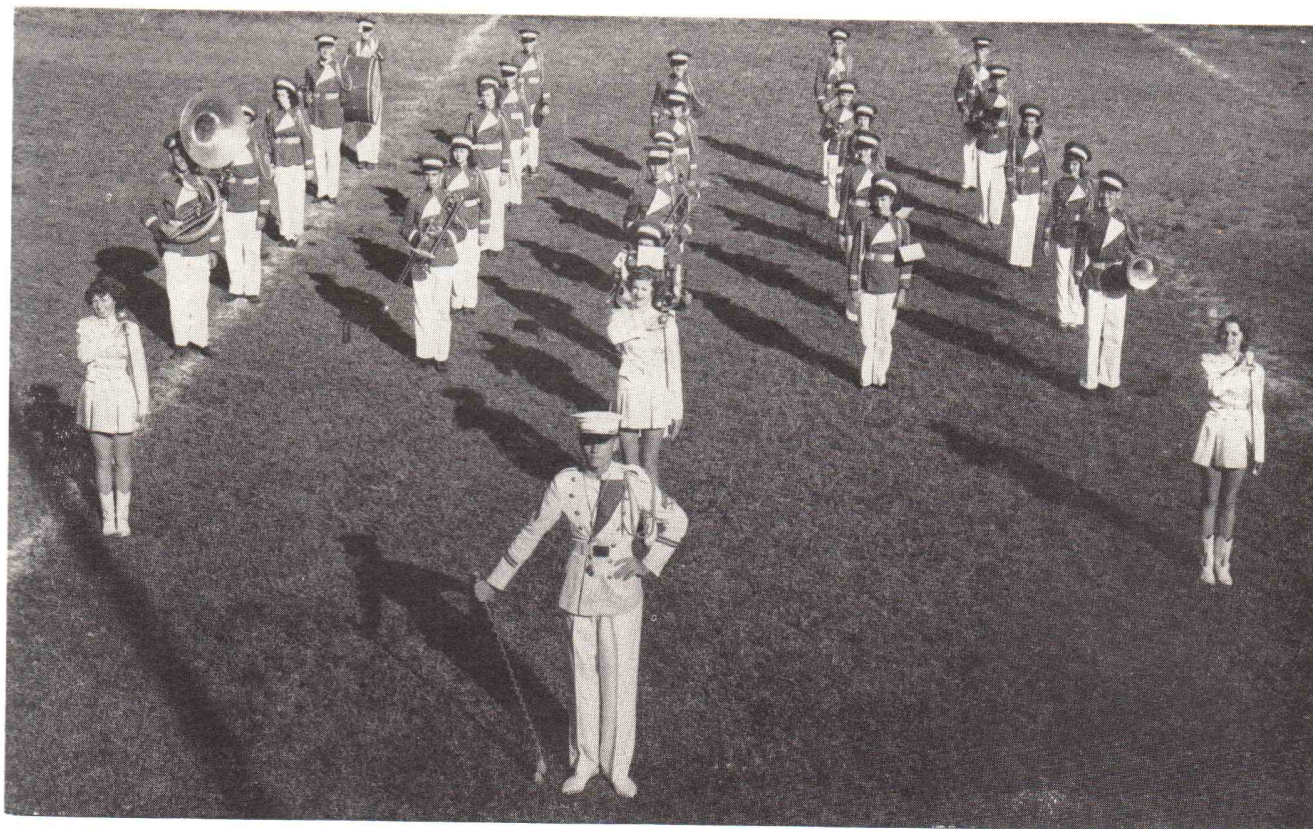
The Ada Merritt Jr. High School Band, now in its sixth year, enters this year's competition with a full symphonic instrumentation. The instrumental music department numbers 150 students, 72 of whom are in the Concert Band. This group has taken part in various out of school activities, among them the Miami Herald Annual Spelling Bee, Hialeah Silver Jubilee, Junior

Chamber of Commerce "Get Out the Vote" Parade, Coral Gables Hallowe'en Carnival and the Miami Industrial Exposition at Dinner Key.

There are four band classes at Ada Merritt which meet daily in regularly scheduled periods of the school day. Beginning students are recruited in the seventh grade and are given instruction from "scratch" in heterogeneous groupings. Advanced students from the above band help in instructing some beginners before and after school hours where this is advisable.

Jesse Blum, the director, holds B. S. and M. A. degrees in Music Education from New York University, where he studied choral music with the late Hollis Dam and instrumental music with the late John Warren Erb. He has served at various times as chairman of the junior high vocal and instrumental group and this year directed the organization of the Dade County Jr. High Clinic Band. He has been a strong exponent of the fact that a junior high band should be an organization capable of fairly artistic performance and not merely a training group for senior high work. He holds that early adolescents are very much in need of group expression of all sorts. Music groups in the junior high schools meet this need admirably.

