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


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
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

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JESSE L. LASKY Honored Guest

A prominent figure in "the Hollywood legend" is producer Jesse L. Lasky, who, with Samuel Goldwyn and Cecil B. de Mille, in 1914 made Hollywood's first full-length feature film. In the decades that followed, Lasky's reputation as a motion picture producer has grown with the industry. He has gained particular renown as a specialist in biographical pictures, with Sergeant York (1941), The Adventures of Mark Twain (1943), Rhapsody in Blue (1944), the life of George Gershwin, and The Great Caruso (1951), the life of Enrico Caruso.

Of pioneer stock, his grandfather having

crossed the plains in a covered wagon in 1850, Jesse Louis Lasky was born in San Francisco, California on September 13, 1880. The son of Isaac and Sarah (Platt) Lasky attended the public and high schools of his native city, helping in his father's shoe store in his free time. On Saturday nights, when business was heaviest, young Lasky guarded wares displayed on a tray in front of the store. Somewhere in this period the youth began taking lessons on the cornet, which instrument he played in a boys' band and in the San Jose High School orchestra. By the age of sixteen Lasky was god enough to substitute in a regular band; at eighteen he had a union card for his position as cornetist in a San Francisco theater (1898-1900); however, at twenty, when his father had died leaving little money, the boy found he could not support the family as a musician. Previously, in 1897-98, he had tried reporting on the San Francisco Post. Now it was decided the young Lasky seek his fortune in Nome, gold having been discovered in Alaska. With three thousand dollars raised by the family to finance the Gold Rush expedition, Lasky reached Nome in 1900, one of the first men from the West Coast to pan for gold in Alaska. Young Lasky lost all of his original capital. "Refusing to be licked, I landed a job as cornetist in a dive," Lasky recounted to Helen Worden of the New York World-Telegram. "When the miners came in to the dance hall they used to throw sacks of gold dust and coins at the girls. I was entitled to all that fell in the pit." Thus Lasky earned his fare back to the United States and repaid fifteen hundred dollars of his family's original investment.

Shortly after he had returned home, Lasky received an offer of a job as cornetist in the Orpheum Theater in Honolulu. The show he played for closed before he could collect his salary, and again, to earn passage home, he played the cornet as the only white man in the Royal Hawaiian Band. In the meantime his sister had also been learning to play the cornet, and the two Lasky's were booked at Fish's Music Hall in San Francisco as duo-buglers and quick-change "artistes" In 1902, after Hermann the Great, the musician, engaged them to tour the country with him, the act grew to Lasky's Military Octet. Lasky became Hermann's manager in 1903, selling the cornet act to B. A. Rolfe. Then,, as one half of the Lasky-Rolfe Company, Lasky until 1911 was engaged in producing even more ambitious lightning-change acts, musical comedies, and operettas. In that year (1911), having made a fortune as manager and theatrical producer, Lasky invested \$110,000 in a "mixed banquet hall and musical show," the Folies-Bergere in New York, which he and Henry B. Harris opened: "We brought the word 'cabaret' to America," says Lasky, who lost every cent in the venture. Starting over again, Lasky raised the funds to produce California, an operetta of which the book was by Cecil B. de Mille, a young play-



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
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

HENRY FILLMORE

Head Judge Florida Band Contest

It has been said that wherever men march to the music of bands; in street parades, in the armed forces, or on the gridirons of America the martial music of Henry Fillmore, with its compelling rhythm and melodic flair, sets the standard for all to follow.

One of the most prolific contemporary composers of American band music, Henry Fillmore is recognized today throughout the nation as the contemporary "March King." And his fame does not rest solely upon the march form of composition; for Fillmore is also the father of the Trombone smear. His "Shoutin'

Liza Trombone," "Lassus Trombone," and the other fourteen members of the trombone family have many imitators but few equals.

The whole range of band literature is Mr. Fillmore's forte. His catalogue of more than three hundred numbers in active use today includes overtures, operatic selections, solos, novelty pieces, songs, and student training material.


One of the most phenomenal phases of Fillmore's composing activities is that of the vast amount of easy material he has written for young bands. Under the nom-de-plume of Harold Bennett, he has written a series of four "Bennett Band Books," copies of which may be found wherever there is a school band anywhere in the world. Actually more than a million Bennett Bank Books have been purchased by aspiring band students.

Henry Fillmore is much in demand as a guest conductor for band concerts and for clinical work with all-state bands and similar groups. Recently he was a featured guest conductor with Paul Lavalle's "Band of America" over NBC. His recent guest appearances include the University of Michigan Band, the Texas All-State High School Clinic Band, the University of Miami Band, the University of Pittsburgh Band, the Goldman Band, the University of Miami Band (Fla.) and the Chattanooga All-City Band. His appearances as guest conductor of the massed bands at the annual Orange Bowl Game in Miami are a highlight of the New Year's festivities.

Henry Fillmore's activities as a band and solo contest adjudicator are nationally recognized. He has served as a contest judge in many states including Utah, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Mississippi, Georgia and for many years has acted in the capacity of head judge for the Florida Band and Orchestra Contest. His comments on the judging sheets are to the point, kind, and hopeful and tend to spur the competitor on to greater achievement rather than create a feeling of failure.

Henry Fillmore's professional experience includes both playing (trombone) and conducting in circus, road shows, vaudeville, stage shows, musical comedy, park bands, and radio bands. As conductor of the "Fillmore Band," he reached the height of his career as a professional musician. With this group he toured North America for a number of years and played to audiences numbering thousands. Fillmore was a pioneer in radio. He served as a band conductor for over fifteen years on radio station WLW (Cincinnati) starting when radio was in its infancy in 1922.

Many will be surprised to know that Henry Fillmore is also Harold Bennett, Will Huff, Al Hayes, and Harry Hartley, these being the several pen names under which he writes.



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
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JUDGES - - - Twelfth Annual FLORIDA BAND & ORCHESTRA CONTEST



RAYMOND F. DVORAK

Prof. Raymond F. Dvorak, director of the University of Wisconsin bands, returned to his full time duties with his beloved Wisconsin bands when the University opened for the 1950-51 school year last September.

Dvorak was seriously injured on April 14, 1948, in a train wreck in Oklahoma while on his way to a state high school band contest. Following a series of successful operations on his left leg, badly fractured in the accident, and the fitting of a new right arm, he took up again the full schedule of concerts and guest appearances that has made him one of the outstanding musicians in the Middlewest.

Dvorak was born at Algonquin, Ill., in 1900. He was educated in the Algonquin public schools, the high school at Dundee, Ill., and the University of Illinois, where he was granted the bachelor of science degree in 1922 and the bachelor of music degree in 1926. He was assistant director of the University of Illinois band until he came to Wisconsin in 1934.

He has developed many "firsts" in the field of band pageantry at athletic contests. He developed the singing band, mass singing, formations without signals, and animated formations. He originated the airplane band formation with sound effects; the spelling of the score of the game immediately after the game; flank and oblique movements in formations; and the singing of "salute" songs to the competitors.

At Wisconsin his bands of 200 players have always been known and recognized for the color and pageantry they lend to all football games. Dvorak always comes up with special programs for special occasions like Homecoming, Dad's day, etc.

His concert bands have played a series of weekly concerts over Wisconsin radio station networks for the past dozen years, and have also been on national network radio programs a score of times since he came to Wisconsin.

During the convention of the American andmen's association in Washington, D. C., March 8-11, Dvorak conducted the U. S. Marine band in the performance of his own arrangement of Menotti's "Amelia Goes to the Ball."



RICHARD M. FEASEL

Richard M. Feasel, head of the Instrumental Department, and director of the Stetson University Band, and Symphony Orchestra, Stetson School of Music, DeLand, Fla. Bachelor of Music degree, Stetson 1942, and Master of Arts degree, 1947. Clarinetist with the Central Florida Symphony Orchestra under Alexander Bloch, 1940, 1941, and under Yves Chardon, 1950, 1951. Clarinetist for twelve seasons with the Daytona Beach Municipal Band. Has appeared as clarinet and saxophone soloist with various bands and orchestras, and with chamber music groups at the University.

While in the Service, 1942-46, wrote scores for and conducted two musical shows in Europe. Did special in electronics and physics of sound for the U. S. Signal Corps while in Europe, for which was awarded the Bronze Star by the U. S. Army, and the Croix de Guerre with Bronz Star by the French Government. Has since then done additional research in physics of sound and sound recording. Composer of instrumental, vocal, and piano works. Has arranged and scored numerous works for band, orchestra, and chorus, and has appeared as guest conductor of these works.

Teaches orchestration and arranging at the University. Since 1946 has served as judge and clinic consultant for various musical activities in Florida. Is at present District Governor for Kappa Kappa Psi, National Honorary Band Fraternity; Vice-President of the Florida Composers League; Treasurer of the Florida State Music Teachers Association.

