What is Elemental Music?

Elemental music uses simple forms and compositional techniques drawn from the rhythms and patterns of children's language, rhymes and songs.

What is Elemental Music?

- The music is not intellectually based; all people by nature of their inherent musicality can participate in it...without the need for advanced technique or training.
- The music is strongly pattern based employing short, easily remembered patterns or rhythm, melody, harmony etc.
- (Elemental Music) can easily be broken down into its component elements, participants are encouraged to create or improvise.....
- The ability to create music spontaneously using intuition and basic knowledge of simple artistic tools....
- Complex note reading skills or highly developed fine motor instrumental technique is not necessary to participate...
- The simple, natural patterns of speech and bodily movement (are) the starting points for...music making.

Features of Elemental Music That Align With Hip Hop

- Forms are based on speech
- Call & Response and Question & Answer
- Voices, body percussion and found sounds
- Ostinato patterns
- Layered ostinatos
- Improvisation
- 'Simple' patterns are combined and layered to create and compose complex music
- Music springs from the collective

Respect the Culture

- Give CREDIT
- Be OPEN to learning, it is ok if you don't know. Let your musicians know you are learning together
- Be MINDFUL
 - How do you respond to new musical experiences?
 - Do you label (good, bad etc.) or describe musical elements?
- Use descriptive words to INSPIRE new learning
- ALL music is GOOD music to someone

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DEE JAY

DJ Kool Herc is often credited as one of the pioneers, using two turntables to extend the instrumental breaks of songs, giving rise to the art of DJing.



MC

MCs, like Grandmaster Flash and Afrika Bambaataa, became the lyrical storytellers and poets of the movement.



BREAKDANCING

Dancers, known as b-boys and b-girls, used the streets and open spaces as their stage, developing a unique style characterized by intricate footwork, spins, freezes, and power moves. Pioneers like Crazy Legs and Rock Steady Crew played a crucial role in popularizing breakdancing and helped it spread globally.



GRAFFITI

Graffiti art added a visual component to the culture, breakdancing provided a physical expression, and knowledge emphasized the importance of understanding and respecting the history and roots of hip hop.



KNOWLEDGE


The "knowledge" element in hip hop culture is a crucial but often less emphasized aspect, rooted in the movement's early history in the South Bronx during the 1970s. Knowledge, often referred to as the "fifth element" of hip hop, is about understanding and respecting the culture's history, its roots, and its social and political significance.

Schemes


Scheming is a technique used in the writing process in Hip-Hop and Rap. The writer explores ways to capture the ear and engage the listener. Hip-Hop and Rap artists use schemes, metaphors and rhymes. Scheming builds basic rhythm and cadence on a beat when rapping.


Scheming can be practiced using any topic or theme.