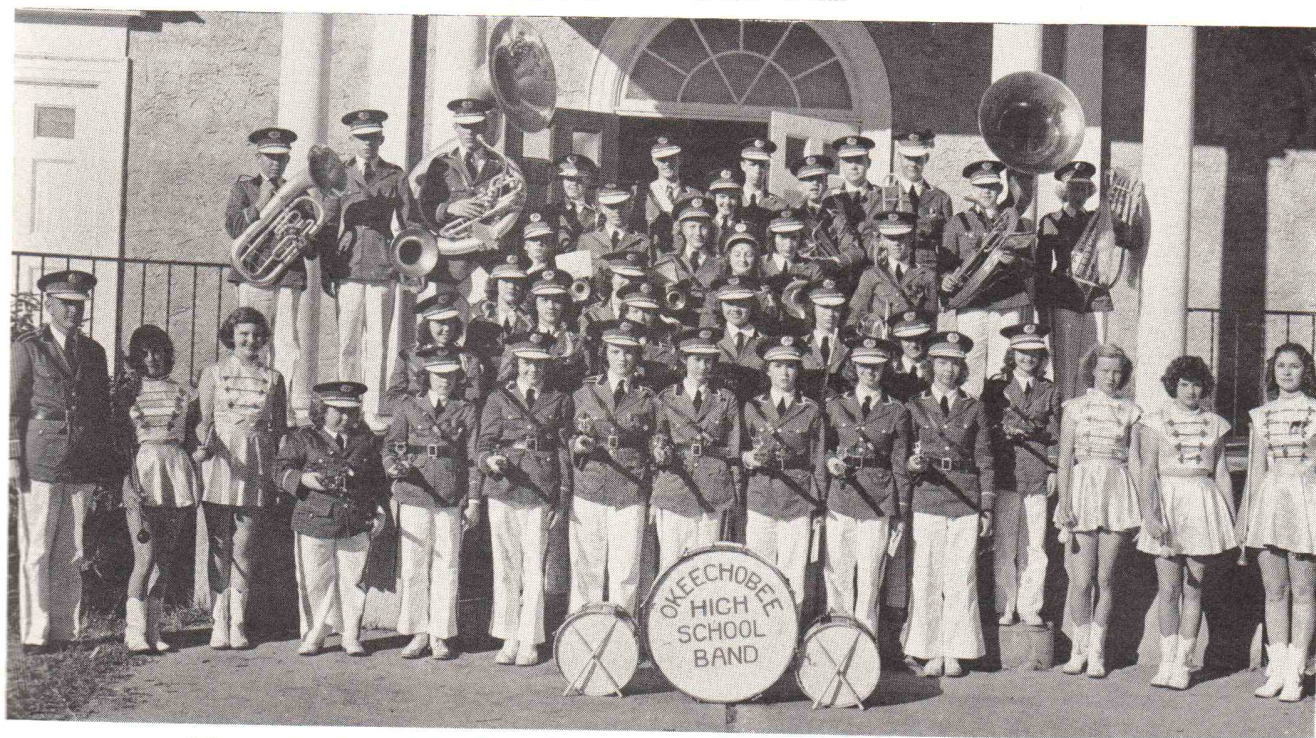

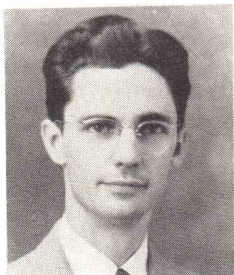

J. HOWARD REYNOLDS, Director



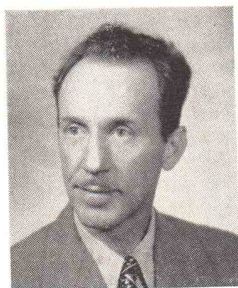
The Miami Edison Bands for many years have been considered among the finest in the State of Florida. Under the leadership of Fred McCall, now conductor of the University of Miami Band, the Instrumental Music Department grew to its present high standard.

The activities of the bands for the 1949-50 season, have, as always, included a full schedule of concerts, parades, and other performances. The Marching Band, over 120 strong this year, not only performed at all home football games, participated in many parades, but in addition made a four day trip to Havana, Cuba for the Annual February Fiesta in that City. The concert unit is composed of some 80 members of the Marching Band. This group has played for numerous civic organizations, given concerts in Bayfront Park Bandshell and presented formal programs in the High School Auditorium. It is a policy of the Concert Band to perform the finest of band literature and orchestral transcriptions so that the public may be made familiar with the ever growing movement of serious band music.

J. Howard Reynolds is director of Instrumental Music at Miami Edison Senior High School. Mr. Reynolds received his Bachelor of Music Degree at Louisiana State University as a student of L. Bruce Jones and his Master of Music Education degree at the University of Michigan where he studied with William D. Revelli.

Miami Jackson High School Band

The Miami Jackson Band is one of the most active bands in Florida.

Last year the band participated in the Orange Bowl parade and pageant; Tampa and Ft. Myers parades; staged the half-time Christmas extravaganza for the Shrine All-Star football game; attended the Havana Carnival as guests of the Cuban government, and was one of three Florida bands to be sent by the Florida Lions to their

international convention in New York City.

The Miami Jackson Band takes an active part in all district and state contests.

Director Stephan Jones, A.B., B.S., in Music Education, Phi Mu Alpha, National Sinfonia, Formerly of the Columbus, Ohio, schools, is a graduate of Ohio State University.

He assumed the direction of the Miami Jackson Band in September, 1944.

In the Fall of 1944 Jones originated and introduced to Miami football and parade fans the Dancing Major-ettes—a modern style of unison dancing and twirling

routes. This popular Jackson band unit now has the copyright name of Baton Ballet.

Jones stages the half-time extravaganzas of the Shrine charity college all-star football games, and his band and baton ballet is a colorful part of the popular Miami Herald's annual football clinic.

Robert E. Lee Jr. (Miami) High School Band

The Robert E. Lee instrumental program was started in 1924 by Mrs. Anne Ellis Fowler, the present Mrs. Anne Ellis Roberts. She was succeeded by Miss Brownie Haston. In 1928, Mrs. Madeline Crandall took full charge of all music in Robert E. Lee. The orchestra has been in organization since 1924. In 1946 Mr. Don Terry, speech teacher, organized a part time band. Due to the

rapid growth of the instrumental program in Dade County, it soon became apparent that a full time instrumental instructor was needed. In 1948, the present director of instrumental music, Mr. Marvin C. Mockabee, took charge of all instrumental instruction while Mrs. Madeline Crandall took charge of all general music and chorus. The Band has entered the District I Band Contest for the past two years.

Mr. Marvin C. Mockabee, the Director of the Robert E. Lee Junior High School Band, is a product of the Dade County School System. He first attended Central Elementary School, then transferred to Citrus Grove Elementary and Junior High School. At Miami Senior High School he took band and orchestra under Mr. Otto Steinmetz and Mr. Al G. Wright. He won 1st Division honors in both State and National Solo Contests on the Baritone Horn. At the University of Miami he played under the baton of Mr. Walter Schaefer and Mr. Arthur Pryor, Sr. After serving 4 years in the Navy during World War II he attended the University of Florida. Then he taught Band in Dunellon, Florida, Marion County, after which he returned to Miami and received his degree of Bachelor of Music at the University of Miami. He accepted a position of Instrumental Instructor at Robert E. Lee Junior High School in 1948.

Miami High School "Stingaree" Band

The "Stingaree" band at Miami High School is the school's second band. It is composed of some one hundred high school musicians who are, for the most part, sophomores, that is in their first year of school at Miami Senior High. These students are awaiting vacancies in the concert band and are moved into the senior organization when such vacancies occur.