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P. J. GUSTAT

P. J. Gustat was born in Alsace-Lorraine, and came to the United States with his parents at the age of six. He studied solfeggio and clarinet with Giuseppi DePetro, a professor from Italy, who spent several years in this country. He finished courses in harmony and orchestration with Adolf Rosenbecker and Daniel Prothroe, and public school music with Frances E. Clark. Former conductor of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra, Municipal Band and Boy Scout Band of El Paso, Texas. He was director of Music Education in the Sebring, Florida, schools for twenty-four years. Now retired.



MARK H. HINDSLEY



His Irish Symphony was performed in Washington over a coast-to-coast network by the Air Force Orchestra, the composer conducting, in November, 1951.



DR. WILLIAM D. REVELLI

For more than twenty-five years, the name of William D. Revelli has been synonymous with the bands of America. His vision and ideals are responsible for the degree of perfection that the University of Michigan Bands have attained. His insistence upon quality of performance and his constant search for new and better band music, have earned for him the reputation as one of the country's leading conductors.

In the five years preceding his appointment at the University of Michigan, Dr. Revelli achieved the now-classic feat of five consecutive National Championships with the high school band of Hobart, Indiana. complishment and the ensuing successes of the Michigan bands exemplify the vision and ideals of Dr. Reveili. Under his guidance, the Wind Instrument Department of the University has grown from a faculty of one in 1935 to today's staff of thirteen. The Band Department itself has been enlarged from a band of ninety-six members to three hands with a combined membership area. to three bands with a combined membership exceeding two hundred and fifty.

Recognized as one of the truly outstanding figures in the concert band world, Dr. Revelli has appeared as guest conductor in nearly every state in the nation. One of the top adjudicators in the field, Dr. Revelli's comments are always analytical, keen, and concise.

Dr. Revelli's uncompromising standards of musicianship, coupled with a boundless energy, have left their mark on all students who have been in contact with him, from the bright-eyed grammar school student to the most mature college musician.

Dr. Revelli's musical training reflects his driving determination and his high ideals. He has studied with such outstanding men of music as Leon Sametini, L. V. Saar, Charles Spadoni, Felix Borowski, H. A. Vandercook, and George Dasch. In 1915 he entered the Beethoven Music Conservatory, at St. Louis, and in 1919 continued his education at the Columbia Music School. He has also studied at the Chicago Musical College and at the Vandercook School of Music. In 1925 he was appointed music supervisor in the public schools in Hobart, Indiana, where he organized the instrumental department of that city, and developed it into national championship caliber within a few years.

Upon his appointment at the University of Michigan in 1935, Dr. Revelli saw the need of an organization of college band directors such as the organization with which he had worked in his career at Hobart. In 1941 he proceeded to organize the College Band Directors National Association, and was elected president of this

In recognition of his outstanding work and reputation in the music world, the Chicago Musical College, in June, 1947, conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Music.

In addition to his duties at Michigan, Dr. Revelli is currently president of the American Bandmasters Association; honorary National Grand President of Kappa Kappa Psi, honorary band fraternity; member of Alpha K. Lamda, Phi Mu Alpha, and a host of other musical societies. For the past thirteen years he served as an editor of "Etude," the music magazine, and was recently appointed to the editorial staff of the "Instrumentalist" magazine. He is the editor of the "University of Michigan Band Series," and was recently appointed an editor of the new "Band Guild of America Series."

His daily mail is filled with letters from former students-many now conductors in their own right-seeking Dr. Revelli's advice and counsel, and he spends many hours with these men, advising them in their position as clinician for their bands, and aiding in the solution of their problems and musical problems. He rarely loses contact with his former students, and never loses interest in their activities and progress.

Year in and year out, this find band will play from 150 to 200 concert numbers. ranging from the older classics to the moderns, and many things between those periods. Then, during the six weeks of Summer Band School at Texas Tech, the Summer band will play another 100 to 150 numbers, including many new numbers that are still in manu-

Mr. Wiley is a past president of the Texas Music Educators Association; has been secretary-treasurer of that organization since 1942; has been editor of the Texas Music Educator for four years; is a member of th board of directors of Kappa Kappa Psi, National college bandmen's fraternity; is a charter member of Phi Beta Mu, a National bandmasters' fraternity, and is a member of the American Bandmasters' Association.



PAUL YODER

Paul Yoder returns for the fifth year as one of the judges in the Florida State Band and Orchestra Contest. Mr. Yoder is an arranger and composer of band music with more than five hundred published numbers to his credit. The required number in the Class CC competition, "Mountain Majesty," is one of his more recent compositions designed especially for school bands.

Mr. Yoder graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1930. After teaching in the public schools of Illinois and Indiana for several years he established himself as a writer of school band music and, since that time, has devoted all his efforts along this line. Nearly every school and college band has used some of his football band shows, arrangements of current popular songe or original works for band. He has acted as judge and guest conductor throughout the country. He served in an Army Band in World War II and is at present the music editor for the Neil A. Kjos Music Co.

wright not very long out of school. The 1912 production was only a "moderate success."

For some time Samuel Goldwyn had been trying unsuccessfully to interest his brother-in-law Lasky in motion pictures. By the fall of 1913 the producer was ready to explore the field as organizer with Goldwyn and later as president of the Jesse L. Lasky Feature Play Company, which began operations in January 1914. The fledgling studio made the first full-length feature movie ever produced in Hollywood, only short pictures and serials having been produced there before: in 1914 de Mille directed The Squaw Man, which starred the current matinee idol, Dustin Farnum, and which cost \$40,000. The indoor scenes were shot in a barn, which was to become the Hollywood studio (the company also had offices in the East). The Squaw Man was followed by The Master Mind, The Only Son, The Virginian, Where the Trail Divides and by many of the famous David Belasco dramas. Lasky's Feature Play Company (their emphasis was on the plays) was in active competition with Adolph Zukor, whose Famous Players Film Company boasted big-name stars. The two merged their interests in July 1916 to form the Paramount-Famous-Lasky Corporation of which Lasky was vicepresident. "After The Squaw Man," wrote Alva Johnston in his New Yorker biographical sketch, "Lasky's career for eighteen years is a success story in the old tradition. Imagination, the gambling spirit, attention to details, and other virtues made him and his company bigger and bigger until it went into receivership (in 1932) ... the time when the motion picture industry collapsed under the weight of its theater chains." When Lasky walked out of his office at Paramount (Paramount-Famous-Lasky) after he had resigned in September 1932 he had lost the

\$12,000,000 he made as a pioneer movie producer in an attempt to save his bankrupt company.

In the next few years (1933-35) Lasky produced films independently, releasing through the Fox Film Corporation Zoo in Budapest, Berkeley Equare, As Husbands Go, Coming Out Party, The White Parade, Springtime for Henry, Grand Canary, and Redheads on Parade. Twentieth Century-Fox released The Gay Deception and Here's to Romance, which Lasky next produced. As president of (Mary) Pickford-Lasky Productions, Inc. (elected October 1935), he had two pictures released through United Artists in 1936: One Rainy Afternoon and The Gay Desperado. Lasky also joined RKO Radio Pictures as associate producer, heading his own production unit; with this organization he made Music for Madame and Hitting a New High, both of which were released in 1937. Leaving RKO, Lasky went to Warner Brothers as a producer for the years between 1940 and 1944, at first under a special financial arrangement and later as a regular staff producer. This was his "biographical" or "Americana" period, in which Sergeant York (Lasky's one thousand and tenth film), The Adventures of Mark Twain, and Rhapsody in Blue appeared.

Following these pictures he made Without Reservations and Miracle of the Bells.

Using radio as a means for "scouting talent, Lasky originated and produced the CBS show Gateway to Hollywood (1938-39 and 1939-40). Winners in the program's talent search were later featured in the motion picture, Career. "The studios," says Lasky, "keep a close watch on us. They are anxious to find new talent, too." As early as 1925, when Lasky was vice-president in charge of production at Paramount-Famous Lasky, he conducted talent searches, the winners of which attended the studio's school on Long Island.

BARTOW HIGH SCHOOL BAND

HOWARD E. STIVERS, Director



The Bartow High School Band was first organized in January, 1938, with Theodore Ehrlich as Bandmaster. It developed rapidly and entered the District Band Contest in the spring of 1939. In its first contest the band placed in marching and second in playing.

In the spring of 1940, Mr. Ehrlich was succeeded by Major A. D. McCampbell who directed the band until the 1943-44 season. At this

time Mr. David Guthrie was appointed Band Director. The war effort was growing immensely by this time, so the new director was released at the Christmas Holidays to go into defense work.

At this time Harry Grant, Jr., who was teaching on a part-time basis at the Mulberry School, was employed on a part-time basis to direct the Bartow High School Band. Mr. Grant successfully directed the band for one and one-half years. After the close of the second World War, Miss Margaret Clark, the Vocal Director in the Bartow Area, took over the responsibility of directing the Band until the 1947-48 season.

Mr. Thor Jensen was appointed Band Director for the 1947-48 school year and remained with the band three years. During this time many large and expensive instruments and items of necessary equipment were purchased for the band. Some of these included a set of Ludwig pedal tympani, a Conn BB-flat sousaphone, a bassoon, a baritone saxophone, an oboe, and other vital pieces of band equipment.

Last year Mr. Howard E. Stivers was appointed Band Director for the Bartow Area Schools. Mr. Stivers immediately undertook a tremendous job of rebuilding the band into a marching unit which could appear successfully at all home football games and out-of-town games. For the first time in many years the band successfully put on an entirely "new and different pageant" for each football game at home and away. Also a "first" for the band was scored by the use of lighted formations made possible by a set of cap lights purchased for the band. Another "first" was the introduction of a "Charting System" for these football pageants by Mr. Stivers.

A Band of "Merit Point System" was established and band letters were awarded to those members earning the required number of merit points. This was the first time since the first organization of the band under Mr. Ehrlich that the band members were given the privilege of earning school letters and the return to that policy was heralded by all band members.

Last year the band performed for various out-of-town parades including the "Gasparilla Parade," the "Strawberry Festival," the "Rodeo Parade" and the "Orange Festival." In addition the band performs annually in about ten "home town" parades. This year the band performed in these same parades, with the exception of the "Strawberry Festival" for which the "Lake Wales Passion Play Parade" was substituted. In addition the band this year was invited to participate in the "Festival of States" parade in St. Petersburg but was unable to accept the invitation.

In the 1951 District Contest, the band, under its new director, Mr. Stivers, received its first "Superior" rating in marching in many years. This year the band with a still "inexperienced" group of young players, of which a majority were in Junior High, succeeded in coming up one entire division in all ratings at the District Contest, receiving an Excellent in Concert and an Excellent in Sight-Reading. The Marching Drill was "rained out" so the Band was not able, therefore, to defend its "Superior" rating of last year.

In the Solo and Ensemble Contest this year, two ensembles out of three entered in competition advanced to the State Contest and two soloists out of five entered in Disrict competition advanced to the State Meet.

In the spring of 1951 the community put on a very successful campaign, aided by the Key Club, and funds were secured to purchase sixty new band caps and seventeen new uniforms, plus a Drum Major's uniform. In the fall the Band moved into a newly erected Band Building which was located beneath the High School stadium.

Howard E. Stivers, the present director, graduated from Butler University and Arthur Jordan Conservatory of Music, Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1944, with a Bachelor of Music in Education. BELLE GLADE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

ALAN H. DRAKE, Director



The Belle Glade High School Band, known as the "Golden Ram Band," is the youngest band in Palm Beach County. This musical organiation with its colorful cadet style uniforms is well known by all Glades people through its performances at football games, paardes, festivals and concerts.

Largely through the efforts of sociation, one of the most active the Belle Glade Band Parents As-

sociation, one of the most active of such organizations to be found anywhere, the Ram Band is among the very finest equipped Class "CC" school bands in Florida.

The band was organized in the spring of 1944 by Mrs. Bobbie Allum under the sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce. In the school year 1945-46, it obtained a set of uniforms and appeared in concerts, football drills, and parades. This was the first year the band was entered in the State Contest. It was given first division superior rating in class "D" competition..

James May conducted the band for the first half of the year 1946-47 and Mrs Allum came back to finish the year.

Mr. Howard Payne of Taylor, Pa., became director in 1947. He resigned this position in June, 1951, to go into the real estate business.

During the four years in which Mr. Payne was bandmaster the band, boosted by the purchase of new uniforms and equipment and strengthened by a spirit of cooperation, interest and hard work, made considerable progress.

In addition to their local appearances, the band played at many festivals, parades, and contests. In the spring of 1950, they attended the state contest in Miami, after receiving three first division ratings in the district

ontest.

Alan H. Drake, the new bandmaster, assumed his duties in July, 1951. One of the youngest bandmasters in Florida, he received all of his musical education in Miami. In 1943, as a student of Lawrence Tremblay, he played solo clarinet with the Shenandoah Junior High School Band. Mr. Drake then attended Miami Senior High School where, under Al G. Wright he was very active in band and orchestra work. In the school years of 1945-46, 1946-47, he was concertmaster of the Miami Senior High School Band, first clarinet with the Miami High School Orchestra, solo clarinetist at the All-State Clinic Band. He was also band captain in 1946-47. He earned many first division ratings in clarinet solos, student conducting, and ensemble.

Mr. Drake entered the University Symphony Orchestra in which he played first clarinet from 1948 through 1951. While attending the University, he appeared in many solo and chamber music recitals. He gave his Senior Clarinet Recital in May, 1951. He also played professionally with the Greater Miami Philharmonic Society, Music Circus Orchestra, Miami Concert Band, Opera Guild Orchestra, and other bands and orchestras in the Greater Miami area. He graduated with an A.B. degree, Magna Cum Laude, from the University of Miami in June, 1951, after which he started his teaching career at Belle Glade High School. He is proud and happy to continue his activity in the band program of Florida, no longer as a player, but now as a bandmaster.

BLOUNTSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL BAND M. A. CORREIA, Director



After a period of inactivity during World War II, the B. H. S. Band was reorganized on a parttime basis by Mr. Charles Henderson followed by Mr. Robert Cole in '48-'49 during which time it led Gov. Warren's Inaugural Parade.

Mr. Leo Imperial, the band's first full-time director, took over in 1949 and under his direction the band made first division in

both District and State festivals—Class D.

The Band's present director, M. A. Correia, with the cooperation of school officials, county newspaper, Lions and Rotary clubs, and civic-minded citizens enlarged the band from a nucleus of eight to a membership of forty musicians and nine (9) majorettes. With the same cooperation, the Band's instrumentation and physical facilities are being greatly improved.

This past season the Band participated in all H. S. and J. H. S. football games; in numerous Pep-Parades; in Chipola Jr. College's Homecoming Parade and game; and furnished the music at the dedication of the Athletic field at Bristol, Fla. The Band escorted Gov. Warren when he appeared at Blountstown last fall. A Halloween and a Xmas Concert were also performed. Several mem-

bers will enter college next year to major in music.

M. A. Correia has been active in Civic Bands, Civic Symphonies, Theater Pit Bands, Dance Orchestras, and private teaching in New England since 1936. During World War II he was active in U. S. A. A. F. bands and dance orchestras. After discharge from the service in 1945 he studied at the New South Wales Conservatory of Music in Sydney, Australia. Received his Mus. B. in Mus. Ed. from New England Conservatory of Music, Boston, Mass., where he was a member of the chorus and orchestra and was President of the M. E. N. C. student chapter. Studied contrabass with Georges Moleux of Boston Symphony. Prior to coming to Florida this season, Mr. Correia taught J. H. S. Band and Orchestra, H. S. Glee Club, and Elementary Instrumental Classes at Natick, Mass.

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
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plays an average of 30 engagements each semester.

The Clearwater Junior High School Band was organized three years ago by Stephen Yanetovich, with sixty players. The band grew in numbers and enthusiasm, so for its second year Carl Frank was employed as director. He had to leave in the middle of the year so Mrs. Gill Erwin took over for a month until Earl Bowman arrived in February, 1951.

During the latter part of this second year uniform hats were purchased. Projects to raise money for capes are now being worked on.

The band now has one hundred ten players. It has played for the up-county music festival for two years, four concerts with the high school band and orchestra, parades on Armistice Day, Santa Claus parades, home show parades, Memorial Day parades and all other local parades.

It also plays for pep-assemblies, and assemblies for recruiting new members. During the recruiting assemblies the instruments are explained and deconstrated and a musical aptitude test is given to all the junior high students.

The Safety Harbor Junior High School and Dunedin Junior High Schools are also taught by him. These two bands are training bands for Clearwater High School along with the Clearwater Junior High Band.

G. Earl Bowman attended Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music and received a Bachelor of School Music in 1939. While a student he played in the college band, symphony orchestra and trumpet quartet. He was tenor soloist with U-Cappella choir and was a member of the men's quartet and mixed quartet.

Much of the success of the band is due to the efforts of the wide-awake Mainland Band and Orchestra Parents Association which raised necessary funds for uniforms and who sponsor all outof-town band trips. The president of the Association this

year is Mr. Don Willis.

Competing in Class "B" last year, the Mainland Band rated "Superior" in the District Contest and "Excellent" in the State Contest held in St. Petersburg. Under the new classification system the band is now in Class "BB." School Band and Orchestra of Daytona Beach since 1941,

William J. Benton, director of the Mainland High is a graduate of Mercer University in Macon and holds bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from that

institution.

While teaching at Albany, Ga., he was a pioneer in the band festival movement in Georgia and also in the formation of the Georgia Music Educators Association, of which he was state treasurer for two years.