The "Stingaree" band operates as a separate unit and plays for assemblies and participates in concerns as a separate unit. The "Stingaree" band marches with the concert band at football games and parades. The combined senior concert band and "Stingaree" band makes up a large marching band of some 160 to 180 pieces.

Members in the "Stingaree" band are issued both a

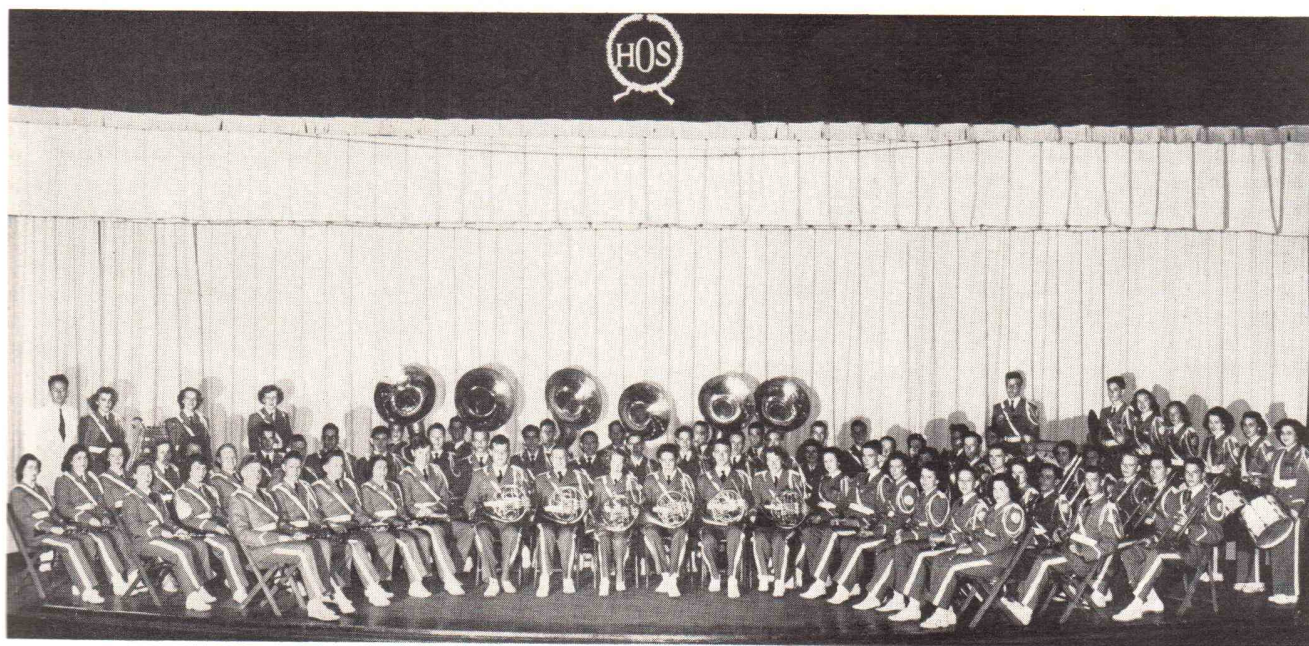

marching band uniform, which is identical to the Senior band's uniform, and also their own "Stingaree" uniform.

The Miami High School "Stingaree" band is entering the District Band Contest for the first time this year. This band will enter in a special class designated at A-2. In this class the "Stingaree" band, or second band, must play class B music, must participate in sight reading events, and must participate in the marching event. Second band may not participate in the State Contest under present regulations.

Miami Senior High School Band

AL G. WRIGHT, Director



The Miami Senior High School Concert Band, directed by Al G. Wright, has achieved an impressive record of activities and accomplishments during the past decade.

With its auxiliary organizations, this Band numbers around two hundred and fifty students. Of the total, one hundred and fifty are bandmen, the remaining students being members of

marching units — Majorettes, Twirlers, Swiss Flag Swingers, and United Nations Color Guard.

The hundred and fifty musicians called the "Marching Band" are divided into two smaller groups, a "Concert Band" and a "Stingaree Band" for the purpose of facilitating rehearsal and administrative problems.

The Miami High Band has been and is a regular participant in District, State and Regional (National) Band Contests and in them has accumulated an impressive total of first division (superior) ratings in Concert, Marching, and Sightreading events. Playing for nationally recognized band judges including Henry Fillmore (President, American Bandmasters Association); Glenn Cliff Bainum (Northwestern University); William Revelli (University of Michigan); A. A. Harding (Illinois) and the composer Paul Yoder: the Miami High Band has received noteworthy comments and enthusiastic acclaim.

The Miami High Band regularly participates in community and educational activities in cities throughout the State of Florida and is in constant demand for appearances in home-town Miami.

The Miami Senior High School Band has pioneered many first in half-time shows for Miami football fans. In 1939 they introduced the art of Swiss Flag Swinging. In 1940 their Black Light Show received nation-wide attention. 1941 brought on Miami's first large Majorette Corps when the Miami High Majorettes took the field. 1943 introduced Miami's first between-halves musical pageant which Miami High called "Salute to the United Nations."

These half-time pageants have grown into musical extravaganzas that have attracted nation-wide attention. Using members of the Miami High Orchestra, the large Chorus, and sometimes the Cheerleaders, these extravaganzas employ between four and six hundred students—all in colorful costumes. Each game sees a different show. Each show is built around a central theme. "Salute to Mexico", "Football Fantasy", "Yuletide Bells",

"Western Rhapsody", and "Cuban Carnival" are some of the titles used which will indicate the scope of these extravaganzas. Folk dancing and singing are introduced along with fireworks and electrical effects.

Hailed as one of the snappiest bands in the south for its marching maneuvers and throughout the country as a superb concert group it is dear to the hearts of Miamians as Miami's "Million Dollar" High School Band.

Al Wright has served in the capacity of Director of Music at Miami Senior High School for the past eleven years where he conducts the Band and Orchestra.