The orchestra under the direction of William Benton entered the Florida Contests in 1947, playing in Class "D" with a membership of 20, making a "Superior"

rating in District and State.

In 1950 the orchestra was judged "Superior" in concert and sight-reading both at the District level and at the State Contest in Miami. The Mainland Orchestra has always been a strong supporter of the string movement in Florida and has contributed many students to clinic orchestras in the past. This year, six M.H.S. Orchestra members played in the All-State Orchestra which performed at the Tampa Music

The Mainland Orchestra receives school credit and has its own rehearsal period just as the band, and like the band it receives the full cooperation and support of the Mainland Band and Orchestra Parents Association.

SEABREEZE HIGH SCHOOL BAND (Daytona Beach)

The Seabreeze High School Band was reorganized in 1946. Since that time the band has entered the annual district and state contests. Eminating from the Peninsula section of Daytona Beach, the band contributes substantially to the school and community affairs by performing for school assembly programs, athletic contests and various events in the famed oceanside bandshell and

new Peabody Auditorium. A number of the band members have been awarded music scholarships to universities and several have entered the music field professionally. Organized in August of 1936. the band has been under the direction of John J. Heney since that time. In the spring of 1937 the band entered the first annual Florida Bandmasters Association contest, held in West Palm Beach. Since that time the band has entered every district, and state contest held by the parent association and has entered every national contest sponsored by the

National School Band Association to be held in this national region. It has contributed by its presence and talents to every need of band music in Florida and of the Florida Bandmasters Association, of which it is a "charter member."

It has competed in 72 separate and different contests and has received a "division one" rating in 70 of them.

In its own buses, the band travels extensively and in 1951-52 will have appeared in many communities between Madison and St. Petersburg. Its annual tour, made during the first week of December, is the highlight of the school year for the band members.

A formal concert during the second week of November and a spring concert in February are two of the band's contributions to the cultural knowledge of its

members.

Extensive literature is studied during the school year. Housed in its own building—the first in Florida, and the second in the South—the band contributes to all of the activities of its own high school as well as that of the city of DeLand, and surrounding communities.

Member of the American Bandmasters Association, and president for three years of the Florida Bandmasters Association. Honorary life president of the Florida Bandmasters Association. Composer of twenty-three published compositions. Soloist with the late John Philip Sousa and his famous band. Contributor, by request, to leading music trade magazines and papers. Percussion reviewer of the Music Educators Journal. Member of the National School Band Association, and a former member of the executive committee of the group. Conductor of Stetson University Band at DeLand, Florida, for six years. Honorary guest conductor of some of the country's leading professional bands. Member of the ajudicatory staff of the American Bandmasters Association and the National School Band Association. Former member of the executive committee of the National College and University Bandmasters Association. Former chairman of the 8th Region (1939-40).

He is former vice-chairman Drum and Xylophone Solo Committee of National National School Band Assosiation (1937-1942). Director of massed Bands (1,200 players), and group singing (37,000 people) at Atlanta Constitution Music Festival, Grant Field, Atlanta, Georgia, 1940. Awarded "First Citizen" Cup for meritorious service by the City of DeLand, Florida, 1938. Former director Daytona Beach, Florida, Municipal Band. Former member of board of directors, American Bandmasters Association. Awarded placque for outstanding service to bands in Northwest Florida on April 6, 1951. Guest director United States Navy Band, United States Marine

Band, University of North Carolina Band.

DELRAY BEACH HIGH SCHOOL BAND RAY DeMARIS, Director



The Seacrest High School Band had its beginning at Delray Beach High School in 1944 under Paul Creech. In 1945 Ray DeMaris was engaged as director of the group which consisted of fifteen members. In 1949 Seacrest High School was opened. This is a consolidated Senior High School and its enrollment includes pupils from Delray Beach, Boynton Beach and Boca Raton.

Ray DeMaris, director, B.S.M. Drake University. Graduate work at the University of Southern California. Before coming to Delray Beach he taught Instrumental Music for sixteen years in the Public Schools of Birmingham, Alabama, two and a half years at Birmingham Southern College, and one year in the Public Schools of Fullerton, Calif.

FORT LAUDERDALE HIGH SCHOOL BAND

HARRY F. McCOMB, Director



The Fort Lauderdale High School Band, consistent winner of Superior (first division) ratings under its director, Harry F McComb, is an integral part of the school and community which it represents.

During the football season the "Flying L" Band, assisted by a majorette corps adjudged to be one of the finest in the country, presents nine eye-catching, ear-ap-

pealing halftime shows. "Lullabye of Broadway," Mexican Hat Dance," "In the Roaring Twenties," and "Chinatown, My Chinatown" are titles indicative of the themes used in these tuneful marching shows. Each show is elaborately costumed, full of expert dancing, baton twirling and precision marching.

As a special attraction at school assemblies the Band has presented 9 such concerts as well as playing for the school Mardi Gras carnival and the graduation ceremonies. The Band also presents special concerts at elementary and junior high schools throughout the city.

During the winter season the Band presents city-sponsored concerts in the 2,500-seat War Memorial Auditorium and combines with the high school chorus to present other outstanding musical attractions. Civic parades and city-wide celebrations are enlivened by the stirring music of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band.

The "Flying 'L'" Dance Band is organied as a regular part of the music program. This 15-piece outfit, composed of regular Band members with a special interest in dance band music, plays for school dances, Youth Center activities and local radio programs.

All year long soloists and ensembles provide music programs for the city's many civic and social clubs. During the past year a total of 33 such appearances were made by members of the Fort Lauderdale Band.

Graduates of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band are playing in college and service bands all over the United States. Many of these graduates are enjoying the benefits of lucrative scholarships awarded because of musical proficiency.

Band director, Harry F. McComb, born in Detroit, Michigan, was graduated from Cass Technical High School with highest honors in music. He received his A.B. degree in music education from the University of Miami where he played solo cornet in the University Symphony and in the Concert Band. Upon graduation he became director of the Fort Lauderdale High School Band, which, since that time, has been given highest possible ratings by the country's finest band judges.

In 1949 Mr McComb received his M.A. degree in high school administration, guidance and supervision from the University of Michigan. He has served as a judge in nearly all of the Florida band districts. He is a member of Phi Mu Alpha (music honorary), a faculty member at the University of Miami Smmer Band Camp. and a member of the M.E.N.C.'s national committee on music rooms and buildings. Mr. McComb is a Kiwanian, a

past-president of the Florida Bandmasters Association, and vice-president of the Florida Music Educators Association. In February, 1952, McComb was unanimously elected to full membership in the American Bandmasters Association.

KATHLEEN HIGH SCHOOL BAND THOMAS MUNAFO. Director



The Kathleen High School Band was organized in April, 1950, under the direction of George Moore. The Band started with twenty-four pieces and that Fall played at several of the football games. The Andrew Jackson Band was organized in September, 1945 under the direction of the late Milton B. Weary, and since that time has performed for all home football games and several out of town games. It has also appeared in numerous parades and at civic affairs, and each year participates in the annual Kiwanis Charity game and the New Years Day Gator Bowl game. During the past

school year and at the present time, the Jackson Band has taken part in regularly scheduled radio broadcasts

by the bands of Duval county.

The band was first associated with the state program by appearing at the District contest in St. Augustine March, 1947 and at the State Festival in Miami that year. It has entered the contests each year since that time.

Philip B. Speer, the present director of the Jackson Band, graduated from Mansfield State Teachers College, Mansfield, Pennsylvania, in 1940 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education, and taught in the public schools in Pennsylvania before serving in the Air Corps. He is now in the process of earning his Masters degree from F.S.U. at Tallahassee, Fla.

Mr. Speer accepted the position of bandmaster at Kirby Smith Junior High School in Jacksonville in December, 1947 and remained in that position until January 1952, at which time he accepted the position of bandmaster at Andrew Jackson High School.

ROBERT E. LEE (Jax) HIGH SCHOOL BAND CLAUDE O. HULICK, Director

Claude O. "Doc" Hulick, Director of Music at Robert E. Lee Senior High School, Jacksonville. is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Champaign, with a B. S. in Education, a B. S. in Public School Music, and is a member of the Phi Mu Alpha-Sinfonia. His Master in Music was received at Illinois Wesleyan University. While attending the University

of Illinois he played solo cornet and first trumpet in the concert band, being admitted in his freshman year to this famous University Band, under the direction of the equally famous Dr. A. A. Harding. When he graduated from the University he was awarded a gold medal for having played with the Concert Band four years. He also played first trumpet in the University Symphony Orchestra, and was a member of the University Men's Glee Club.

His college and pre-med education was interrupted while the played professionally in St. Louis for ten years. When he returned to the University he transferred to the School of Music from which he graduated. The following summers he spent working on his Masters at Illinois Wesleyan.

This is Mr. Hulick's third year of directing the Lee High Band. Before coming here, Mr. Hulick was a Music Supervisor and Band Director in Illinois schools for thirteen years, coming to Florida in 1947 as Area Music Supervisor in the schools of the Mulberry, Florida

area.

The Lee Band has made the usual number of school, civic and athletic appearances. In addition, thirteen members of the band are players in the Junior Symphony, two in the Jacksonville Philharmonic Orchestra, and five members in the Jacksonville Symphony. At the final symphony concert of the season, the Lee Band augmented the Symphony in playing the "1812" Overture.

Due to the death of M. B. Weary, District 5 Chairman, President Roy Wood appointed Mr. Hulick chairman. This made the Lee Band host to the district contest

on March 21 and 22, 1952.

LAKE WORTH HIGH SCHOOL BAND JOE LUSK, Director



The Lake Worth High School Band participates in a full schedule of activities through out the year. The Trojan Band presents attractive and entertaining shows at all football games, both at home and away. For a number of years the band has played for the Orange Bowl Parade, as well as the Festa dal Sol, the Gladiola Festival and the Sun Dance.

The Lake Worth Band is the pride of community. Annually the band presents a series of concerts for the City, and cooperates with civic

and patriotic groups for special programs.

The dancing majorettes have attracted considerable attention with their half-time presentations and their tricky parade maneuvers. Sixteen in number, the girls are required to do everything from military marching

to boogie-woogie.

Through the efforts of Mr. Lusk and the cooperation of the school administration and the community band has, in four years, grown from thirty pieces to concert band of seventy and a marching unit of eighty-four. Last year the band entered, for the first time, the State Contest at St. Petersburg. They received a Superior rating in concert, sight reading and marching.

Joe Lusk, director of the Lawe Worth High School Band, assumed that position four years ago. He is a graduate of Marshall College, where he received his A. B. and M. A. degrees. He has also done graduate work at the University of Michigan School of Music.

Prior to coming to Florida Mr. Lusk was, for eleven years, director of the Barboursville High School Band in West Virginia. There he developed what was regarded as the outstanding Class B Band in the state. He held the position of State Secretary of the West Virginia Bandmasters Association for seven years.

ALBERT I. CINA, Director



The Columbia High School Band was organized in 1936 under the direction of Carl Roberts

der the direction of Carl Roberts. In 1945, '46 and '47 the band was under leadership of Bernard Black. In 1947-48 and '49, Mr. Hubert assumed leadership of the band and on July 1st, 1949, the present director, Albert I. Cina, began his duties. Mr. Cina organized a junior band of 42 pieces from fourth up to eighth grade

pupils.

The Columbia High School Band, under the direction of Albert I. Cina, has been a worthwhile addition to the Lake City school and community life, playing at all school and civic functions.

Albert I. Cina is a native-born Italian, descendant of a musical family. At the age of 16 he was solo trombonist of La Banda di Sicilia, under the direction of his cousin, Antonino Cina, famous maestro and composer.

Cina came to this country in 1914, appearing on the concert stage with Seven Castelluccis. He was cornetist and assistant director with Grella and his Scarlet Guards band. Also cornetist with famous Creatore's Band and James Victor Concert Band. He has attended the bandmaster's summer school of music at Florida State University, Tallahassee, for four summers. Albert I. Cina is the composer and publisher of Gator Bowl March.

He came to Florida in 1939 at director of the Malone High School Band. With Jasper High School Band. Director of Valdosta (Ga.) High School Band 1947-49, and on July 1st, 1949 began his present tenure in Lake

City.

LAKE WALES HIGH SCHOOL BAND O. J. KRAUSHAAR, Director



The Lake Wales High School Band was organized in 1938 with Harry Grant, Jr., director. Mr. Kraushaar came to Lake Wales in 1941. The band plays for the numerous school activities, for community affairs, for various out-of-town activities and a series of Sunday vesper concerts. Each spring the band plays an annual Fillmore concert. The band has its own modern building which is

cared for completely by the band students.

The various Lake Wales High School groups are known as The Highlanders. The band has followed this theme in using the added Scotch Unit. The tartan used in the Scotch outfits is the MacLeod of Lewis. This year this unit will number nineteen: Six pipes, six drums, six dancers, and a drum major. The unit can be used with the band or separately.

Mr. Kraushaar, supervisor of music in Lake Wales, is a graduate of Sherwood Music School in Chicago and has had additional college training at the University of Iowa. He is a graduate of Howe Military School, Howe, Indiana, where he was on full scholarship. He was

a fellowship student at the University of Iowa,

During World War I he was in the Band of the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, Flagship of the Atlantic fleet. He has played concert seasons with the Kalamazoo, Michigan Symphony Orchestra; the Ft. Wayne, Indiana Symphony Orchestra; the Canadian Kilties Band; the Chicago Band; and four concert tours with the Sousa Band. He was supervisor of instrumental music in LaGrange County, Indiana, Schools for seven years—supervisor of music in the Waupun, Wisconsin Schools for seven years—and has been supervisor of music in the Lake Wales Schools for eleven years. He has been director of the Band Division for the Summer Music Camp at Florida State University for ten years.

Mr. Kraushaar is a member of the American Bandmasters Association. He was Secretary-Treasurer of the National School Orchestra Association for four years; Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Bandmasters Association for one year; and President of the Florida Music Educators Association for four years. He was Vice-President of the Southern Division of the Music Educators National Conference for two years and a member of its Board of Directors for six years. He is a member of the Sousa Band Fraternal Society.

LARGO HIGH SCHOOL BAND EDDIE EDWARDS, Director



The Largo High School Band was reorganized by Eddie Edwards in 1940. During the war Mr. Edwards was in the U. S. Navy. In the fall of 1946 the band was again reorganized with an enrollment of 20 students. The present size of the band if 80 pieces and is classified as a CC Band with a school enrollment of 170 students.

The Largo Band is very active and has progressed very rapidly in

the past few years. Besides the many school activities the band gives a series of concerts at the Largo Town Park band stand each season.

At the Cigar Bowl Game held in Tampa on January 1, 1951, the Largo Band was chosen to represent Valpariso College.

For the past three years the Largo High School Band has won a final 1st division rating in concert, sight reading and marching at the state contest.

Mr. Edwards, the director, was born in New Haven, Conn. He began study of trumpet at the age of eight tello of New York City. He entered the professional field in 1918. Has a very wide experience in theatre and dance work. He played with Felix Ferdinand, B. A. Rolph, E. A. Moses and others. While in the Navy he played solo cornet with Charleston Navy Yard Band and Dance Orchestra.

Eddie has been a student of Rollins College and is continuing his education at the University of Miami.

MELBOURNE HIGH SCHOOL BAND DOROTHY L. PARKER, Director

The Melbourne Band participated in National and State Contests 1938-41, and was consistently awarded a First Division Rating. From 1941-45 the band was at a standstill, and dropped in enrollment from 20 pieces to a 7 piece band. The band is now in its seventh year of reorganization under Miss Parker. Mr. A. V. Catterton, Ex-Marine Sergeant and manager of the Melbourne Radio Station, is the drill master this year for the band.

The band had the privilege and pleasure of representing the Florida State Lions at their National Convention in New York the summer of 1946-47, as the official Florida Band; in 1950-51 the band took part in the annual Orange Bowl Festivities in Miami.

The Melbourne Band has consistently won first divisions in Concert and Drill at District Contests since 1941, and First Division in Drill and never less than a second in concert at State Contests. In 1949-50 the band placed First in Concert and Drill at State Contest in Miami. This past year the band received all First Divisions in all District entries, sight-reading, concert, drill, and all soloists, but chose to take a three day tour of the state, instead of going to State Contest.

The Director, Dorothy L. Parker, is a graduate of the Univ. of Illinois. She taught in Missouri; was a member of the Missouri State Board of Music; Director of Instrumental music in Shelby, N. C., and Secretary of N. Carolina Band Masters Association. Dean of Girls and Instructor at Transylvania Music Camp, Brevard, N. C. for the past three summers she had been Instructor and Dean of Girls at Miami University (including serving as Assistant Camp Direcor) and this summer will serve in the same capacity. Last year she also served on the Florida State Evaluation Board, and in 1950 she served as Adjudicator for District Band Contst—District One. She also is Methodist Church Choir Director, and has a glee club of 96 members, in addition to her instrumental teaching.

MIAMI EDISON SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND HARRY K. CARNEY, Director



The Miami Edison High School Band is twenty-one years old. Organized in 1931, the original membership was eight members. The band was organized by Mr. Fred W. McCall, Jr. He remained at Miami Edison for seventeen years. Following his directorship at Edison, he became bandmaster at the University of Miami. For several years the band existed on 'out-of-school time.' The director, in addi-

tion to his band responsibilities, taught a full schedule of academic classes. The growth of the Miami Edison High School Band parallels the growth of the band movement in the State of Florida, itself.

The band entered competition for the first time in 1934 at West Palm Beach. Its contest record over a period of twenty-one years has been a fine one. Few musical organizations can show a finer contest record than the Miami Edison High School Band.