He studied French Horn with James Stagliano, Piano, and Theory with Franklin Harris, and conducting under Arnold Volpe. He received his undergraduate degree from the University of Miami in 1937 with a major in Public School Music, and recently received a M. Ed. degree with a major in Supervision and Administration. He has served as visiting lecturer at Stetson University and the University of Miami; on the Summer Music Camp faculty at Florida State University and the University of Miami; as guest conductor of the Kansas University Band, the Stetson Summer Camp Chorus, the University of Miami Band, and the University of Michigan Band.

Mr. Wright is a past president of the Florida Bandmasters Association and also a past president of the Florida Orchestra Association. He is now vice-president of the Florida Musical Education Association.

He is now a member of the executive board of the National School Band, Orchestra and Vocal Association, SMEC. In the summer of 1948 he was invited to serve in the preparation of the Florida State Course of Study for Music.

He is pageant director for the annual Miami Kiwanis charity football game and designed and directed the original pageants for the Mahi Shrine Christmas game. He has played horn professionally with the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra and the Miami Opera Guild.

Mr. Wright has served as an adjudicator in nearly all of Florida's six district Band, Orchestra, and Solo Contests. He is a charter member of the Beta Tau Chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, National honorary music fraternity.

Mr. Wright is a firm believer in the social importance of music training. He states his philosophy in the following words "I believe that school band and orchestra participation is one of our finest means for character education."

In the Spring of 1949 Mr. Wright was unanimously elected to full membership in the American Bandmasters Association.

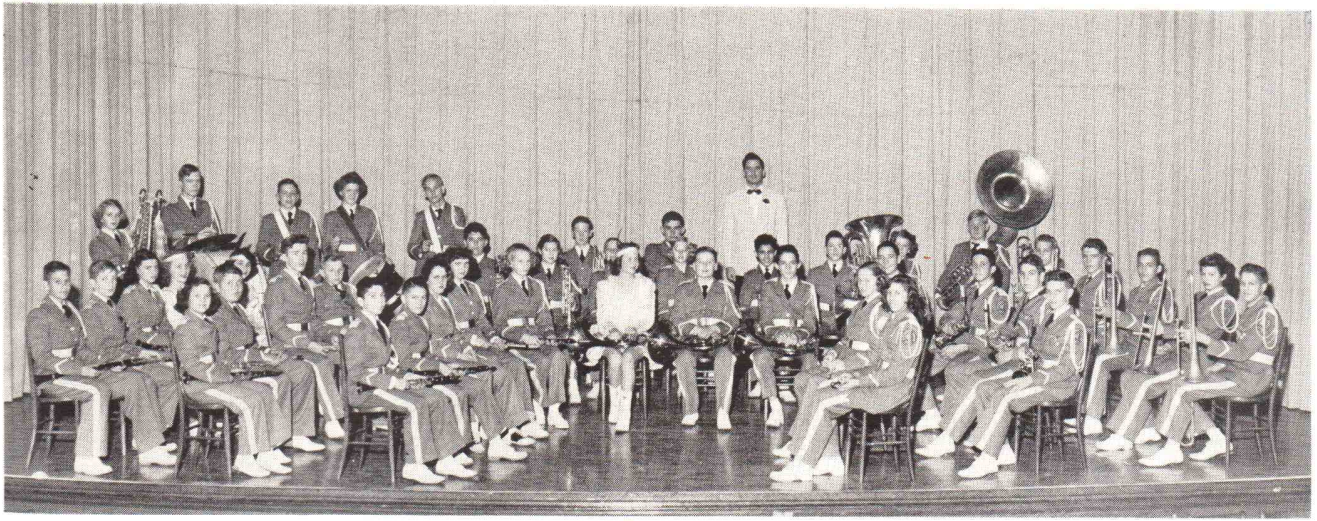
Miami Senior High School Orchestra

United Nations Color Guard. Carrying thirty-six or more flags of the United Nations countries, they make a colorful addition to the Marching Band. Miami High's marching orchestra may not be unique among school orchestras but it certainly is a new approach in attempts being made by directors all over the country to solve that old haunt the "String Problem".

Made up of eighty members, this Miami High Orchestra has its own officers who work with members of the Band Council and the Director. These officers form an active and successful student governing group within the orchestra. The council plans the orchestra's many activities, sets up standards of dress and behavior and in many ways has helped build the Orchestra into a fine playing and well behaved group of young men and women.

Graduates from this orchestra readily find places in university symphonies over the country. Recently three were awarded scholarships in the symphony at the Eastman School of Music. The University of Miami Symphony roster reveals a large number of Miami High School Orchestra graduates and players on its list. One-fourth of the players in the Miami Opera Guild Orchestra are former members of the Miami High Orchestra.

This Orchestra has a full symphonic instrumentation including a large string section and harps.



Mrs. Ditsler was appointed to the position of String Teacher and associate director of the Miami High School Orchestra in February, 1947. Since that time a very active growth and interest has become evident in string music at the school. She organized courses in Music Theory and Music Appreciation, both of which quickly became popular with the students.

Before coming to Miami High Mrs. Ditsler taught privately for over ten years—organized own trio and played professionally as violin soloist and also as a member of a number of music organizations. Concertmaster of Miami Concert Orchestra—Firestone Broadcasts under Howard Barlow—Miami Opera Orchestra, and University of Miami Symphony Orchestra, of which she is a charter member, playing with the symphony until 1947.

Mrs. Ditsler received B. M. Degree in Public School Music—magna cum laude—from University of Miami. She studied violin with Dr. Arnold Volpe and Dr. Joel Belov—the former an artist pupil of Leopold Auer, the latter a pupil of Carl Flesch—Theory and Harmony with Dr. W. S. Sterling, formerly of Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

She is also a member of Sigma Alpha Lota, national honoratory music organization.

At present she is playing with Barry Little Symphony Orchestra.

In the Spring of 1949, this Orchestra was selected to play a concert for the Southern Music Educators Conference at the biennial meeting held in Tampa.

In January, 1950, the Miami High Orchestra was selected to play for the Ostfeld Ballet in a Miami presentation.

A "Stingaree Orchestra", a second orchestra, was

organized at Miami High in the Fall of 1949 and now numbers some forty players. Vacancies in the Senior Orchestra are filled from the "Stingaree" group.