The present uniform was established in the year 1938. Through the cooperation of the Athletic Department sixty complete uniforms were purchased. The Athletic and instrumental music departments have always supported each other at Miami Edison.

The band is a much travelled band. It accompanies the football team to Jacksonville each year. It has taken part in the Gasparilla Parade in Tampa several times. In 1941 the band participated in the National Band Contest at Richmond, Va. The band has made two trips to Havana, Cuba. This year, the band was the official representative of the City of Miami at the Cuban Carnival. A highlight of this year's trip was the establishment of a new high in good international relationship between the Miami Edison High School and the Instituto Edison in Havana. Instituto Edison is a large high school of three thousand students, located in the finest residential section of Havana. The staff and students of Havana Edison entertained the members of the band from Miami Edison like 'visiting royalty.' Early in April thirty-one students from Havana Edison returned the visit to Miami Edison High School and were entertained by the members of the band.

The physical equipment of the band department is very good. In 1950, a new band building was erected. It combines a large rehearsal room, class room, director's office, library, storage room, and practice studios into a modern efficient band building. The band strives to purchase the finest in instruments, and owns a fine library of symphonic music. The band owns a magnachord recorder, four recording basses, and a contra bass clarinet. New filing cabinets are now being installed to modernize

the library equipment.

In addition to Mr. McCall, former directors at Miami Edison have been Mr. Arden Richards, and Mr. J. Howard Reynolds. Under Mr. Reynolds, the band attained a high degree of musicianship to be envied by all bands. Mr. Reynolds was at Miami Edison for two years.

In 1951, Harry K. Carney became director of Instrumental Music at Miami Edison. He had been bandmaster at Edison Junior High School prior to coming to Edison High School. He is a graduate of Ithaca College, and did his graduate study at Syracuse University and the University of Miami. Before moving to Miami, he was active in musical organizations in New York State.

Several fine junior high schools contribute to the success of the Miami Edison High School Band. Robert E. Lee, Little River, Edison, Hialeah, Constance, and Horace Mann Junior High Schools all have fine bands.

MIAMI EDISON SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA ROBERT A. LAWRENCE, Director



The Miami Edison Orchestra was established in 1921 and supervised by a director from Miami High School. In 1931 Mrs. Frances Deen, director of vocal work in the school, also became the director of the orchestra. She developed the orchestra with the aid of a string teacher who came in from time to time to assist.

During the years between 1944 and 1949 Mr. Fred McCall took

over the direction. In 1950 it was under the direction of Mr. J. Howard Reynolds who was the Director of Instrumental Music that year. In 1951 Mr. Robert A, Lawrence became the Associate Director of Instrumental Music as Director of Strings. He immediately started a program for the establishment of string classes in the lower grades

of schools which feed into Edison Senior High School. It is the intention of Mr. Lawrence to begin new string students every year and to follow each group in training

until it reaches Senior High School.

This year Mr. Lawrence is in full charge of the orchestra. Under his leadership the orchestra has made many appearances. The first appearance took place at an Edison P.T.A. meeting where the orchestra entertained the parents. This organization then played the music for an operetta performed by the Edison Junior High. A string ensemble was asked to play for the dedication of the Lindsey Hopkins Vocational School and for the presentation of a Christmas Pageant given by Little River Junior High School. Twenty members of the orchestra attended the Tampa Music Clinic, and the Edison students obtained four first chairs plus the position of Assistant Concert Mistress. The group played for the January Commencement exercises of the Edison and Technical High Schools. It has also played for school assemblies and activities during the course of the year, and at this writing, is preparing for its First Annual Spring Concert; the program to include such works as Prokofieff's "Peter and the Wolf," Handel's "Water Music," and Wagner's "Procession of the Grail" from the opera "Parsifal."

Mr. Lawrence, the Orchestra Director, is completing his second year as Associate Director of Instrumental Music at Miami Edison Senior High School. Hailing from Chicago, Illinois, he received his early musical training on the Violin and Viola from such outstanding teachers as Mr. Scott Willets of the American Conservatory, and from George Perlman, who was, himself, a student of

the great Leopold Auer.

Mr. Lawrence's musical studies were interruped in 1942 when he joined the Armed Forces, serving with the army in Italy. After his discharge in 1945, he entered the Northern Illinois State Teachers College in De Kalo, Ill., where in 1949 he received his Bachelor of Science in at the Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, La., Education Degree. This was followed by graduate work where Mr. Lawrence also taught string instruments under a graduate assistantship. He received his Master of Music Education Degree in 1950 shortly before taking up his duties at Miami Edison.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND AL G. WRIGHT, Director



The Miami Scnior High School Concert Band directed by Al G. Wright has achieved an impressive record of activities and accomplishments during the past decade.

With its auxiliary organizations, this Band numbers around 210 students. Of the total, 150 are bandsmen, the remaining students being members of marching units—Majorettes, Twirlers, Swiss Flag Spinners, and United Nations

Color Guard.

In December 1951 the Miami High Band went to Chicago to appear at the Mid-West National Band Clinic. Selected as one of the nation's top concert bands, the Miami High group received enthusiastic comments for their Chicago appearance.

The 150 musicians called the "Marching Band" are divided into two smaller groups, a "Concert Band" and a "Stingaree Band" for the purpose of facilitating re-

hearsal and administrative problems.

The Miami High Band has been and is a regular participant in District, State and Regional (National) Band Contests and in them has accumulated an impressive total of first division (superior) ratings in Concert, Marching, and Sight reading events.

The Miami High Band regularly participates in community and educational activities in cities throughout the State of Florida and is in constant demand for ap-

pearances in home-town Miami.

These 150 student musicians together with the dancing majorettes, twirlers, flag spinners, and other colorful units have made an outstanding impression on Miami

football fans.

The Miami Senior High School Band has pioneered many firsts in half-time shows for Miami football fans. In 1939 they introduced the art of Swiss Flag Swinging. In 1940 their Black Light Show received nation-wide attention. 1941 brought on Miami's first large Majorette Corps when the Miami High Majorettes took the field. 1943 introduced Miami's first between-halves musical pageant which Miami High called "Salute to the United

Nations."

These half-time pageants have grown into musical extravaganzas that have attracted nation-wide attention. Using members of the Miami High Orchestra, the large Chorus, and sometimes the Cheer leaders, these extravaganzas employ between 400 and 600 students-all in colorful costumes. Each game sees a different show. Each show is built around a central theme. "Salute to Mexico," "Football Fansasy," "Yuletide Bells," "Western Rhapsody," and "Cuban Carnival" are some of the titles used which will indicates the scope of these extravaganzas. Folk dancing and singing are introduced along with fireworks and electrical effects.

Hailed as one of the snappiest bands in the south for its marching manoeuvers and throught the country as a superb concert group it is dear to the hearts of Miamians as Miami's "Million Dollar" High School

The Miami High Band is well represented in University and College Bands. In 1951 alone more than \$12,000 worth of university scholarships were awarded to its graduates.

Under the banner "Leadership-Character," which is also a philosophy, graduates of the Miami High Band are daily taking their places as leaders in their com-

Al Wright is Director of Music at Miami Senior High School (Florida), a position he has held since 1938. He serves as bandmaster for the school's three bands and conductor for the Concert Orchestra, as well as sponsor of the school dance band and the Etude Club,

the instrumental music honor society.

He received his undergraduate (BA) degree from the University of Miami (Fla.) in 1937 with a major in Public School Music and received his Masters Degree in Education in 1947 with a major in School Supervision and Administration. Mr. Wright has served as guest conductor with a number of musical organizations including the University of Michigan Band, the University of Miami Band, University of Kansas Band, University of Florida Band, the East Tennessee High School Clinic Band, the Stetson University Chorus, and the Florida All-State High School Orchestra.

Mr. Wright has served as visiting lecturer at Stetson University; Vandercook College of Music, Chicago; University of Michigan Band Conductors' Workshop; Western State College Gunnison, Colo., and at the University of Miami, and has served on the Music Camp faculty at the University of Miami and Florida State University. He has appeared as Band Clinician at the Mid-West Band Clinic in Chicago, the East-Tennessee Band and Orchestra Clinic, and the Florida State Music Clinic.

Mr. Wright is actively engaged in the promotion of music education as a profession as well as in the development of fine musical organizations at Miami Senior High School. Following terms of office as President of the Florida Bandmasters Association and as President of the Florida Orchestra Association, he is now President of the Florida Music Educators Association. His other activities include: member of the Florida Teacher Education Advisory Council; member of the NSBOVA Board of Control, SMEC Division; SMEC Chairman of the School Music Rooms and Equipment Committee; Florida State Chairman MENC String Committee; State Chairman MENC School-Community Relations Committee; member board of advisors for the "Instrumentalist" Magazine; member Board of Advisors, Band Guild of America.

He has served as an adjudicator in nearly all of Florida's six district Band, Orchestra, and Solo contests.

In 1949 Al Wright was elected to membership in the American Bandmasters Association. He is also a charter member of the Beta Tau chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. His professional experience includes a number of years on french horn in the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra and with the Miami Opera Guild.

He is pageant director for the annual Kiwanis charity football game and Christmas pageant, and designed and directed the original pageants for the Mahi-Shrine foot-

ball game.

As an educator, Wright is a firm believer in the social importance of music training. He states his philosophy in the following words: "I believe that school band and orchestra participation is one of our finest means for character education. High school bands and orchestras build leadership and character in our yourth of today.'

MIAMI HIGH SCHOOL "STINGAREE" BAND

AL G. WRIGHT, Director

The "Stingaree" band at Miami High School is the school's second band. It is composed of some 100 high school musicians who are, for the most part, sophomores. that is in their first year of school at Miami Senior High. These students are awaiting vacancies in the concert band and are moved into the senior organization when such vacancies occur.

The "Stingaree" band operates as a separate unit and plays for assemblies and participates in concerts as a separate unit. The "Stingaree" band marches with the concert band at football games and parades. The combined senior concert band and "Stingaree" band makes up a large marching band of some 160 to 180 pieces.

Members in the "Stingaree" band are issued both a marching band uniform, which is identical to the Senior band's uniform, and also their own "Stingarce" uniform.

The Miami High School "Stingaree" band is entering the District Band Contest for the second time this year. This band will enter in a special class designated at A-2. In this class the "Stingaree" band, or second band, must play B music, must participate in sight reading events. and must participate in the marching event. Second band may not participate in the State Contest under present regulations.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

AL G. WRIGHT, Director

The Miami Senior High School Orchestra, under the direction of Al G. Wright and Gladys Ditsler, has consistently made highest ratings in district and state contest participation during its many years of existence. Last year this group received a first division in the concert and sight-reading events for Class A at the State Orchestra contest.

The Orchestra is often a colorful feature at school assemblies. In addition to this, it often presents concerts and participates in numerous civic and state events.

Made up of 82 members, this the Miami High Orchestra has its own officers who work with members of the Band Council and the Director. These officers form an active and successful student governing group within the orchestra. The council plans the orchestra's many activities, sets up standards of dress and behavior and in many ways has helped build the Orchestra into a fine playing and well behaved group of young men and women.

Graduates from this orchestra readily find places in university symphonies over the country. Recently three were awarded scholarships in the symphony at the Eastman School of Music. The University of Miami Symphony roster reveals a large number of Miami High School Orchestra graduates and players on its list. One-fourth of the players in the Miami Opera Guild Orchestra are former members of the Miami High Orchestra.

The string section meets daily during school time with Associate Director Gladys Ditsler in intermediate and advanced string classes. These string classes have contributed immensely to the improvement of the orchestra.

This Orchestra has a full symphonic instrumentation including a large string section and Harp.

Although a surprisingly large number of graduates from this group are now playing in professional and University Symphonies in many parts of the country, its educational goal is the development of leadership and character. That this goal is being reached is amply shown by the increasing number of Miami High Orchestra graduates who are taking their places as leaders in their communities.

The Miami High Orchestra regularly appears for community functions. These include the annual Christmas Concert with the M.H.S. Chorus for the Miami Rotary Club, and the Annual Easter Program. This group was selected to appear for the Southern Music Educators Conference in Tampa in 1949.

Mrs. Gladys Edwards Ditsler was appointed to the position of String Teacher and associate director of the Miami High School Orchestra in Fabruary 1947. Since that time a very active growth and interest has become evident in string music at the school. She organized courses in Music Theory and Music Appreciation, both of which quickly became popular with the students.

Before coming to Miami High Mrs. Ditsler taught privately for over ten years—organized her own trio and played professionally as violin soloist and also as a member of a number of music organizations. Concert-

master of Miami Concert Orchestra—Firestone Broadcasts under Howard Barlow—Miami Opera Orchestra, and University of Miami Symphony Orchestra, of which she is a charter member, playing with the symphony until 1947.

Mrs. Ditsler received B.M. degree in Public School Music—magna cum laude—from University of Miami. She studied violin with Dr. Arnold Volpe and Dr. Joel Belov—the former an artist pupil of Leopold Auer, the latter a pupil of Carl Flesch—Theory and Harmony with Dr. W. S. Sterling, formerly of Cincinnati, Conservatory of Music.

She is also a member of Sigma Alpha Lota, national honorary music organization.

She is now serving her second term as Secy.-Treas. of the Florida Orchestra Association. She is State Chairman for the MENC National Committee on String Instruction.

MIAMI SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL STINGAREE ORCHESTRA

GLADYS DITSLER, Director



Miami Senior High School Stinaree Orchestra, directed by Gladys Edwards Ditsler was organized in 1947. Now in its third year this organization has a triple purpose. It provides orchestra experience to young junior high school graduates, particularly brass and woodwind players who are not eligible for Concert Orchestra because of instrument limitations in that organization— to more ad-

vanced musicians who cannot fulfill the turnout requirements of the senior group— and to beginning string players. A beginning string player, after a few weeks of class work, may enter Stingaree Orchestra and from there may advance to Concert Orchestra. Each year Stingaree Orchestra has had a good representative group of these string players—about one half of its membership. Of its 32 members this semester, 18 are string players. This section often augments the Concert Orchestra for special concerts and assemblies. The orchestra meets every day for a full period; it has it own officers and student conductors. All required turnouts are during school time and full credit is given to each student for participation. During the year Stingarce Orchestra plays for a number of school assemblies.

The director, Gladys Ditsler received her BM degree from the University of Miami and was appointed String Instructor at Miami Senior High School in 1947. She has organized classes in Strings, Music Theory and Music Appreciation at Miami High as well as Violin Classes at two Junior High Schools. She is sponsor for the newlyformed string honor society, Peg and Scroll.

Mrs. Ditsler is a charter member of the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra, having played violin with that organization for a number of years; also a member of Sigma Alpha Iota, national honorary fraternity. At present she is Secretary-Treasurer of Florida Orchestra Association, String Chairman for Florida Music Educators Association and Orchestra Editor for The School Oirector.

MILTON HIGH SCHOOL BAND

S. FREDERICK WORMAN, Director



The Milton High School Band was organized in 1939 by Captain Joe Astoria, who remained as director of the organization for seven years. He was succeeded by Miss Dorothy Wamble.

In the fall of th following year, 1947, the present bandmaster, S. Fredrick Worman, assumed directorship of the Milton Band. The organization was subsequently completely reorganized, presently

performing with a complement of forty playing members and a corps of sixteen majorettes. New uniforms were purchased three years ago.

In addition to performing at all football games and participating in many community parades, the band each year presents a series of concerts and three years ago represented Santa Rosa County in the gubernatorial Inaugural Parade in Tallahassee; in 1941, the organization, representing then Governor-elect Millard Caldwell, led the Inaugural procession. In November, 1951, the Band traveled to Tallahassee to participate in Florida State University's first annual Band Day festivities.

S. Fredrick Worman, present director of the Milton High School Band, received his training as a bandmaster from the late Edward S. Calhoun, organizer and director of the 103rd Calvary Band, later becoming the 190th Field Artillery Band during World War II, and a member of a family of prominently recognized in Pennsylvania music circles.

Mr. Worman served as director of the Danville Community Boys' Band, Danville, Pennsylvania, after the death of Mr. Calhoun, organizer of the unit. Subsequently, upon graduation from Bloomsburg State Teachers College, Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, in 1941, he was employed as band director at Harris High School, Spruce Pine, North Carolina; after one year in a similar capacity at West Pittston, Pennsylvania, he accepted the position as bandmaster at Chapman High School, Apalachicola, Florida. After a two-year tenure there, Mr. Worman assumed the band directorship at Milton, Florida, in 1947, and is now serving his fifth year as director of the Milton High School Band.

ORLANDO SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL BAND

C. W. RUMPF, Director



The Orlando High School Band was organized in July, 1939, by Edward J. Heney. In August. 1949, Mr. Heney was succeeded by Harry L. Parker under whose capable leadership the department grew and continued to maintain the fine record started by Mr. Heney. In the fall of 1944, Mr. Parker became engaged in war work and was succeeded by Ernest F. Pechin. Many students

learned much band music under the capable baton of this much-loved musician, who passed away in the fall of 1946.

Successors to the foregoing gentleman followed in rapid order. Robert McEmber very successfully directed the band during the 1946-47 season. J. R. Marcellus succeeded Mr. McEmber and was in turn succeeded by G. Gordon Ritter. C. W. Rumpf, formerly director of the Cherokee and Memorial Junior High School Bands, became the director of the Orlando Senior High School Band in 1949.