Jefferson County (Monticello) High School Band

The Jefferson County High School Band was organized in 1940. The directors there have been quite diversified. Among those having a brief stay in Monticello have been Bandmaster Koscielnny, who organized this band, followed in turn by Miss Margie Stump, Miss Milly Dickert, Miss Martha Crandall, and Mr. Henry J. Fastoff. The band is now directed by Mr. George Dunnivant, who has spent the greater part of of his life in the U. S. Navy, serving continuously from 1919 until March 1946. He took over the band here in 1946.

The band, in addition to playing for all football games, participates in all school and community activities.

New Smyrna Beach High School Band

The New Smyrna Beach High School Band was under the direction of the late Mrs. Leota Burroughs for many years until her death in December, 1947. Mrs. Mildred Cowen finished out the school year as band director.

In 1948 Mr. Charles J. Parker came to New Smyrna Beach from Rock Springs, Wyoming, where he had been band director for six years.

There is much interest in the band at present and it shows signs of growth and improvement. This is the first time in many years that New Smyrna Beach has entered a band contest.

Okeechobee High School Band

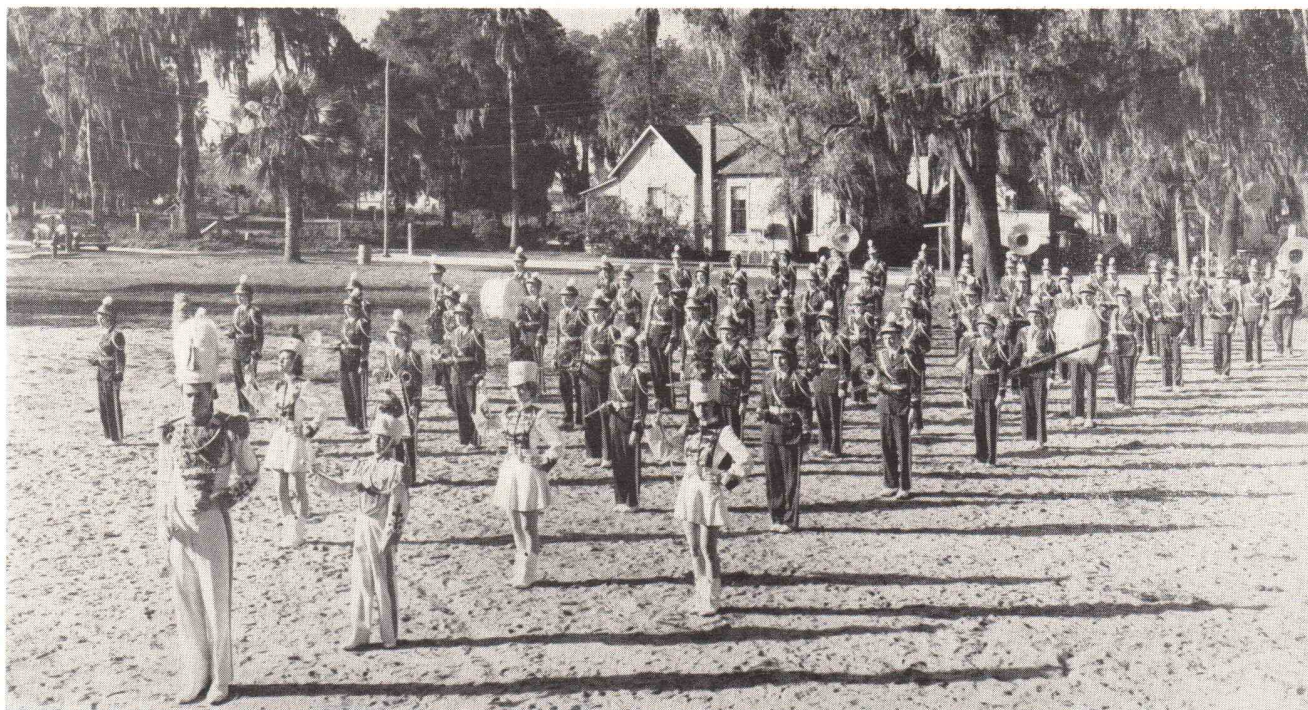
BURGOYNE MOORES, Director



In February of 1945, C. M. Williams, principal of the Okeechobee High School, conceived the idea of organizing a band. M. O. Kent, then employed as a full-time Math teacher, was asked to direct the work, while Mr. Williams undertook the financing. Mr. Kent personally owned six horns, which he made available; these, plus a set of drums owned by the school, and an E-flat bass donated by Mrs. T. H. Nix, became the first Okeechobee band. Rehearsals were held at noon in a rear corner of the auditorium.

A summer band program was instituted, and progress became more rapid than ever. By fall, just six months after its conception, the band membership had

risen to 34. The P.T.A. bought metal folding chairs to replace the slatted benches used in rehearsals. A used sousaphone was purchased from the Sebring band. Seats were removed from the front of the auditorium to make way for rehearsal room. One of the small rooms in the rear of the auditorium became vacant, and the band moved in, on the principal of "squatters rights". They used the room for storing instruments. Before that each player kept up with his instrument as best he could.

In the following spring, 1945, the band played at a political rally and collections were taken with which to begin a uniform fund. Donations were generous, and the band returned to town with approximately \$400.

The next year the band continued under the impetus it had received during the past year, and in the spring of 1947, gave a concert and finished paying for the uniforms. The uniforms were first worn at a concert in the spring of '47, and it is doubtful if the band ever experienced a prouder moment.

In the fall of '49, the band was placed under the direction of Mr. Burgoyne Moores, band director from Richmond, Kentucky. A new french horn, bass drum, and belle lyre were added to the instrumentation. A series of concerts were played at the bandshell in the park for the enjoyment of the public.

At the district festival in Sarasota on March 11, '50, the band made a I division in concert which entitles it to go to the State Band Festival in Miami, May 4, 5, and 6; and a II division in sightreading and marching.

This is Mr. Moores' first year as a band director in the state of Florida. Before coming here he was band director at Lee County High School, Black Star High School and Wallins High School in the state of Kentucky. He received his degree at Eastern Kentucky State College. As a student in high school he participated in the band and orchestra. He played solo cornet in the Seventh Armd. Div. Band and the Twentieth Armd. Div. Band. Moores played as a professional three years prior to entering the teaching field. His chief field is band, however, along with teaching public school music and glee club.