The organization besides presenting half-time shows at all home football games and at some of the out-oftown ones, is a featured band at the annual Tangerine Bowl Game on New Year's Day. A long list of annual parades such as the Christmas Parade, the Central Florida Exposition Parade and many others keep the band literally on its toes.

Participation in school concerts, the annual Orlando School Band Association Concert and a series of park concerts all rank high among the many activities of the band.

With the help of an active band association (headed by J. J. Loveless) it has been possible to bring the organization in the last three years to Cocoa, Daytona Beach, Winter Haven, Sanford, Leesburg, Minneola, Jacksonville, Miami, Lakeland, St. Petersburg, Eustis and Tampa. Several of these cities have been visited by the band more than once.

C. W. Rumpf, director of the Orlando Senior High School Band, was born in Langborne, Pa. He is a graduate of Temple University, where he received both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

Mr. Rumpf has had the pleasure and privilege of studying with such well known teachers as George F. Boyle, pianist and composer and member of the Julliard School of Music faculty, Henry Albert Lang, composer; and Ferdinand Paul of the famous Sousa Band.

Prior to coming to Florida, Mr. Rumpf taught in Pennsylvania, where he was a member of the Pennsylvania Bandmasters Association, and Delaware. This is his third year as director of the Senior High Band in Orlando. Four years were spent by him in the two Junior High Schools of that city; Cherokee and Memorial.


PAHOKEE HIGH SCHOOL BAND ROBERT O. LAMPI, Director



The Pahokee High School Band was reorganized May 10, 1940 and placed under the direction of R. O. Lampi. Rehearsals were continued through the summer and the band was ready to perform for the football season of 1940. Since then the band has performed, playing and marching, during every football season, at home games and those away from home. The band also performs for various civic

functions, rallies, parades, and gives a series of winter concerts locally. The band participates in the annual Halloween Carnival. Occasionally individual members and ensembles are called upon to perform at the local civic clubs.



Reorganized in 1943 by the present director, H. Vernon Hooker, and consisting of 35 students recruited from the entire city school system the present "Tiger" Band has over one hundred students, 100 new uniforms purchased by interested citizens this year at a cost of over \$6,000 and has just completed a factory overhaul of all high school owned band equipment from a \$4,000 appropriation by

the Escambia County School Board, Superintendent of Instruction Dan J. Anderson and James L. McCord, Pensacola High School Principal. Work has just started on a new Pensacola High School and within the next two or three years it is hoped that a music building or an adequate physical plant will be constructed to house the instrumental department. Due to the recent F.B.A. reclassification of all Florida high schools the Pensacola Band becomes the only AA organization in Northwest Florida.

H. Vernon Hooker, Director of the Pensacola High School Band, is a graduate with a B.S. degree in Public School Music from Ohio Northern University. He has studied at Wittenberg College, Capital, Ohio State University and is working on his Masters at the University of Miami, Miami, Fla. Prior to coming to Pensacola in 1943 Hooker was director of instrumental music for eight years in Rocky Mount, North Carolina where he also organized a city instrumental music program in all the schools. In addition to school duties Hooker has had twelve years professional experience consisting of symphony orchestra and dance band. In Pensacola Hooker directs the First Methodist Church Choir, has recently retired after three years service as Secretary of the Pensacola Junior Chamber of Commerce and is now serving a second term as State Treasurer of the Florida Bandmasters Association.

PIERSON HIGH SCHOOL BAND JAMES T. WEBER, Director



The Pierson School Band was organized Sept. 1949 by James T. Weber, its present director. The following year a Junior band of some fifteen pieces was added to the school roster, and this year a beginning group is well under way. The combined membership now totals fifty-two. The marching band has appeared in a number of parades and festivities in this vicinity, the latest appearances

including the Stetson Home-coming parade at Crescent City in February. A band booster's club recently organized in the community is proving quite active in raising funds to augment the instrumentation and uniforming of the band. Members of the Pompano Beach High School know what is needed to start a band? The eager group of would-be musicians that met together for the first rehearsal in November 1949, had nothing but a desire to play music, a teacher to guide them, and a faith that the community would cooperate.

The first problem was to secure a rehearsal room. After shifting from the school cafeteria to the west bleachers of the new gym, then to the auditorium stage, last January the band finally found a place to settle in—the former gym dressing room. Plans are now underway for enlarging and improving the "band room."

To encourage the school, the band began performing in public as soon as they could hold together on a few simple pieces. A basketball game in January 1950 was the memorable occasion of their initial public appearance. The first formal concert was given last spring at a joint band-glee club program. By that time, the outfit was beginning to sound like a band, even though they did not look much like one.

Raising funds for uniforms and larger instruments, such as the bass drum and sousaphone, seemed like a mammoth problem a year ago. However, generous contributions from the market, clubs and individuals enabled the band to order uniforms in the fall of 1950. Measurements were taken and the whole school eagerly awaited the uniforms.

In the meantime, the band, outfitted in yellow T-shirts and blue jeans, played at most of the home football games. To everyone's delight, the beautiful uniforms arrived just in time for the big home-coming game. A rousing cheer greeted our snappy-looking band as they marched onto the field.

Since then, the band has grown in fame and has accepted invitations to perform at the Valentine Festival, the Red-Cross Benefit, and the Bean and Pepper Jamboree in Pompano, at the VFW parade in Fort Lauderdale, and at the Hollywood Fiesta.

Today there is much room for growth, additional uniforms and instruments must be purchased, and a few problems still need to be solved. However, Pompano Beach may be justly proud of its well-dressed and well-trained band. Their concerts are at tribute not only to the hard work of the musicians, majorettes, and director, but also to the wonderful support by the school, band parents, and public.

QUINCY HIGH SCHOOL BAND

Mr. Littlefield was succeeded by John K. Burton. John R. DeYoung was born in Ludington, Michigan.





In September 1950, Joe Barry Mullins followed Capt. Sherouse who in turn was succeeded by W. S. Haynie for one year and

after which Mr. Mullins returned for one more year leaving again in 1943. During World War II, the band was disbanded but was re-organized in 1945 by Paul Creech who left in 1947, leaving the band without a leader once more.

In February 1948, Josef Oszuscik took over the task of re-organizing the band department. This department is now a part of the regular curriculum and is integrated with the other departments of the school. The new band has progressed rapidly and thus far has entered two district festivals with each venture an improvement over the other in the attempt to regain its past achievements.

Josef Oszuscik is director of the Walton High Band, a position he has held since January 1948. Before entering public school teaching, he was clarinetist with the Indianapolis Symphony and the Chicago Civic Symphony. He played in theater and radio and says he worked under many eminent conductors. Until 1937 he travelled extensively with musical organizations.

He received his under-graduate (B.M.) degree from VanderCook College of Music (Chicago) majoring in instrumental music education, education, and theory; his Master of Music degree from Northwestern University (Evanston) in 1949 majoring in music education and minoring in theory and clarinet. His additional college training was accomplished at DePauw University, Indiana University and Mississippi Southern College.

He taught at Emerson High School (Gary, Ind.); woodwind clinician at Hardin-Simmons University (Abilene, Texas) and at West Texas State Teachers College (Canyon, Texas); Director of Instrumental Music in the Hattiesburg, Miss. public schools (1939 to 1948) and while there he also taught at Mississippi Southern College.

Mr. Oszuscik also participates actively in his profession. A Life Member of M.E.N.C., serving three times on national MENC committees; (Patriotic Music committee, 1944-46), (Contemporary Music, 1947-49), and presently on the (Music Education in the Community) committee. A member of American Musicological Society, Phi Me Alpha Sinfonia, and is listed in Who Is Who In Music. While in Mississippi, he served as State President of the Miss. Bandmasters Assoc., President and 1st Vice President of the M.M.E.A., and on the state licensing board of music examiners. He has appeared as a guest conductor of the U.S. Navy Band and is a contributor of articles to various professional magazines.

The Winter Park High School Band was organized in 1935 by Mr. Gene Sturchio, who, seven years later, was succeeded by Mr. Everett Lee Roberts.

In 1948 Mr. Edgar W. Williams, a former pilot in Naval Aviation, took over the band, and under his direction it participated in the District Festival in 1949 placing first in all three divisions, hence earning the opportunity to

participate in the State Festival.

Two years ago the band was graduated from class "C" and is now officially classified as class "B."

The present Concert and Marching band is organized on a policy of Community service, recognizing as their first obligation, service to their school and city. Supported by an active organization of parents and well wishers this group has become an effective force in the life of its community. Last year this group played twelve regular concerts and made thirty-six other appearances. The organization and its component ensembles and soloists made eighty-eight appearances. The record of the band has been one of consistent improvement. Then after the war, he spent several years as Supervisor of Music in the schools of Brewer Township, Maine, and also two years as Director of Music at the Chicago Latin School, after which he came to Winter Park. Mr. Williams is now serving his third year at Winter Park as director of bands in the Junior and Senior High Schools.


there is the junior High concert band and the junior High beginners and the senior High Beginners.



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
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