Cherokee Junior (Orlando) High School Band

EDWARD W. ROSEVEAR, Director



Bands were first organized in Orlando in 1939. Before September, 1945, when C. W. Rumpf became part-time director, instrumental music at Cherokee Junior High was confined to occasional school activities and the more advanced players were used in the Orlando Senior High School Band. Mr. Rumpf developed the band from a membership of nine to an organization of more than forty. The band received first division ratings in 1947, 1948 and 1950.

This year under the full-time direction of Edward W. Rosevear, seventy-five students are participating in

the instrumental music program at Cherokee. An advanced band of forty-five participates in assembly programs, parades, football games and concerts. An ultra modern music building with a complete band section of rehearsal studios, practice rooms and offices houses the band.

Orlando Senior High School Band

C. W. RUMPF, Director



The Orlando High School Band was organized in July, 1939, by Edward J. Heney. In August, 1940. Mr. Heney was succeeded by Harry L. Parker under whose capable leadership the department grew and continued to maintain the fine record started by Mr. Heney. In the fall of 1944, Mr. Parker became engaged in war work and was succeeded by Ernest F. Pechin. Many students

learned much band music under the capable baton of this much-loved musician, who passed away in the fall of 1946.

Successors to the foregoing gentlemen followed in rapid order. Robert McEmber very successfully directed the band during the 1946-47 season. J. R. Marcellus succeeded Mr. McEmber and was in turn succeeded by G. Gordon Ritter. C. W. Rumpf, formerly director of the Cherokee and Memorial Junior High School Bands, became the director of the Orlando Senior High School Band in 1949.

The organization is very active in football games, parades, concerts, and assembly programs.

C. W. Rumpf, director of the Orlando Senior High School Band, was born in Langhorne, Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of Temple University, where he received both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

Mr. Rumpf has had the pleasure and privilege of studying with such well known teachers as George F. Bayle, pianist and composer and member of the Julliard School of Music faculty, Henry Albert Lang, composer; and Ferdinand Paul of the famous Sousa Band.

Prior to coming to Florida, Mr. Rumpf taught in Pennsylvania and Delaware schools. This is his first year as director of the Senior High Band in Orlando. Four years were spent by him in the two Junior High Schools of that city: Cherokee and Memorial.

Pahokee High School Band

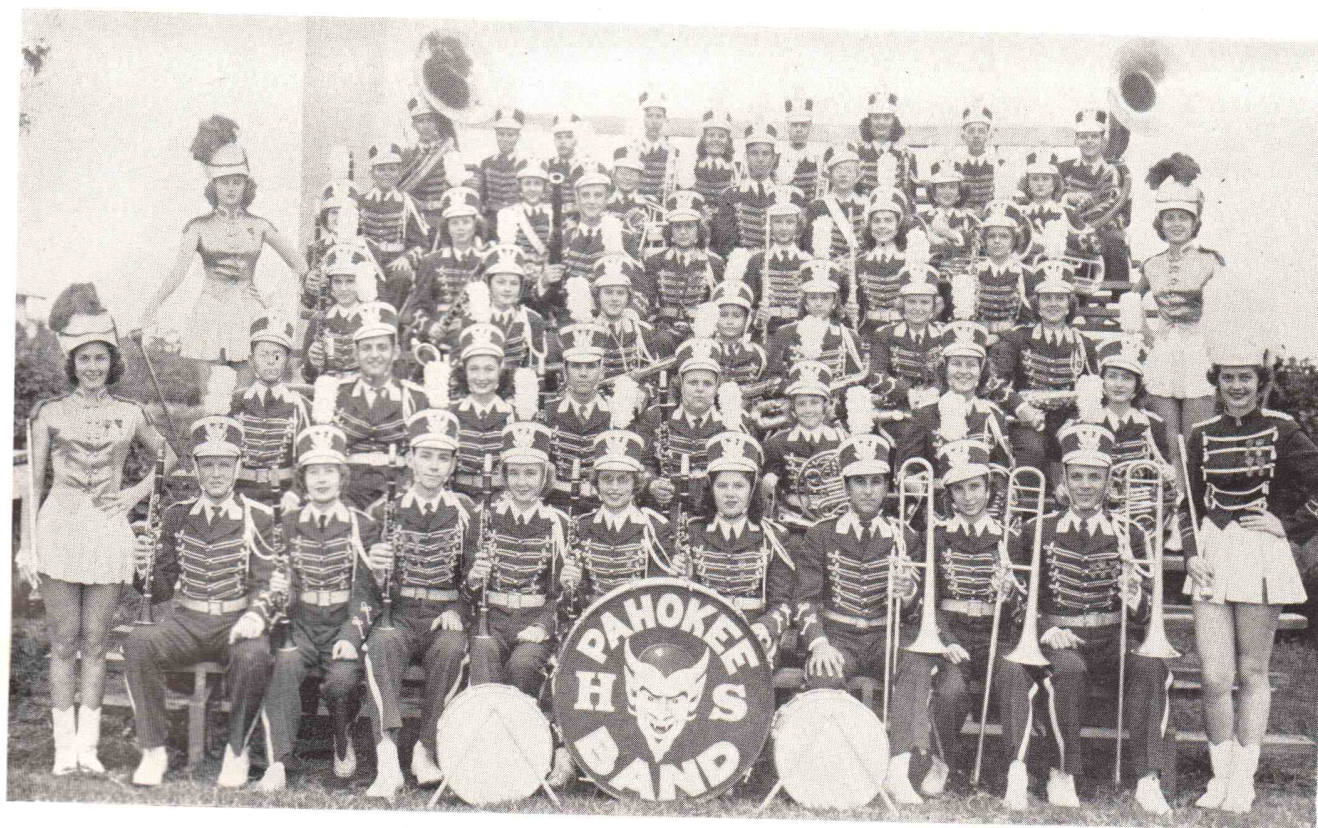
ROBERT O. LAMPI, Director

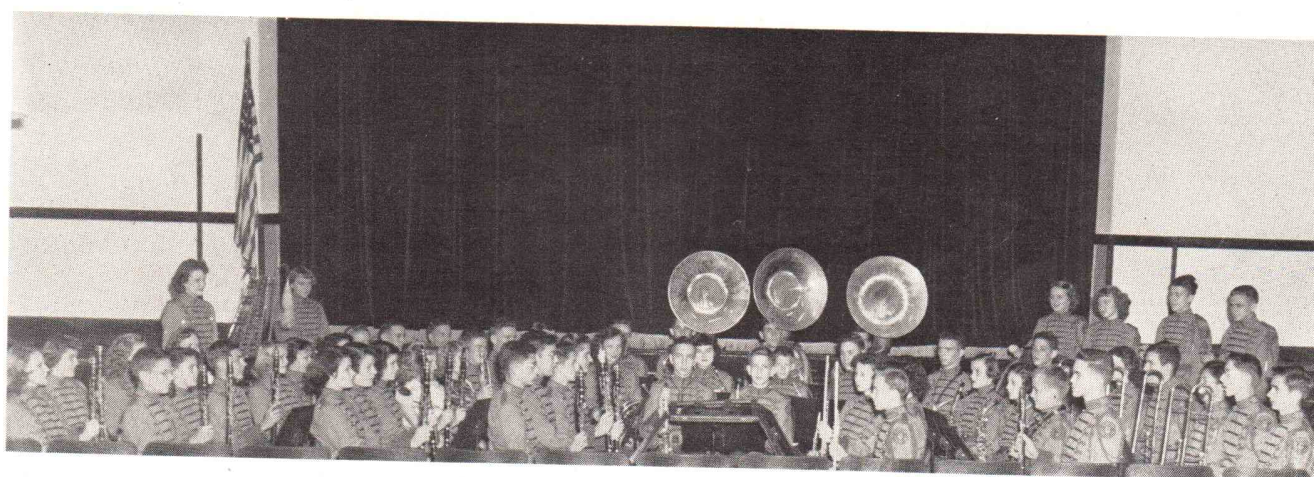

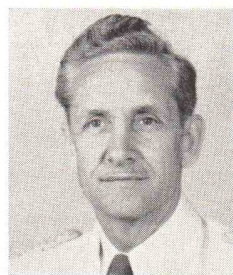
and a member of the Summer School Faculty of the University Band Camp.

Martin County (Stuart) High School Band

The Martin County High School Band, Stuart, was organized in 1938 by James Crowley, who was at that time the director of bands in Melbourne and Vero Beach and was engaged by a committee of Stuart citizens headed by Rev. T. C. O'Steen and Mr. H. A. Wycoff.

Other directors were Bernard Coker, Frances Alderman, Harold Casterton, Rosario Cataldo, and

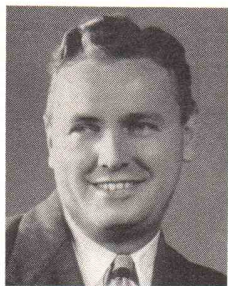
the present director, Wendell D. Waters, who took over in February, 1946. Since then the band has taken straight first divisions in all district contests and has produced a number of outstanding soloists.

The band takes an active part in football shows, basketball games, and civic functions in and out of Stuart, including a series of concerts during the second semester.

The Director, Wendell Waters, is from Worcester, Massachusetts. He began the study of cello and trombone at an early age and has enjoyed a wide experience in many forms of music, from small ensembles to symphony. He received a B. S. degree from the University of Tampa in 1939, taught music in Jasper, Florida, for three years, and joined the Navy in 1943 for duty in the South Pacific. While still in uniform, on terminal leave he became director of the Martin County Band. At present he is working for a Master's degree from F. S. U. Palm Beach High School Band (West Palm Beach)

The Palm Beach High School "Wildcat" Band, only six years old since it was organized in September of 1944 under the direction of Howard B. Swyers, has an interesting record of activities and achievements.

Beginning with some 35 odd students and an array of instruments that would dismay the stoutest hearted — and no uniforms, the Band and its director ploughed through a difficult year of foundation work — bravely making appearances on the football field in white trousers and shirts — and so began the band which now numbers 85 in personnel with 7 majorettes and 12

in the twirling corps, or Twirling Notes as they are called. At present the band owns about \$25,000.00 worth of instruments, uniforms and equipment.

This Band has become an integral part of the football program and made such an impression on one newspaper columnist that he was moved to write an article on the band that brought him national fame when reprinted in a prominent sports magazine — He was commenting on the fact that some fan had stretched, yawned and said he would go home now the show was over — and the reporter was moved to frustration at the thought of the bands taking over the football spectacle.

Apart from the high stepping majorettes and the smartly drilled group is their symphonic band, which really puts in long hours of hard work. Being a big part of civic life they participate in all community affairs, making some eighty appearances each year.

Mr. Swyers is a graduate of Murray State Teachers College, Murray, Ky., with graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh and Carnegie Tech and also of Murray, where he later became an instructor on the music faculty there. He has been Chairman of District One of the Bandmasters Association for the past three years and is president of the Florida Orchestra Association.

Winter Haven High School Band

ROY V. WOOD, Director

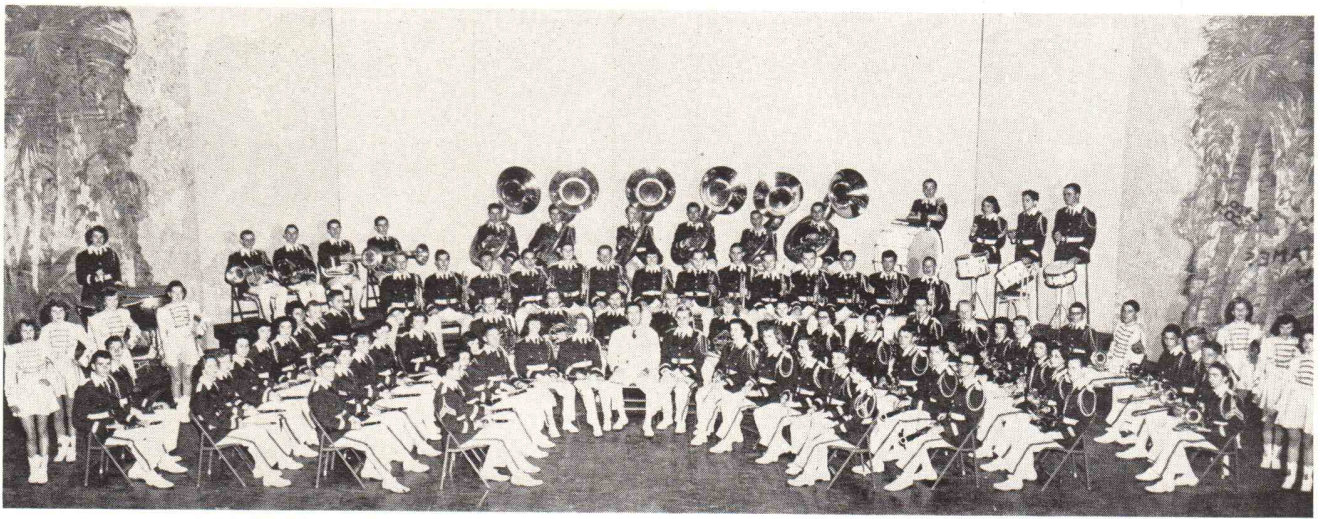


Winter Haven high school band has grown rapidly in size and musicianship since its organization some ten years ago. It now numbers eighty pieces with balanced full instrumentation. 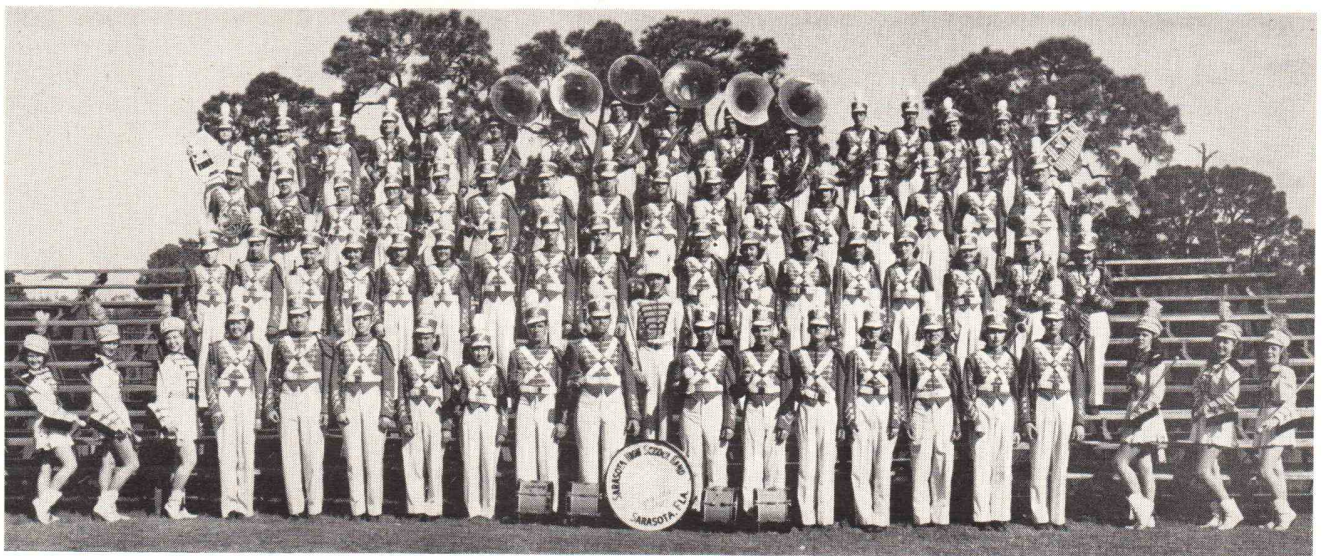

Director of the bands for the past eight years is Roy V. Wood, Vice President-elect of Florida Bandmasters Association.



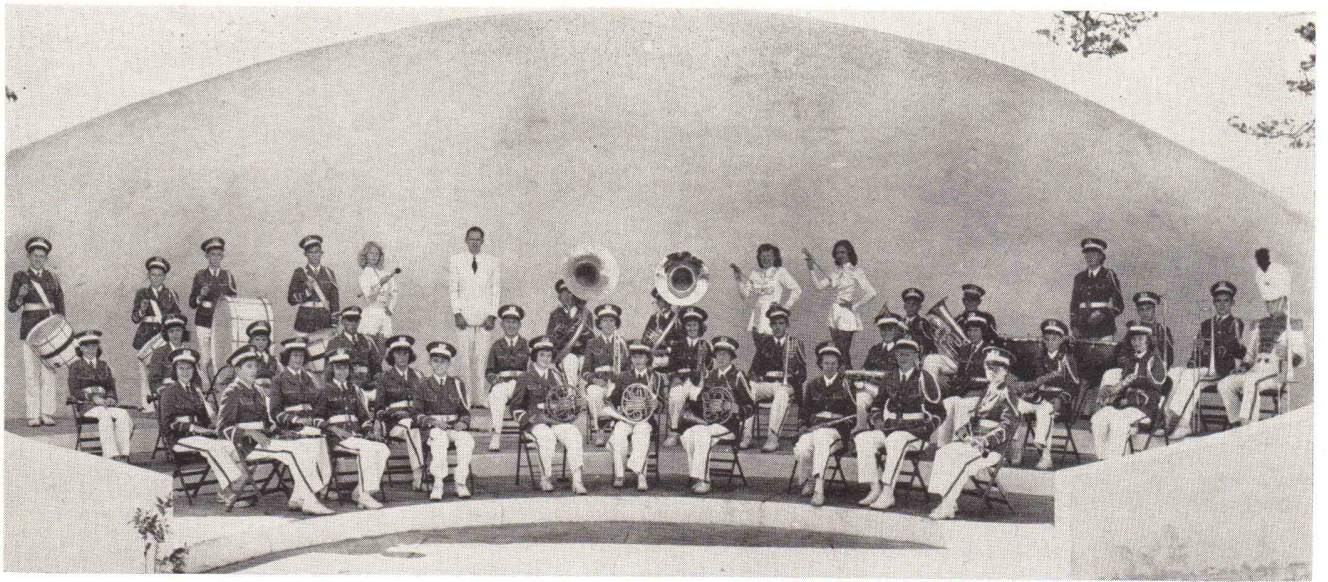
